

I have been in correspondence with Anthony Lewis, a syndicated columnist whom I read on *The New York Times* Op-Ed page. His columns have been consistently anti-Israel and pro-Palestinian, it seemed to me, and I wrote to him to point that out. Before he answered, however, I went to Israel and visited the editor-in-chief of the *Jerusalem Post* to tape a TV program. The correspondence with Mr. Lewis picks up from that point with the letter below.

Dear Mr. Lewis:

June 8, 1994

In the interim since I wrote to you criticizing your anti-Israel positions, I interviewed David Bar Ilan in Jerusalem for my television program. He presented me with a book of his columns and letters in which I learned, incidentally, that you are Jewish.

Obviously, I am doubly disgusted with your editorials and your lack of compassion for Israel. Will you really be satisfied when a 23rd Arab dictatorship takes over our land and the bravest of our people are exiled or murdered?

Your columns have a negative and distasteful style in any case, but could you just do the favor of not writing about our people at all?

Dear Mr. Lewis:

In response to your letter addressed to "Ms." Zola Levitt, I wonder how you arrive at the belief that I do not want Israel to have peace with her neighbors. You are making an assumption that people who are against Arafat don't want peace. Do you really trust Mr. Arafat? Do you really trust the Arab mentality that says one thing and does another — that makes peace treaties only to buy time in which to militarily strengthen and then conquer?

Mr. Lewis, Israel is my life's work. I've taken 45 tours there and I know quite a few people on all sides of this question (including many Palestinians who would prefer the status quo to what's coming up). I've written a dozen books on the subject. Maybe you don't think much of my opinion, but here is a videotape of my recent interviews with Yitzhak Shamir and Benjamin Netanyahu made for my television program. Please listen to what they say and take it seriously. Unlike you or me, these men live in Israel every day, on the ground, and they have a pretty good idea of who are their "neighbors"

and who are their enemies. While they represent the opposition to the present government, what they say is so obviously factual and relevant that it truly deserves your attention.

Your side of the picture — Israel gives up its land or else — is almost the only one being publicized. I sincerely feel that you and the other anti-Israel columnists' have it within your power to annihilate a democracy and replace it with a dictatorship. If you like Haiti, you're going to love the new Palestine.

Your letter calls me "anti-Israel" when in fact I take the same position as the Government of Israel. Wouldn't it be more honest simply to

What I cannot understand is how you would deal with the 2 million or so Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza: expel them? or doom Israeli young men to perpetual occupation duty?

I do thank you for your attention to one subscriber on the issue of Israel and I do appreciate your concern for the Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza. I am sure you mean well when you promote these people as having legitimate claims to land promised to the Jewish people biblically and certified historically and archaeologically.

You compare the Rabin-Arafat situation to DeGaulle and Adenauer. But Arafat, no statesman, does not belong in that company. He has behaved like a buffoon, Mr. Lewis, and I'm sure you know the difference between a terrorist and an authentic national leader. The trust you evidenced for the King of Jordan in a recent column shows you appreciating a man who at least utilizes a civil tongue. I thought, however, that your colleague, A.M. Rosenthal, had His Majesty pretty well pegged when he described him as "never for sale but always for lease."

You say you take the same position as the government of Israel but it's not really the same. Your columns are truly anti-Israel and that is not this government's position. You really do praise the Arabs and make the Israelis




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# ISRAEL THE CENTER OF DIVINE HISTORY

Part IV

Pro-Zionist Christianity, which developed in the latter part of the 19th century along with Zionism, played a significant role in the beginnings of Israel, as we shall see, at the time of World War I. They accomplished this mainly through the politics of the time in England and America. However, all Christian leaders did not espouse pro-Zionist Christianity, which was based primarily on the newly revived Premillennial/Dispensational theology. While they were energetic and vocal, the Premillennial/Dispensational Christians were (and continue to be) in the minority. Most professing Christians in Europe and in the American Hemisphere have long held the opposing view of Amillennial/Postmillennial Christianity.

#### ANTI-ZIONIST CHRISTIANITY

While there are some subtle distinctions between Amillennialism and Postmillennialism concerning any future for Israel, they are the same. They teach that any covenant relationship God had with Israel was cancelled at the time of the First Coming of Christ. Therefore, God is through with the Jewish people as a nation, and there is to be

no State of Israel, now or in the future. In addition, there is to be no Temple, and no Millennial Kingdom for Israel with Jerusalem as its capital. Any blessings to the Jewish people must be along with all other nationalities under the aegis of the Church. Furthermore, God has transferred and transformed to the Church all the blessings and promises He originally made to Israel. Thus, the Church is the New Israel. Scholars sometimes call this view Replacement Theology, as it views the Church as replacing Israel in all aspects. In contrast, the Premillennial/Dispensational view is that, while the Church is the new creation of the Lord that proclaims the Gospel in this age, the Church does not replace Israel in its national covenant relationship with God. The covenant with Israel does not guarantee personal salvation for all Jews. It does, though, guarantee personal salvation for the "remnant" of Jewish people in all ages, including the Also, it guarantees the Church Age. preservation and restoration of Israel to the Land in preparation for the Tribulation and the second Coming of Christ.

Because of these theological convictions, then, the Amillennial/Postmillennial Christians tend to look at any idea of a future for Israel with alarm, as an affront to Christianity, as a denial of the true position of the Church. The Premillennial/Dispensationalists, on the other hand, view the idea of a future for Israel with delight. Modern Israel is a welcome harbinger of the Rapture of the Church and the second Coming of Christ.

What does the New Testament teach — Premillennialism or Replacement Theology? There is not as much disagreement about this as one might suppose. Most of the Replacement Theologians and Amillennialists agree with the Premillennialists that the New Testament apostles believed in a future for Israel and the literal second Coming of Christ — but they say the apostles were just mistaken! It took time for the Church to "mature" to the knowledge that Christ was not returning to the earth, and that Israel was to be replaced by the Church.



#### FAITH'S ENDURING MYSTERY:

Who really is the Messiah? by J.M.P.

With the recent death and no resurrection of Rabbi Schneerson of New York, a big question has surfaced. Who is the Messiah? The best way to know is to look to those given revelation by the Creator of the universe. The prophets had much to say.

The place of birth in Bethlehem and the eternal preexistence of the Messiah is strongly presented in the Old Testament. The Prophet Isaiah declared, "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign/ Behold, the virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (Immanuel means "God with us.")

Did the prophets ever speak of His mission? Would He be welcomed? Isaiah stated, "The Lord hath made bare His holy arm in the eyes of all the nations and all the ends of the Earth shall see the salvation of our God." He also tells us, "But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities."

Even after the agony and death, the prophet declared, "When thou shalt make his soul an offering for sin, he shall see his seed, he shall prolong his days, and the pleasure of the Lord shall prosper in his hand."

Clearly the Messiah was to suffer, die and be resurrected. Zechariah declared, "And his feet shall stand in that day upon the Mountain of Olives, which is before Jerusalem on the East, and the Mountain of Olives shall cleave in its midst ... and half of the mountain shall remove toward the North, and half of it toward the South."

This verse is not the first advent. Yeshua (Jesus) proclaimed, "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon Me, because the Lord hath anointed Me to preach good tidings unto the meek; He hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives ... to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." The verse is from the Prophet Isaiah minus the rest of the verse that states "And the day of vengeance of our God." Yeshua had a good reason for the omission.

The last part dealt with His second advent. Did Yeshua fulfill the messianic prophecies? Did he ever claim Deity? Yeshua stated, "Before Abraham was, I AM." Did he claim to be the Messiah? He told the Samaritan woman that "salvation is of the Jews."

"The woman saith unto Him, I know that Messiah cometh, when He is come, He will tell us all things. Yeshua saith unto her, I that speak unto thee am He."

Why didn't Yeshua ever say, "Thus saith the Lord"? Who can forgive sins, raise the dead, give sight to the blind, or claim eternal existence? No one but the Creator.


In Psalm 110 David prophesied, "The Lord said to my Lord, sit thou at my right hand, until I make thine enemies thy footstool" — a clear reference to the Messiah. In the Hebrew this is written "Me'um Yehova La Adoni" and in English, "Said Jehovah unto my Adonai." Adonai is a title of divinity. This makes the Messiah God.

sound like fools. You say they could have made peace with King Hussein of Jordan for all these many years — an utterly absurd idea as though it is the Israelis who are at fault for the belligerent Middle East. Surely you will at least agree that it was the Arabs who constantly attacked Israel and that Israel wants nothing more than to live in peace within secure borders, protected from those indignant, 200 million "underdogs."

You ask how I would deal with the Palestinians, and my answer is with limited autonomy and not a giveaway of Jewish land. My father was not an American. He was a Balt. Given his situation as an immigrant, he did not try to claim territory for the other Balts and he did not really assimilate into a Christian culture. Rather he pretty much stuck to the Jewish community, got a job, never argued with a policeman or soldier, and put three kids through graduate school. think the Palestinians are capable of living in Israel — a nation entirely more advanced than the best of Arab "countries" - and enjoying the fruits of a true modern democracy in the manner that my father enjoyed his opportunities in America. At the same time, I don't expect them to worship at the Wall or wear prayer shawls. Naturally, their autonomy would include the religious freedom Israel has granted all peoples, and I'm sure they would tend to stay within the Muslim community, prospering all the same. You're surely aware that Arabs live better in Israel - even in the West Bank and Gaza — than in the Arab dictatorships (other than those that are family businesses). In this scheme Israel remains one administered nation bv а democratic government, constitutionally benevolent to all minorities within as in the American model. Again I would remind you that a secret ballot taken among Israeli Arabs would probably advise Arafat to take his revolution somewhere else.

As matters now stand, we're going to muscle out a dictatorship in Haiti to make

room for a democracy and we are muscling a democracy in Israel to make room for a dictatorship! How you can favor this, as an American and as a Jew, is beyond me.



I wonder if you watched the videotape of Netanyahu and Shamir which I sent to you. These men are hardly radicals, and I have a feeling that their party may come back to power before long. I wondered what your reaction was to their thoughts.

# ONCE THROUGH THE NEW TESTAMENT



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A Look at the Book By Steve Ger  $\Rightarrow$   $\Rightarrow$ "JEREMIAH: WEEPING FOR THE DISOBEDIENT" Part III

Welcome to the third installment of our study of the dynamic message of the prophet Jeremiah. We have previously established the uniquely autobiographical tone of the book concerning the one whose name means both "the Lord exalts" and "the Lord throws down." We have confirmed that the Lord's message through his prophet in the first six chapters is indeed to "exalt" the righteous and to "throw down" the disobedient. This month we will continue on through the emotional and vivid journey of Jeremiah's message. We will see the passionate reaction of a spurned God to His people's faithlessness and rejection of His Let's proceed now to this month's law. invigorating portion of the prophetic word, Jeremiah 7-13.

The prophet, in chapters 7-10, standing in the gate of the great Jerusalem Temple, indicts Judah for backsliding away from the Lord. In front of crowds of priests, merchants and worshipers, Jeremiah addresses the issue of true religion, religion that is acceptable to God. He demonstrates that salvation does not come through ritual or sacrifice or going through any other pious "motions," but rather comes from knowing the true God and acting accordingly.

Early in the ministry of Jeremiah, good King Josiah had begun to reform the religious practices of Judah and to restore and purify the worship of God. He had even initiated a building project to repair the decaying Temple. Some years later, in the wake of Josiah's religious reformation, the Jewish people were falsely placing their trust in the sacrifice and ritual of the Temple. They believed that although the Lord may have judged the idolatry and rebellion of the northern kingdom, Israel, there was no way He would allow His holy city of Jerusalem to suffer judgment. Certainly He would not permit the great Sanctuary of Zion to be desecrated.

Jeremiah proclaims that this is futile "wishful thinking." The Lord will not spare a people who have brazenly transgressed half of the Ten Commandments (7:9). Pronouncing the judgment that Jesus would echo over six hundred years later, Jeremiah cries that the house of the Lord has become a den of thieves (7:11). The Temple will provide no shelter for those who have profaned its sanctity.

Jeremiah knew that elaborate sacrifice and ritual were meaningless unless they were accompanied by individual changes of heart. Knowledge was useless without obedience and

## Elaborate sacrifice and ritual are meaningless without a change of heart.

Jeremiah evoked the message of his prophetic predecessors in calling for social justice and renewed obedience to the Mosaic Covenant. Jeremiah again promises destruction on Judah if there is no repentance. He contrasts God's infinite wisdom with their foolishness. Unless the people of Judah change their ways, their sin would be severely punished. Their claim of peace, peace when there is no peace, would suck them down in a whirlwind of terror, the terror of destruction, death and exile from their homeland (10:18ff). Disaster The prophet himself cannot be averted. identifies and personifies the hopelessness of the imminent judgment to come. The weeping (Continued on Page 10)

prophet cries out for "the balm in Gilead," healing medicine to close the gaping wounds of Judah (8:22-9:1).

In chapters 11-13, Jeremiah implores Judah to face the fact that they were grossly violating the Covenant and that dire consequences were about to follow. To say the least, the prophet's message lacked popularity. In fact, he records that there was a plot to muffle his message by assassinating him. Even members of his own family were involved with this heinous scheme (11:18-12:6). However, the Lord revealed the plot and protected his servant. Jeremiah continued to speak the word of the Lord against his people. The message continued to be uncomplicated: Those who were obedient were under God's divine protection and those who were disobedient were under His wrath. God and his prophet were both acutely aware that the people would not listen, and Jeremiah wept bitterly at the pending disaster for his people.

Our next study will focus on Jeremiah's intercession with the Lord for the people of Judah and the Lord's divine response.



Would the Messiah have a forerunner? Malachi said, "Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before."

Did anyone ever fulfill this role? John the Baptist declared, "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance: but He that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire." He then declared, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."

Jesus confirmed this when he said, "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up: That whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

As we ponder the identity of the Messiah, the credentials of Yeshua the Christ should weigh heavily. In Psalm 16, David states, "for thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou permit thine Holy One to see corruption." Who is this Holy One?

The body of Yeshua did not see corruption because "He is not here, He is risen." Yeshua told his apostles, "Behold, we go up to Jerusalem, and all things that are written by the prophets concerning the Son of Man shall be accomplished. And they shall scourge Him, and put Him to death. And the third day He shall rise again."

Did David know the "Son of Man"? Let's search the Scriptures and put our souls at rest.
