Jews used to joke in a semiserious sigh, if only Moses had had a better sense of direction and turned right instead of left, we could have been heirs to all



those precious oilfields in the Middle East. Instead we got Israel, and the most even God could say about it is that it's a land flowing with milk and honey.

If we are really God's chosen people, why did He allot the most valuable natural resources to our neighbors? Why did the Arabs get the oil while we got stuck with so much sand and desert?

It's a puzzle that has perplexed us for years. But thanks to some remarkable findings by economists and social scientists, we've discovered an answer: it was divine providence that protected us from what Richard Auty labels "the curse of natural resources."

It seems, as a great deal of research now proves, countries rich in natural resources bear a burden that ends up stifling real growth and prosperity for their people. As counter-intuitive as it may seem, there is a link between abundance of natural resources and poor economic development. Petroleum producing countries are an excellent example. From 1965 to 1998 gross national product per capita in OPEC countries <u>decreased</u> on average by 1.3% while in the rest of the developing world per capita <u>growth</u> was on average 2.2%.

In the past few months, commentators have discussed the effects of this "curse of plenty" as it looms in the future for Afghanistan. It's recently been discovered that there is approximately \$1 trillion worth of minerals beneath this seeming wasteland. So what does this mean for the country and its inhabitants? Many experts in third world resource politics argue that almost certainly it portends only bad things to come. Warlords and tribal chieftains will almost surely now have reason to fight for many decades to come because the treasures of victory are so enticing. A land flowing with titanium is not destined for tranquility.



And it isn't only conflict over newfound wealth that explains why a surfeit of natural resources so often ends up being a curse instead of a blessing. When countries have riches readily available just for the taking under their feet, they are not really motivated to make maximum use of their brains. Ingenuity is the product of need; resourcefulness, initiative and inventiveness are the ways people who have to struggle for prosperity grow to greatness.

Just imagine if in 1948 Jews had come to a land welcoming them with the oil reserves of their neighboring Saudi Arabia. We would never have seen the creation of the country that is a world leader in so many areas of scientific achievement, of medical breakthroughs, of pioneering accomplishments that are nothing short of miraculous. Without oil, Israelis realized that they had to earn their bread by the sweat of their brows—and their brows of course were the place they kept their brains.

That's why, in retrospect, the greatest blessing of Israel is that it wasn't cursed with an overabundance of resources that would make intelligence and brainpower unnecessary. All God chose to give us were milk and honey. Not because these are the two most valuable items in the world, but because they are the metaphors for the true blessings of life: Mother's milk, essential for wellbeing; and honey, sweetness that makes life worth living.

Human beings need lives of meaning. Sweet lives are the result of spiritual fulfillment. So God promises us that He will nurse us with the milk of His mother love and sustain us with the honeyed sweetness of His constant care and concern.

And who would trade that for all the oil in the world?



God has not turned His back on the Jewish people, **Bruce Mills** (*above*) told members of the Southern Baptist Messianic Fellowship in Orlando, Fla.

Explaining that the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) "came from a Jew to Jews," Mills said that God still loves the Jewish people and that "all Israel will be saved" (Romans 11:26) when "the full number of the gentiles has come in" (Romans 11:25). Mills presented his views prior to the 2010 Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting.

Mills, a founding deacon at Jerusalem Baptist Church, used as his primary text Jeremiah 29:11—"'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.'"

Mills pointed to a crucial moment in Israel's history to illustrate that God still has a plan for the Jewish people. When Jesus was on trial before Pilate, the Roman governor said to the people, "I am innocent of this man's blood.... It is your responsibility!" (Matthew 27:24). The people then answered, "Let his blood be on us and on our children!" (Matthew 27:25). This statement of apparent condemnation, Mills said, "can also be taken as a proclamation of salvation. After all, it is by the blood of Jesus that all of us—Jew and gentile—are saved." He went on to explain that, as the hymn declares, the blood of Christ is "'the balm of Gilead' that can heal the sin-sick soul," both Jew and gentile.

Affirming that the Jewish people are still very much alive in the plan of God, Mills urged the Church to make them a priority in evangelism, not just a secondary option. "Salvation is from the Jews [John 4:22]," he said. "It's not from the English, not from the Germans, and not from the French. Salvation is from the Jews. It is a fact of history. And Jesus is the Messiah of Israel, the King of the Jews, and Savior of the world."

The message, Mills said, is clear: **The Church should be evangelizing the Jewish people because they are the conduit through which Christ came into the world.**

"Jesus is the only hope for both Jews and gentiles," Mills concluded.

Ben Martin, an International Mission Board representative serving in Israel, told the group that the efforts of the Church to bring salvation to the Jewish people are proving fruitful as "more Jews know Christ today than at any time since the first century."





Goliath's Hometown Uncovered

An ongoing archaeological excavation in Tel Tzafit continues to unearth the



handle

ruins of what was once the city of Gat —described in the Bible as the hometown of Goliath. Professor Aren Maeir, who is directing the dig, spoke to Arutz Sheva's Hebrew-language news service to discuss the latest finds.

The site, inhabited at times by Canaanites and at other times by Philistines, has remnants from many periods of history. "We are focusing on the Canaanite period, the Philistine period, and the Israelite period, and for now we're primarily in the Philistine period," he said.

One of the most interesting finds was a piece of writing containing, among other things, Philistine names, some of which were similar to the name "Goliath."

"We've found a rich variety of artifacts"

showing that Gat was a major city at that time, he continued. "We are now discovering remnants from metal craft and bronze, and from the destruction of the city at the hands of King Chazel of Aram as described in the Second Book of Kings."

Findings show that Chazel and his army laid siege to the city until its residents had exhausted their food supply, then attacked. Dozens of buildings were found that were demolished by the invading army.

Other buildings appear to have collapsed in an earthquake, possibly the one mentioned at the beginning of the Book of Amos, Prof. Maeir said.

The relationship between the nation of Israel and the Philistines was more complex than people tend to assume, Maeir revealed. "The Philistines... were often more than just enemies. We can see this in the Bible as well, for instance, in the fact that Samson married a Philistine woman," he said. There appears to have been crossover between the two cultures—for example, findings show that elements of Philistine cooking became common among the Israelites as well.

After visiting the Promised Land for the first time, a Jewish Believer once said, "I used to read the Bible in black and white. Now I read it in color!"




ISRAEL'S CONTRIBUTIONS IN MEDICINE **DHEA Triples Fertility**

An anti-aging dietary supplement already sold in drug and health food stores could triple a women's chance of getting pregnant, and help her carry the baby to term, according to a new report by Israeli researchers.

Scientists from the Meir Medical Center and Tel Aviv University (TAU) found a statistical connection between the over-the-counter hormone supplement, DHEA, and successful pregnancy rates in women undergoing treatment for infertility.

In the first controlled study on the effects of the supplement, Prof. Adrian Shulman, the director of the IVF Unit of the Obstetric and Gynecology Department at Meir Medical Center, and a professor on TAU's Faculty of Medicine, decided to test the efficacy of DHEA, a naturally occurring steroid found in the brain that is used worldwide to treat the effects of aging, after hearing anecdotal evidence from his patients and the medical community on the benefits of using the supplement during fertility treatments.

He and his fellow researchers conducted a study in which a control





group of women received treatment for poor ovulation, and another group received the same treatment with the addition of the DHEA supplement. The latter group, of around 20 women, took 75 mg of the supplement daily for 40 days before starting fertility treatments, and continued for up to five months.

Not only were women who combined infertility treatment with DHEA more likely to conceive, the researchers discovered, they were also more likely to experience a healthy pregnancy and delivery. "In the DHEA group, there was a 23% live birth rate as opposed to a 4% rate in the control group," explains Shulman, who recently published the results of the study in *AYALA*, the journal of the Israeli Fertility Association. "More than that, of the pregnancies in the DHEA group, all but one ended in healthy deliveries."

DHEA, for 5-Dehydroepiandrosterone (5-DHEA), plays an important biological role in humans and other mammals. Produced in the adrenal glands, it is also synthesized in the brain.



"Dirty Jew" in Manhattan



Most Jihadis Are Nitwits

They blow each other up by mistake. They bungle even simple schemes. Our terrorist enemies trade on the perception that they're well trained and religiously devout, but in fact, many are fools and perverts who are far less organized and sophisticated than we imagine. Their leaders and recruiters can be lethally subtle and manipulative, but the quiet truth is that many of the deluded foot soldiers are foolish and untrained. perhaps even untrainable. Acknowledging this fact could help us tailor our counterterrorism priorities—and publicizing it could help us erode the powerful images of strength and piety that terrorists rely on for recruiting and funding.

Nowhere is the gap between sinister stereo-type and ridiculous reality more apparent than




in Afghanistan, where it's fair to say that the Taliban employ the world's worst suicide bombers: one in two manages to kill only himself. In Afghanistan, as in many cultures, a manly embrace is a time-honored tradition for warriors before they go off to face death. Thus, many suicide bombers never even make it out of their training camp or safe house, as the pressure from these group hugs triggers the explosives in suicide vests.

Many Taliban operatives are just as clumsy when suicide is not part of the plan. In November 2009, several talibs transporting an improvised explosive device were killed when it went off unexpectedly. The blast also took out the insurgents' own shadow governor in the province of Balkh. If our terrorist enemies have been successful at cultivating a false notion of expertise. they've done an equally convincing job of casting themselves as pious warriors of God. The Taliban and al-Qaeda rely on sympathizers who consider them devoted Muslims fighting immoral Western occupiers. But intelligence picked up by Predator drones and other battlefield cameras challenges that idea sometimes rather graphically. One video, captured recently by the thermal-imagery technology housed in a sniper rifle, shows two talibs in southern Afghanistan engaged in intimate relations with a donkey. Similar videos abound, including ground-surveillance footage that records a Taliban fighter gratifying himself with a cow.

Pentagon officials and intelligence analysts concede privately that our foes also have a voracious appetite for pornography—hardly shocking behavior for young men, but hard to square with an image of piety. [see related stories *Pakistan #1 In Pornography Web Searches* and *Brains Not Required For Jihad* at www.levitt.com/news]

Tawdry though this predilection for porn may be, it is not necessarily trivial. There is, after all, potential propaganda value in this kind of jihadist behavior. Current U.S. public diplomacy centers on selling America to the Muslim world, but we should also work to undermine some of the myths built up around our enemies by highlighting their incompetence, their moral failings, and their embarrassing antics. Beyond changing how the Muslim world perceives terrorists, we can help ourselves make smarter counterterrorism choices by being more realistic about the profile and aptitude of would-be attackers.



The World's Oldest Hatred By Rabbi Shmuley Boteach, shmuley.com

Hatred of Israel is just another manifestation of the world's oldest hatred.

Why else would British academics ban their Israeli counterparts and not, say, the Chinese whose human rights abuses and slaughter of innocent civilians at Tiananmen Square took place before the whole world? The Turks bomb Kurdish independence fighters on a regular basis and continue to deny their genocide of more than a million helpless Armenians. Yet their condemnation of Israel over the Gaza flotilla gains international currency. Hugo Chavez brutally dismantles Venezuelan democracy, imprisons his political opponents, locks up judges, and persecutes a free press that criticizes him. But his condemning Israel as genocidal is lauded by countries throughout the world. And the UN censures Israel on a monthly basis while countries like Libya sit on its Human Rights Council. If that isn't rank anti-Semitism, then the word has no meaning.

Like any moral democracy fighting for its very life, Israel is going to make mistakes. But compared to Hamas, Hezbollah, Syria, Iran, Saudi Arabia, and so many other of its neighbors, it is positively angelic. Disagree? Well, rather than engage in useless and endless debate, let's employ John F. Kennedy's famous argument delivered in the summer of 1963 in his memorable "Ich Bin Ein Berliner" speech. Kennedy addressed the two world systems that were in mortal conflict, Capitalism and Communism. Two world systems each claiming to be righteous and asserting the other to be evil. How to adjudicate between them? Kennedy did so with memorable eloquence: "Freedom has many difficulties and democracy is not perfect, but we have never had to put a wall up to keep our people in, to prevent them from leaving us."

I say the same thing to you. If Israel really is so terrible, if its government is so evil, then let's put it to the Kennedy test. If all of Israel's most rabid critics were forced to choose to live either in Israel or under Hamas in Gaza, or under Assad in Syria, or under Ahmadinejad in Iran, or under Abdullah in Saudi Arabia, or even in Communist China, which would they choose? In Israel, they would have the freedom to mercilessly assail their government on the radio, in print, and in public squares. In any of these other countries they would be locked up or killed midway through their inaugural speech. In Israel, if they were female they would enjoy absolutely full rights and equal protection under the law. In Iran or Saudi Arabia, they would be severely punished for not adhering to a certain dress code.

Yet it is Israel which the world hates. Go figure.

Or perhaps there is no need. This kind of hatred has a long and cruel precedent. It comes in many guises. Today it targets Israel but at its root, it's just good oldfashioned, unbridled, unapologetic Jewhatred. Ecclesiastes had it right. There is nothing new under the sun.



Conflict In The Koran By William Kilpatrick, FrontPageMag.com

Every now and then you hear calls from critics of Islam for Islam to reform itself -for mosques and *madrassas* (schools) to teach against the Islamic doctrines that inspire terrorists. A dramatic example of this demand occurs in the film Fitna when filmmaker Geert Wilders invites Muslims to tear the offending pages out of the Koran. In one scene you can hear the sound of tearing pages in the background.

If thy page offend thee, pluck it out?

The only trouble with this sort of recommendation is that it assumes that there is enough positive material in the Koran and other foundational documents to form the basis for a reformation. But is there?

According to Moorthy Muthuswamy, an expert on political Islam, "61 percent of the Koran talks ill of unbelievers or calls for their violent conquest and subjugation, but only 2.6 percent talks about the overall good of humanity." Hmmm. Seems as though that would amount to an awful lot of offending pages.

It's a similar story when you turn to the sira, the biographies of Mohammed. Take the earliest of these, the one written by Ibn Ishaq. Of the 130 short chapters

which detail the life of Mohammed after his arrival in Medina, over 70 are about raids, battles, and assassinations or else they are about preparations for raids and battles, division of spoils, odes upon battles, names of those who fought, etc. According to a content analysis done by Bill Warner of the Center for the Study of Political Islam, at least 75% of the sira is about jihad. These are inconvenient facts for those who hope Islam can be reformed. No matter how reform-minded you may be, it is difficult to come up with a symbolic interpretation of the Koran's numerous calls to make war on unbelievers, since that was literally what Mohammed did.

So, rather than encourage Muslims to remove the violent and hateful parts of the Koran, it might make more sense to encourage them to renounce it in toto. The "good" parts of the Koran are so bound up with the "bad" parts that trying to separate them is an impossible task. Besides, there is no warrant in Islamic tradition for picking and choosing. Islamic authorities say that the Koran given to Mohammed is a replica of the original which is inscribed on "imperishable" tablets in heaven. And, just for the record, "imperishable" beats "set in stone" by a wide margin. Talking of reforming Islam by re-interpreting the Koran is like talking about reforming a marble statue. Some things don't lend themselves to reformation.





Iranian Fighter Turned U.S. Spy: Tehran Will Attack Israel

A former fighter in Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) turned U.S. spy offered a rare glance into one of the most complex countries in the Middle East.

During a conference held at The Washington Institute for Near East Policy, Reza Kahlili (pseudonym) predicted that Iran will eventually attack Israel, Europe, and the Persian Gulf states. He called for a preemptive strike on the regime in Tehran, but not on the Iranian people or the country's infrastructure.

Kahlili accused the Obama Administration of being naïve. According to him, the American overtures are viewed by the Iranian regime as a sign of weakness, while the Iranian people consider the efforts to engage the regime an act of betrayal against their struggle for freedom. "This is a messianic regime. There should be no doubt—they are going to commit the most horrendous suicide bombing in human history. They will attack Israel, European capitals, and (the) Persian Gulf region at the same time," said Kahlili in one of his first public appearances to promote his new book.

Kahlili said he joined the Revolutionary Guard following the Islamic revolution of 1979, but volunteered to work for the CIA when he became disillusioned with the Khomeini regime after witnessing acts of rape, torture, and murder. Kahlili arrived at the conference wearing a surgical mask, sunglasses, and a baseball cap to conceal his identity. Out of concern for his safety, as well as that of his family inside Iran, his voice was also disguised.

For 10 years, under the code name "Wally," he relayed the secret operations of the IRGC back to American intelligence, eventually fleeing to the United States. In the aftermath of 9/11, Kahlili re-established contact with his sources in Iran and resumed providing information to the CIA, according to the Washington Institute.

Turning Back to God

The theme of the Jewish High Holidays is *teshuvah*, a word often translated as "repentance," though it's more accurately understood as turning back *(shuv)* to God. In Modern Hebrew *teshuvah* means an "answer" to a *shelah*, or a question. God's love for us is the question, and our *teshuvah*—our turning of the heart toward Him—is the answer. *Teshuvah* is one of the great gifts God gives each of us—the ability to turn back to Him and seek healing for our brokenness.

Psalm 51 is sometimes called *"Perek Teshuvah"*—the great Chapter of Repentance of the Scriptures. After King David was confronted with the truth of his crimes and the prospect of judgment, he returned to God for cleansing and forgiveness. David's *teshuvah* reveals that we also can return to God on the basis of His abundant compassion—His *rachamim*. Without God's love we have no hope for the future.

After the Jews had committed the grievous sin with the golden calf, Moses despaired of ever being able to find favor in God's eyes again. God, however, called Moses to return to the mountain to learn the meaning of the Name YHVH. While he waited in the cleft of the rock, Moses heard the Divine Voice saying, "The LORD, the LORD God, merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" (Exod. 34:6). This was David's experience of return, too. Given his great transgressions of the Torah, he was sure that he had lost God's favor. David needed to rediscover God's love despite his brokenness and sin.

The greatest demonstration of the compassion of God was given at Mount Moriah, the place of the sacrifice of Yeshua. Just as Moses and David had to confront their own brokenness to hear the Divine Voice, so we need to turn to the cross to hear the cries of YHVH suffering for our own. At the cross we find compassion and healing for our brokenness and sin.

During this season of *teshuvah*, may we once again respond to the Voice of God's love.





Home Ownership vs. Renting



This article is largely excerpted from David Leonhardt's *In Sour Home Market, Buying Often Beats Renting.*

In much of the country, for much of the last decade, renting a home instead of buying would have saved you thousands of dollars a year. In many markets, today's buyers are effectively betting that prices will rise enough to cover the difference.

Data from Moody's **Economy.com** and real estate agents can't foretell whether buying or renting is financially smarter. But the data can show whether a buyer will need a big jump in future prices to cover all the costs of owning—down payment, closing costs, property taxes, mortgage interest, repairs, and association fees.

A simple way to compare is to look at something called the rent ratio: the purchase price of a house divided by the annual cost of renting a similar one. The number 20 provides a useful rule of thumb: a ratio above 20 means you should at least consider renting, especially if you may move again in the next five years or so. When the ratio is well below 20, the case for buying becomes a lot stronger.*

In many large metropolitan areas, the average ratio is now 16 or lower. It was more than 25 in several of these places at the peak of the bubble, about five years ago. With a ratio as low as 16 and low interest rates, the costs of owning can be less than the costs of renting —and buyers will end up worse off only if prices fall considerably more. But ratios of 25 or 30 may indicate a bubble. Owning a home brings benefits that are not strictly financial, such as stability and comfort. A family confident that it will stay put for a decade or more may be wise to buy today. Sometimes, however, the advantages of homeownership are exaggerated and renting does not get enough respect.

Business columnist Scott Burns offers three situations in which renting is probably better than owning:

Young and mobile. If you are young and likely to change jobs and locations in the near future, owning a house doesn't make sense, because the transaction costs for buying and selling are likely to wipe out any gains you might make from price appreciation.

Older and short in both income and savings. Many couples celebrate their last tuition payment by buying a larger, more expensive house, reducing their ability to save and invest in the years when it is easiest. That's the opposite of what they should be doing.

Others discover that their home equity is the bulk of their net worth. By downsizing or becoming renters, they can reduce their cost of shelter and have a more secure retirement.

People who live in cities where owning costs much more than renting. Sometimes the cost of owning is wildly higher than the cost of renting comparable shelter.

Rather than indicate the better option for you or someone you know, this article may inspire some prayerful research.

When To Write God, G-d.





Neither the *Levitt Letter* nor *Israel Today*—both Messianic publications—writes God omitting the "o" and substituting a hyphen—G-d. But I receive emails using "G-d" from Jewish bloggers and from Jews who believe in Jesus. The way Tamar Yonah from Arutz Sheva—Israel National Radio explained it to me, Jews (Messianic or not) drop the "o" in God because an email with His name can be deleted, or if printed out, can be destroyed later on. Therefore, they avoid the full spelling so as not to use God's name in vain.

Out of respect for Jewish sensitivities, I also spell God with a dash when corresponding with Jews. In my opinion, there is no harm done to my faith since Jews or gentiles, Judaists and Christians both worship the same God of the Torah. And Jesus, after all, came to fulfill the Old Testament, not to annul it as some Christians want to believe. We can read this in Hebrews, chapter 11. My wife equates my use of G-d with political correctness because I'm sensitive to Jewish beliefs. But then Jews also use *Hashem* to refer to God, which goes back to Jews not wanting to utter God's name because of His holiness, so they simply call Him "The Name."

After I explained my reasons to one couple, they merely said that they would like to hear someone say "God" without the "o." What is your opinion of my writing G-d in this particular way?


Mentioned Or Not?

What Counts As Propaganda Against Israel?

A secret admirer, perhaps a critic, has sent me a gift subscription to TIME magazine. I leaf through its pages and stop at the two-page layout of "The World," which displays Israel as one of ten world hot spots this week. Israel's "easing of the Gaza blockade" merits 176 words and comprises a column which is 5 1/2 inches by 2 1/2 inches. By contrast, China's "easing" of its financial currency restrictions (which may have major world repercussions) merits only 89 words; the refugee crisis in Kyrgyzstan that has displaced 400,000 ethnic Uzbeks merits only 82 words and a photo.

Am I crazy, counting words? Not really. Propaganda works word by word when it is repeated day after day, year after year. The aim of such propaganda is to render Israel a pariah among nations—so that proposals for its elimination will seem reasonable and will achieve as welcome a reception as have the narratives about Israel murdering little Mohammed Al-Dura, committing a massacre in Jenin, harvesting Palestinian organs, or attacking non-violent humanitarians on a boat. We also understand how propaganda fulfills its mission by counting, literally, how many words


are being used to focus attention on one subject, one special country. Obsessive attention versus benign neglect is also a propaganda tool.

But, some might argue that *TIME's* editors chose Israel for praise, not blame: they viewed Israel's "easing" of the "controversial" Gaza blockade as a positive accomplishment. On the other hand, *TIME* ties this "easing" to "the Israeli raid on an aid flotilla which killed nine and drew international condemnation."

In other words: Lean on the Jew. It works. The fact that the "aid flotilla" bore hired assassins, *shahids;* that the so-called humanitarians knew they were aiding Hamas, an organization deemed a "terrorist" group by the United States; and that Israeli soldiers killed them in self-defense, is not acknowledged here as a contending counter-narrative.

Thus, all the other areas and issues chosen by *TIME*—severe Brazilian floods that left thousands homeless, the rather serious Uzbek refugee crisis, the sentencing of Somali pirates in Holland, the violence that continues, unabated, in Mugabe's Zimbabwe over the "blood diamonds," the "loosening" of China's currency restrictions, the arrest of a major drug lord, etc deserve fewer words.

Finally, guess which country is shown in the #1 position on *TIME's* map of the world? Tiny Israel, of course.



Why Islam Will Never Accept the State of Israel By Steven Simpson, AmericanThinker.com

The "Arab-Israeli conflict" is more "Muslim-Jewish" than "Arab-Israeli." In other words, the conflict is based on religion—Islam vs. Judaism—cloaked in Arab nationalism vs. Zionism. In every Arab-Israeli war, from 1948 to the present, cries of "jihad," "Allahu Akbar," and "Idbah al-Yahud" ("slaughter the Jews") have resonated amongst even the most secular of Arab leaders.

Until the founder of Islam, Mohammed ibn Abdallah, proclaimed himself "Messenger of Allah" in the 7th century, Jews and Arabs lived together peacefully in the Arabian Peninsula.

The Koran is full of verses that can be described only as virulently anti-Semitic. The suras are too numerous to cite, but a couple will suffice: sura 4:47 (Jews have distorted the Bible and have incurred condemnation from Allah for breaking the Sabbath) and 5:82 (Jews and pagans are the strongest in enmity to the Muslims and Allah). And of course, there is the genocidal hadith (saying of Mohammed) from Sahih Bukhari, 4:52:177, that would make Adolf Hitler proud: "The Day of Judgment will not have come until you fight with the Jews, and the stones and the trees behind which a Jew will be hiding will say: 'O Muslim! There is a Jew hiding behind me, come and kill him!"' Thus, the Arab Muslims had their own "final solution" in store for the Jews already in the 7th century.

The fact that Muslims still point to the many hateful verses in the Koran and hadiths should give Jews—not just Israelis—pause to consider if there can ever be true peace between Muslims and Jews, or between Muslims and Israel. When the armies of Islam occupied the area of Byzantine "Palestine" in the 7th century, the land became part of *Dar al-Islam* (House of Islam). Until that area is returned to Islam, (i.e., Israel's extermination), it remains part of *Dar al-harb* (House of War). It now becomes clear that this is a conflict of religious ideology and not a conflict over a piece of "real estate."

Finally, one must ask the question: Aside from non-Arab Turkey, whose relations with Israel are presently teetering on the verge of collapse, why has no other non-Arab Muslim country ever had full relations (if any at all) with Israel? The answer is painfully clear: The contempt in which the Koran and other Islamic writings hold Jews does not exist in the scriptures of the Hindus. Sikhs. Buddhists. and other Eastern religions. Therefore, people who come from non-Muslim states do not have this inherent hatred towards Jews, and by extension, towards Israel, But when a people is raised with a scripture that regards another people and religion as immoral and less than human, then it is obvious why such hatred and disdain exists on the part of Muslims for Jews and Israel.



Islam—as currently interpreted and practiced —cannot accept a Jewish state of any size in its midst. Unless Muslims come to terms with their holy writings vis-à-vis Jews, Judaism, and Israel and go through some sort of "reformation," it will be unlikely that true peace will ever come to the Middle East. In the meantime, unless Islam reforms, Israel should accept the fact that the Muslims will never accept Israel as a permanent fact in the Middle East.

Israeli Science Spice Up Pain Management

An Israeli researcher has discovered that the property that makes chili peppers hot could be used to stop pain. What people fear most about any medical procedure is not the operation itself but the pain that goes with it. But anesthesia has its drawbacks with side effects like loss of consciousness, wooziness, and numbness.

"The holy grail of any local anesthetic treatment is to stop pain without causing any other effects," says **Dr. Alexander Binshtok** of Tel Aviv University's Sackler School of Medicine. That noble goal may now be within reach with a new approach based on the common chili pepper.



Chili is credited with a variety of healing properties, such as easing the digestive system and clearing congestion. But by joining capsaicin, the substance that makes chili hot, with QX-314, a chemical derivative of the common local anesthetic lidocaine, Binshtok and his colleagues are able to target selective pain fibers and effectively block the pain—without any side effects.

The new approach has the potential to change multiple applications of local anesthesia, from the dental office to the delivery room. Epidurals are one example of a pain management technique that will be revolutionized by this red-hot medication.

Epidural anesthesia compromises body function to the point where a woman cannot walk and her ability to "push" during labor is limited. With the new pain drug, she will be able to do both painlessly, says Binshtok, thus elimiBy Edmund Sanders www.lsrael21c.org



nating the need for an epidural.

Then there is the problem of the pain suffered by millions of Americans with chronic inflammatory diseases, neurogenic diseases, or cancer. "Many people suffer from chronic pain but we don't understand why," says Binshtok. "Nobody knows what turns normal or protective pain to chronic or non-protective pain, and we don't yet understand the agents or molecules that turn normal into chronic pain."

Binshtok explains that some lucky people carry a specific genetic variance that makes them more resistant not only to pain but to the development of chronic pain after surgery. Understanding this mechanism could be the key to solving pain problems.

As a postgraduate student, Binshtok was part of the research team from Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) and Harvard Medical School (HMS) that succeeded in selectively blocking pain-sensing neurons in rats without interfering with other types of neurons, giving hope that someday there will be an anesthetic that blocks pain but doesn't paralyze or numb the patient.

This fall, Binshtok will be directing his own pain management lab at Tel Aviv University. His work will study what happens on the periphery when painful stimuli attack the skin, and will attempt to understand "how the process is analyzed by pain fibers, and then how it is processed by the neurons in the spinal cord" which modify pain signals.

And while he warns that there is still more testing and research to be done before a "magic bullet" miracle drug is produced, he is confident that it will come.

Islam Forbids Playing Music By Laura Clark

Muslim pupils in Britain are being withdrawn from music lessons because some families believe learning an instrument is anti-Islamic. The move comes despite the subject being a compulsory part of the national curriculum. While parents have legal rights to withdraw children from religious and sex education classes, no automatic right exists to pull them out of lessons such as music.

One education expert said up to half of Muslim pupils were withdrawn from music lessons during Ramadan. And The Muslim Council of Britain said music lessons were likely to be unacceptable to around ten percent of the Muslim population in Britain.

However, in certain branches of Islam —such as Sufism, which is dominant in Pakistan and India—devotional music and singing is actually central to the religion. But some Muslims believe that playing musical instruments and singing is forbidden according to Islam. At Herbert Morrison Primary in Lambeth, 29 percent of children come from mainly Somalian Muslim families. Headmistress Eileen Ross said some parents "don't want children to play musical instruments and they don't have music in their homes."

"It's not part of their belief, they feel it detracts from their faith." Office for Standards in Education (OFSTED) and education experts raised concerns over the findings.

The Open University's Dr. Diana Harris, an expert on music education and Muslims, said she had visited schools where half of the pupils were withdrawn from music lessons by their parents during Ramadan. "Most of them really didn't know why they were withdrawing their children," she said. "The majority of them were doing it because they had just learned that it wasn't acceptable and one of the sources giving out that feeling was the Imams."

A spokesman for OFSTED said: "Music is an important part of any child or young person's education. Any examples of pupils being treated unequally would be a matter of significant concern."

A Novel Dutch Idea To Fight The Rising Anti-Semitism

Reports of increased anti-Semitism and a secret video showing Jews harassed on the street in Amsterdam have prompted Dutch authorities to consider using "decoy Jews"—undercover officers wearing yarmulkes—to combat hate crimes.

No decision has yet been made to use the tactic. But the country's justice minister and Amsterdam's acting mayor both say they are considering it. And advocacy groups say intimidation has become a serious issue for Jews in the Netherlands.

"For ten years now, Jews who are recognizable as such from their clothing can't walk peacefully on the street," the Center for Information and Documentation Israel, a Jewish activist group, said in a statement recently. "The perpetrators of this kind of incident almost always get away unpunished."

Amsterdam's acting mayor, Lodewijk Asscher, has also said he would consider the idea of using decoy Jews and other "unorthodox methods" to combat racism. However, his spokeswoman, Tessel Schouten, said the city doesn't yet have specific plans to do so.

Presbyterians Still One-Sided On Israel

How many sour notes does it take to render a piece of music impossible to listen to? While there may be no scientific answer, reasonable people can agree that playing too many ruins the tune. Such is the case with a report overwhelmingly adopted by the Presbyterian Church (USA) at its recent biennial General Assembly held in Minneapolis.

While removing some horrendous anti-Israel and anti-Jewish language from a 172-page report called "Breaking Down the Walls," significant one-sided anti-Israel bias remains.

Presbyterian Church representatives voted by a 4-1 margin (558-119) to adopt the report, which most disturbingly calls for withholding U.S. aid as a means to pressure Israel to make peace and cease settlement activity. Those who argue that the Church merely reaffirmed a longtime position are missing the point. Singling out Israel has always been insidious, particularly in today's environment where Israel is the target of well-orchestrated campaigns that question its legitimacy.

Thanks and appreciation must be given to the many courageous Presbyterian leaders across the country who volunteered their time and resources to alert and educate their fellow Presbyterians about the horrendously bigoted, unfair, and unbalanced anti-Israel provisions being proposed as Church policy. We must remain vigilant and work harder to remove the continuing anti-Israel bias from Church policies. Until then, the Presbyterian policy on the Middle East is simply painfully discordant.

"In designing these hairstyles, we have not tried to go backward. On the contrary, we have tried to make our designs a mixture of our traditions and Iranian culture, as well as the latest fashions, and by doing so confront

It Didn't Begin With The Holocaust

Over sixty-five years ago, Nazism massacred six million Jews in Europe. But anti-Semitism didn't begin with Adolf Hitler. Jew-hatred has been an affliction of Western civilization since the Roman historian Tacitus maligned the Israelites in the first century A.D.

In 1267 in Vienna, the Catholic Council decreed that all Jews had to wear *pileum cornutum* or horned hats, so the public could identify them as offspring of the devil. And half a century earlier the Council of Paris forbade Christian midwives to attend Jewish women—who they proclaimed, were bringing the brood of the devil into the world.

The Archbishop of Canterbury closed every synagogue in his diocese in 1282, and eight years later King Edward I expelled the remaining 17,000 Jews from England and stole their property. They fled to Europe, but most were thrown into the sea by order of the ships' captains.

In Russia in the mid-nineteenth and early twentieth century, Jews were routinely tortured and put on trial for alleged blood-drinking. Later, they were burned alive in pogroms, as the public were warned to hide their children from the vampire Jews who sought to kidnap them and drink their blood at Passover.

Throughout history Jews have been referred to as dogs. When Martin Luther designed his eight-point plan to rid the world of Jews in 1543, he demanded, "They must be driven from our country" and "we must drive them out like mad dogs."

In the mid-nineteenth century, leading French writer, Leon Bloy wrote, "It is impossible to earn the esteem of a dog if one does not feel an instinctive disgust for the synagogue." And in 1871, Pope Pius IX said in reference to Jews, "of these dogs, there are too many of them at present in Rome, and we hear them howling in the streets, and they are disturbing us in all places."

Nor did the massacre of Jews cease with the defeat of Nazism in the Second World War. The Kielce Pogrom in Poland, in 1946, saw Jewish Holocaust survivors being lured out of their homes by neighbors who spent five hours publicly murdering them in cold blood as the local government and church stood silently by. This event—almost two years after the Holocaust—resulted in tens of thousands of Jews fleeing Poland.

Dagobert Runes, in 1968, stated that Jews have been persecuted through vampire trials and Black Death accusations, through the Count Rindfleisch campaign (146 Jewish communities were exterminated in six months), the Hussite wars (almost the entire Jewish population of Prague perished) and the Chimielnicki bloodbath (a brutal Cossack who massacred lews), the Russian pogroms, Romanian barbarism, and the Nazi Holocaust. Prior to Nazism, he stated. Jews were burned alive. At least, he said, Hitler gassed his victims before he burned them. 1

Israelis are among the first to cross the world to help others as an expression of their values, the need to help the oppressed, and not to stand idle while others are in trouble. Let's look behind the scenes at Hadassah staff who participate in this proud Israeli mission.

Dr. Revital Hivert was supervising students at the Hadassah-Hebrew University School of Dentistry when the phone call from the Israel Police urged her to go home and pack for Haiti. "I packed T-shirts, jeans, and sneakers," said Dr. Hivert. "Only at the briefing at Ben Gurion Airport did I realize there would be group showers, and asked my son to drop off my bathing suit."

Unlike the other 44 doctors in the Israeli mission, Hivert was recruited to attend to the dead. For the past decade she has volunteered for the police unit which identifies the dead from their dental records.



"Our first request came from Holland. Several couples had come to Haiti to adopt children, and the hotel where the new families were staying had collapsed."

She was able to identify the parents from dental records, and the children, who had no dental records, with chest X-rays in their adopting files. How did she cope? "One of my teachers said that just as you have to wear protective clothing and gloves, you have to create a protective covering for your heart, or you'll never be able to think. So many lives are touched by this work that I have no choice but to overcome my feelings."

In Haiti, she was called away from her sacred if grisly task by the doctors tending the living. A nine-year-old girl was brought in with a jaw so shattered that she couldn't eat. Lethal infection was already spreading. The IDF field hospital had brought no maxillofacial surgeons in the airlift. The closest specialist was military physician Dr. Haim Lavon, whose training is in ear, nose, throat, and neck surgery. Lavon was ready to operate, but he was unsure how to realign the teeth. Together, Lavon and Hivert became a medical duo, removing infected bone, making sure not to sacrifice permanent teeth. Said Lavon, "You can imagine how joyous we felt when later in the day this little girl started to eat."

"Being in Haiti was about Zionism, being part of an Israeli team with ultimate support for each other, and dedication to the task," she said. "On a personal level, there's also a satisfaction that I was able to land on a grass field in a foreign country, and to function at a high professional level. And, for me, there was also that feeling that as a woman I was able to cope with the toughest and be a living representative of our Hadassah values."

A special moment took place Friday night, while they were waiting for the equipment to arrive via Florida. "We sat on our sleeping bags in the field as the sun set. The El Al crew had given us all the little in-flight wine bottles, so the rabbi made *kiddush* (traditional blessing and prayer recited over wine on the eve of the Sabbath). And we all sang. It was a supreme spiritual moment."
