# Netanyahu Puts Arab-Israeli Conflict In Proper Perspective

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu took part in a global interview on YouTube recently, with questions for the Israeli leader coming in from around the world, including countries like Saudi Arabia and Iran. (see p. 2)

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ISRAELI PRIME MINISTER BENJAMIN NETANYAHU AND HIS CABINET. A UN-appointed expert panel investigated the Gaza war between Israel and Hamas in the winter of 2008-2009 and alleged that Israel deliberately targeted civilians. Richard Goldstone, the head of the panel, now says in a Washington Post newspaper article that his conclusions should have been different. Netanyahu has called for the Goldstone Report to be formally nullified. (See article on p. 3)

The top questions—which were voted on by YouTube viewers—were asked by a popular Israeli television journalist. The short interview was posted to You-Tube as part of the "World Views" series.

In one of the questions, Netanyahu was asked if he thought the decision to build a few hundred more Jewish housing units in Judea and Samaria in response to the March 11 massacre of a Jewish family in the area would harm chances for peace with the Palestinians.

The Palestinians claim all of Judea and Samaria as theirs, and insist they will not conclude a peace deal with Israel until Jews stop building there.


Netanyahu's answer highlighted how the world is playing right into Islam's hands by misrepresenting the conflict and ignoring its historic context.

The Israeli leader insisted that the international community must stop looking at Jewish houses as being any different from Arab houses in Judea and Samaria since the territory is "disputed land—we have a historical connection to it."

For decades, the world has parroted the Arab line that Judea and Samaria are "occupied territories" to which the Jews have no real connection.

Netanyahu disagreed.

"My name is Benjamin; the first Benjamin, the son of Jacob, walked these hills 4,000 years



Many Israelis have for years been frustrated by their government's compliance with the Arab narrative regarding the land and its history.

By going along with the "occupation" theme, previous Israeli leaders have all but accepted the notion that Jews do not belong there. And if they do not belong in Judea, Samaria, and Jerusalem, then they certainly don't belong in Tel Aviv.

Netanyahu also sought to remind the world that the exaggerated and artificially-perpetuated Palestinian refugee issue has a Jewish parallel that is typically ignored.

"Everyone knows we can't kick out 350,000 or 400,000 Jews from their homes [in Judea and Samaria]," said Netanyahu, noting that "many of them, by the way, were kicked out [of their homes in Arab countries] by hostile Arab armies before the founding of Israel."

The difference between the Palestinian and Jewish refugee issues is that Israel fully absorbed and integrated the Jewish refugees that fled here. The Arabs have worked hard to maintain the Palestinians' "refugee" status and condition as a political weapon against Israel.

#### UN's Anti-Israel Bigotry Exposed

Israel has reacted with a sense of vindication since South African Judge Richard Goldstone retracted accusations of Israeli war crimes during its war with Hamas in Gaza two years ago.

Mr. Goldstone, who headed a panel of the United Nations Human Rights Council that made the accusations in more than 500 pages' worth of reports in 2009, wrote in a Washington Post opinion piece published in April that Israeli inquiries into the reports' allegations have made it clear that its army didn't intentionally target Gaza civilians. He shifted criticism to the militant Islamist group Hamas for "heinous" acts of shooting rockets at Israeli cities and for refusing to investigate itself.

The Goldstone report was widely seen in Israel as unjust and aimed at isolating the Jewish state as a pariah while negating its right to defend itself from rocket attacks. And although Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called on the United Nations to consign the report to the "dustbin of history," it isn't likely to be forgotten any time soon.

Palestinians, who had encouraged the UN to refer the report to its judicial arm, accused Goldstone of caving in to pro-Israel pressure over the report. Israeli commentators, meanwhile, called the South African justice's article a "PR coup" and an "earthquake."

"The most serious accusation was that Israel deliberately killed Palestinian civilians," said Dore Gold, a former Israeli United Nations Ambassador who debated Goldstone in 2009. "It was like a blood libel for the Israel Defense Forces, and contributed directly to the global effort to delegitimize the Jewish state. This is an important turning point."

While Israeli officials rushed to claim victory, analysts expressed doubt it would spur any greater sympathy for Israel by the international community in a future conflict.

"It's more of a moral triumph than something that changes the relations between Israel and the UN or between Israel and the international community," said Shmuel Rosner, an Israeli columnist for *The Jerusalem Post*. "The United Nations is a body with an instinctive tendency to investigate Israel and to blame Israel, and I don't think that that tendency will be different because of [Goldstone's] change of heart."

# When God Closes One Door He Opens Another


Dear Friends,

to Jordan in 19th-Century Photography (on view until September 12, 2011), it comprises early photographs of the Holy Land from the mid to late 1800s. The picture (right) entitled "Tourists camped outside Jerusalem" and dated 1868 is by Felix Bonfils and shows the contrast of Israel then and now (below). How much Israel has grown with new architecture, more people, agriculture, and industry! From dusty and backward to forward and modern. God has truly blessed Israel!

Being a tourist in Israel today is certainly different from the 1860s. Then, most pilgrims camped out in tents. Today, luxury hotels are everywhere. The old joke in our family was that camping out meant no room service. Today, Israeli accommodations offer the comforts of concierge and room service, Wi-Fi, cable TV-in short, everything we could want or need. Today as yesterday, we walk around to view the sights, but we ride in wonderful air-conditioned buses. not on horses and donkeys, to get from one location to another.

I first pictured Israel in my imagination as I read the Bible. I knew what I thought Israel would look like: Being from Texas, I pictured Israel big, Texas BIG. It is not. The whole length of Israel is 290 miles and 85 miles at its widest point. To put it in U.S. perspective, it is about the distance from San Francisco to Santa Barbara, from Dallas to San Antonio, or the size of New Jersey. But, those miles contain thousands of years of history. Bethlehem is a ten-minute ride from Jerusalem. The Dead Sea is

less than an hour, and the Galilee is about two hours from Jerusalem. Travel in Israel is measured in hours, not miles or kilometers.

And the food... How different was dining then compared to now? Israel boasts many world-class restaurants. Our pilgrims will tell you of the sumptuous breakfasts each morning. In yesteryear, getting to Israel took weeks or months of sailing, caravanning, and camping. Today, a pilgrim can be in Israel within twenty-four hours by

> Tourists camped outside Jerusalem 1868 (by Felix Bonfils)




airplane from almost anywhere in the world. What kind of guides did the tourists have then? Knowledge has certainly increased. Our modern-day guides seem to know so much! Were their expectations met or exceeded when they saw the Temple Mount, the Sea of Galilee, the Garden Tomb? So many questions...



#### Springtime and Senior Citizens

The Krayot, our collection of towns hugging the Haifa Bay, features flat streets, making bicycle travel a breeze. One of these towns, Kiryat Yam, has Israel's second highest percentage of citizens over 65. So ubiquitous are they that I cannot step outside my house without seeing them cruising the neighborhood streets. At 63, I guess I'll be joining them soon.

I also commonly see personal caregivers, often internationals from the Philippines or Romania, assisting Israel's elderly to take a walk or sit on a park bench. Israel, with 11% of the population over 65 and one of the world's highest life expectancies (81), has an enlightened public policy of licensed non-medical home care. As part of the country's universal health care: "There are five levels of long-term

institutional care...two supervised and...the next three layers...for more severely disabled patients (which) are the responsibility of the Ministry of Health." The aged portion of our nation is expected to grow dramatically, nearly doubling by 2030.

Israel has a unique variety of origins among senior Israelis. Nearly all were born outside of Israel and



made *aliya* from over 100 countries. Hebrew is not their mother tongue. This makes it challenging but also fun to catch snatches of conversation in heavily accented

Hebrew or another language altogether. Among them are survivors of the Holocaust (32% of Israel's 65+) and veterans of the many wars fought to achieve and defend statehood. Although articles periodically describe the unmet needs of our aged, Israeli families tend to be highly connected to their parents, giving them quality attention into life's concluding stage.

This last attribute touches my own life. Part of the price for moving from the U.S. to Israel in 1992 was leaving my parents behind. They are now 94 and need a great deal of assistance. Visiting them recently, I got to serve them in the basic physical necessities. It gave me a tender opportunity to bless the mom and dad who lovingly raised me. In the Ten Commandments, "Honor **your father and your mother"** is the first commandment dealing with human relationships. Not only in Israel, but throughout the modern "me-first" world, we would do well to follow Leviticus 19:32: "Rise in the presence of the aged, show respect for the elderly, and revere your God."

# Honoring God's Promises

In 2002, a reader contacted the Christian Research Institute, founded by Hank Hanegraaff, to learn what they have to say about Zola Levitt Ministries. Below are excerpts from CRI's response.

"We commend Zola Levitt Ministries in their service to the Lord. They uphold the important teaching of the inerrancy of Scripture, as well as the important truth that Christ alone provides salvation for humanity. As a Christian ministry, they are primarily concerned with reaching the Jewish community, and Zola Levitt has also been helpful in portraying the significance of Jewish traditions for Christians.

"While we commend them with

regard to these tremendous aspects of their ministry, and accept Zola Levitt as a brother in Christ, we do not agree with their position that those who hold to 'covenant theology' (i.e., those who do not make the distinction between the Church and Israel) espouse a theological system that serves anti-Semitism and makes Scripture irrelevant.

"While Zola Levitt Ministries' beliefs are within the pale of Christian orthodoxy, we would purport that it is possible for orthodox Christians holding to 'covenant theology' to have a great love for the Jewish people, even though they do not place emphasis on their present ethnic status or the physical land of Israel as being significant in God's present dealings with humanity. We do not believe that one must give any ethnic group prominence in God's plan in order to show true Christian compassion and concern for them, and therefore would not agree that 'covenant theology' apparently serves anti-Semitism.

"Zola Levitt appears to criticize [several seminaries] for endorsing 'Progressive Dispensationalism,' rather than traditional dispensational theology. He insinuates people are in danger of compromising scriptural inerrancy when traditional dispensationalism is not affirmed.

"At CRI, we consider both 'dispensational theology' (including progressive dispensational theology) and 'covenant theology' to be within the pale of Christian orthodoxy...."

#### **ZOLA'S COMMENT**

The few footnotes on the letter from CRI indicate that the writer spent no more than a few minutes on our website www.levitt.com gathering information for this seemingly all-encompassing portrait of our 30-year-old ministry.

The CRI writer states that he believes it is "possible" for Christians of the "covenant" variety to have a "great love" for the Jewish people. This may well be possible, but how little we see it in practice! Once you begin to devalue the significance of the Chosen People, how can you have a "great love" for them? Once you disregard their "present ethnic status" (whatever that means), you cannot appreciate their past and future status, because the Jewish people and nation have always been the apple of God's eye... and they always have been Jewish!

God loved them and chose them and called them out and promised to them eternal blessings as a distinct people. In essence, one devalues the eternal promises of God by devaluing the objects of those promises. Not everyone holding to covenant theology may be anti-Semitic, but such beliefs provide an easy environment to foster this attitude, as most mainline Protestant denominations and the Catholics demonstrate by their pro-Palestinian, anti-Israel posturing.

#### **Meet Pastor Myles Weiss**

Greetings from the San Francisco Bay area—or as the Bible calls it, "the end of the Earth!" (Acts 1:8). God is alive and well here, despite rumors to the contrary. My wife, Katharine, and I reach for His reviving Spirit in the belief that He intends to awaken the Body of Believers here to His endtimes purposes.

Katharine and I have been blessed to participate in Gospel campaigns in India, Russia, and Africa. We lived in Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo, where I taught Bible and counseling to rising ministers. In addition to being an ordained pastor, I am a licensed psychotherapist. Our boys were young then; 10 and 7. They are now college age.

One of the most important pieces of the contemporary Kingdom puzzle is the role of Israel and its relationship to Believers worldwide. God redirected our ministry to place Israel at the center.

Confronted by a young man who impressed me with the need to pass on my Jewish heritage to my children,



we began observing *Shabbat* (Sabbath) and celebrating the feasts in our home. We called these meetings *Beth Shalom*, "the house of peace."

Amazing things happened in those early days. A 96-year-old Jewish "landsman" gave his life to Yeshua in my kitchen. #### **History Of Flag Day**

The Fourth of July was traditionally celebrated as America's birthday, but the idea of an annual day specifically celebrating the Flag is believed to have first originated in 1885. BJ Cigrand, a schoolteacher, arranged for the pupils in the Fredonia, Wisconsin Public School, District 6, to observe June 14 (the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes) as "Flag Birthday." In numerous magazine and newspaper articles and public addresses over the following years, Cigrand continued to enthusiastically advocate the observance of June 14 as "Flag Birthday," or "'Flag Day."

On June 14, 1889, George Balch, a kindergarten teacher in New York City, planned appropriate ceremonies for the children of his school, and his idea of observing Flag Day was later adopted by the State Board of Education of New York. On June 14, 1891, the Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia held a Flag Day celebration, and on June 14 of the following year, the New York Society of the Sons of the Revolution, celebrated Flag Day.

School by school and teacher by teacher sporadically observed the Flag's history on June 14 until in 1894, the American Flag Day Association was organized for the purpose of promoting the holding of Flag Day exercises.

Inspired by three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day—the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777—was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

#### **Raising Fish In The Desert**

"There are plenty of fish in the sea," the old saying goes—but that's not as true as it once was. In fact, says Dotan Bar-Noy, CEO of Israel's GFA (Grow Fish Anywhere) Advanced Systems, there are fewer fish in the sea with each passing year. "Overfishing is a much bigger problem than people realize, and in a few years, many species of saltwater fish are simply going to disappear if something isn't done."

Bar-Noy and 30 or so others—mostly engineers, marine biologists, and other technical folk—have found a solution to the diminishing numbers of fish in the sea. Based on the work of Israeli scientist Dr. Yossi Tal and Hebrew University professor Jaap van Rijn—inventor of the system—GFA has developed an on-land environment where fish can be raised, without having to exchange water or treat it chemically.

"We call this a zero-discharge system," Bar-Noy says. "We use biological filters and specially developed bacteria to treat the water the fish are growing in, without wasting anything. The system can be set up to raise saltwater fish anywhere in the world—even in the desert, thousands of miles from the ocean," he asserts.

Fish farms are nothing new. Still, they have problems of their own—mostly due to the need to circulate the water in the pools and tanks where the fish are raised. The fish waste, with its nitrogen and other elements concentrated in a relatively small area, renders the water that it's dumped into unin-

habitable for fish. As the tanks are generally located near the shore, in relatively shallow water, the wastewater tends to linger there. Nearby jurisdictions are liable to find a considerable number of fish floating bellyup in their bays

and harbors, having been poisoned by the high concentration of nitrogen and nutrients in the wastewater dumped from the tanks.

This problem is so serious that in some areas fish farms are banned, despite their being perhaps the only technologically feasible solution available to combat overfishing, says Bar-Noy. Alternative purification systems are based on electrical treatment systems which are expensive to install and run, and fish produced with those systems will cost far more than fish from the sea.

Because the GFA system uses cheap and easy-to-produce bacteria to cleanse fish tanks, the costs for raising the fish are fully competitive with those for raising fish from the sea, or other farms. "Fish from the sea are subject to the natural weather cycles of cold and heat, while farmed fish can be raised at a constant, ideal temperature. GFA fish have an even greater advantage, since the water they grow in is always fresh, making the fish taste better than fish from other sources."

"As populations grow, more countries look to fish as sources of protein," says Bar-Noy. "With our system, fish can be grown anywhere—even in the desert—with minimal environmental impact. This is about more than just growing fish," he adds. "This could help feed millions."



#### Palestinians <u>Still</u> Blaming Everyone Else

Although Hamas has been in full control of the Gaza Strip since 2007—and its security forces and militias have been employing an iron fist against any individual or group that defies the Islamist movement's authority—lately, Hamas has been trying to avoid responsibility for rocket and mortar attacks on Israel by claiming that other groups in the Gaza Strip were responsible.

If Hamas is now saying that it does not have control over other groups that are firing the rockets and mortars at Israel, then its leaders should resign and pave the way for a new regime. On a number of occasions, Hamas's armed wing, Izaddin al-Kassam, did take credit for firing some of the rockets and mortars. However, Hamas spokesmen continue to maintain that smaller and more radical groups like the Islamic Jihad were behind most of the recent attacks.

Hamas's line of defense—"It's not us, it's someone else"—is not unfamiliar to those who have been closely watching the situation in the Palestinian territories over the past two decades. For many years, Yasser Arafat used the same argument to explain why the territories under his control were being used as launching pads for


anyone who wanted to attack Israel.

At first, Arafat tried to evade responsibility by blaming other Palestinians for the terror attacks on Israel. Then, when the Israel Defense Forces took the initiative to halt terror assaults emanating from the West Bank and Gaza Strip, Arafat put the blame on Israel for "escalating tensions" and foiling his efforts to stop the attacks.

Arafat's successor, Mahmoud Abbas, appears to have endorsed the same policy of putting the blame on others. Abbas did too little, if anything, to stop the rocket and mortar attacks on Israel after he came to power in January 2005, although he had more than 35,000 armed policemen—trained and paid for by the U.S. and Europe—at his disposal in the Gaza Strip.

He too defended his failure to tackle the problem by first saying it was not his men who were firing the rockets and mortars and, second, blaming Israel whenever the IDF took action to stop the attacks.

In keeping with this policy, Abbas was quick recently to issue a statement condemning Israeli "aggression" after a rocket that was fired from the Gaza Strip hit a school bus, critically injuring an Israeli teenager. Instead of directly and clearly condemning the attack on the bus, Abbas urged Palestinian factions in the Gaza Strip "not to give Israel an excuse" to step up its military strikes.

I could share with you my money problems, but why burden you? I will say that \$5 to me is the difference between eating and going hungry. (Three days of the week, they feed us only two measly meals a day. \$5 is 12 Ramen soups for me.) I don't care how often you go hungry,

you never get used to it. However, you and what you do are important to me, so I'm going to tighten my belt and trust the Lord to provide (as He always does!).

#### Saudi Dissidents Gather Weekly

The men trickled into the gravel-filled courtyard in twos and threes. The 60 or so lawyers, doctors, academics, and clerics are the leading opposition voices in Saudi Arabia. Many have been imprisoned, some several times, often for seemingly mild acts of protest such as letters, petitions, and calls to foreign journalists.

Recent petitions to King Abdullah asking for fundamental reforms have drawn thousands of signatures, much to the former prisoners' pride and delight. But the activists also understand that the kind of popular rage churning Egypt or Bahrain doesn't exist in Saudi Arabia.

For years, the group has met Monday nights in this courtyard on Riyadh's eastern outskirts to discuss Saudi politics. Badr Mouzan, 39, a former police captain, has been in prison twice, the last time for three years, because of an alleged affiliation with a London-based critic of the Saudi regime. He said he wouldn't attend any demonstrations. But he had hopes for them.

Whatever change human rights activists and others would like to see in the kingdom—and even the harshest critics do not want to overthrow the monarchy—they are nearly unanimous in their assessment that popular dissatisfaction would not lead to big protests here.

Even without demonstrations, the ideas many at the gathering put forth in petitions and letters, such as calling for a constitutional monarchy or respecting the rights of detainees, are often punishable in the absolute monarchy of Saudi Arabia. The owner of the compound, Abdullah Hamid, a former professor of comparative literature, has been imprisoned six times, once



for voicing support of a demonstration by families of detainees, according to the United Nations.

"There is a whole spectrum of people here: Islamists, nationalists, even liberals," Hamid said. They are united, he said, by a request to Abdullah for a constitutional monarchy, an independent judiciary, and an end to corruption.

The men said they realize they are being watched when they gather, and that there are probably informers in their midst. "Once they arrest you, then you find out what's permissible or not," Mouzan said. Mouzan was freed six months ago.

Mohammed Bejadi, 31, landed in prison for contacting foreign journalists about a planned sit-in to demand the release of detainees. He sees how effective the Saudi authorities are. His Facebook page and that of many others is repeatedly blocked. Bejadi said he was held without charge in a filthy solitary confinement cell and denied visitors. Still, he said, he would take a risk. "Freedom starts in prison," he said.

# Possibly The Biggest Find Since The Dead Sea Scrolls

For scholars of faith and history, it is a treasure trove too precious for price.

This ancient collection of 70 tiny books, their lead pages bound with wire, could unlock some of the secrets of the earliest days of Christianity. Academics are divided as to their authenticity but say that if verified, they could prove as pivotal as the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls in 1947. (See p. 17)

On pages not much bigger than a credit card are images, symbols, and words that appear to refer to the Messiah and possibly even to the Crucifixion and Resurrection. Adding to the intrigue, many of the books are sealed, prompting academics to speculate they are actually the lost collection of codices mentioned in the Bible's Book of Revelation.

The books were discovered five years ago in a cave in a remote part of Jordan to which Christian refugees are known to have fled after the fall of Jerusalem in 70 AD. Important documents from the same period have previously been found there.

Initial metallurgical tests indicate that some of the books could date from the first century AD. This estimate is based on the form of corrosion which has taken place, which experts believe would be impossible to achieve artificially.

If the dating is verified, the books would be among the earliest Christian documents, predating the writings of the Apostle Paul. The prospect that they could contain contemporary accounts of the final years of Jesus' life has excited scholars—although their enthusiasm is tempered by the

fact that experts have previously been fooled by sophisticated fakes.

David Elkington, a British scholar of ancient religious history and archaeology, and one of the few to have examined the books, says they could be "the major discovery of Christian history."

After their discovery by a Jordanian Bedouin, the hoard was subsequently acquired by an Israeli Bedouin, who is said to have illegally smuggled them across the border into Israel, though he claims they have been in his family-for 100 years.



However, the Jordanian Government is now working at the highest levels to repatriate and safeguard the collection. Philip Davies, emeritus professor of biblical studies at Sheffield University, said there was powerful evidence that the books have a Christian origin in plates cast into a picture map of the holy city of Jerusalem.

Dr. Margaret Barker, a former president of the Society for Old Testament Study, said: "The Book of Revelation tells of a sealed book that was opened only by the Messiah. Other texts from the period tell of sealed books of wisdom and of a secret tradition passed on by Jesus to his closest disciples. That is the context for this discovery."

Professor Davies said: "The possibility of a Hebrew-Christian origin is certainly suggested by the imagery and, if so, these codices are likely to bring dramatic new light to our understanding of a very significant but so far little understood period of history."

#### Reciprocity of the Heart

If you were ask to God for just *one* thing, what would it be? Our deepest yearnings are like prayers. Whatever the heart genuinely seeks, it will find. The person who pursues righteousness will find it, just as evil comes to the person who searches for it (Prov. 11:27). Therefore the voice of wisdom cries out, "I love those who love Me, and those who seek Me diligently find Me" (Prov. 8:17), and the prophet shouts, "Seek the LORD while He may be found, call upon Him while He is near" (Isa. 55:6). God is near to us in Yeshua, who said, "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened." As you believe, so you will receive (Matt. 21:22).

This is the "like for like" principle of faith. Forgive us as we forgive; judge us as we judge; love us as we love; make us righteous as we take hold of righteousness, give us courage as we believe, and so on. As Isaiah said to fearful King Ahaz: "If you will not be firm in faith, you will not be firm at all" (Isa. 7:9). Your "amen" echoes the "amen" of Heaven: "Let it be done for you according to your faith" (Matt. 9:29).

The subject of our verse is a participle that comes from the verb *radaf*, which means to follow after, or to pursue, as in a chase or a hunt. This same verb is used when David exclaimed, "surely goodness and love will *pursue me* all the days of my life" (Psalm 23:6). David understood that *as* he pursued God, so God's love would pursue him! *As* we seek, so we are sought by God! *As* we draw near to God, He will draw near to us (James 4:8).

Notice the repeated use of the word "tzedakah" in this verse. When we pursue God's righteousness, we will find it, and we will be declared "tzaddik" (righteous) and given life and honor. "In the path of righteousness is life, and in its pathway there is no death" (Prov. 12:28). Therefore Yeshua calls us to "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matt 6:33).

The prophet expresses hope: "Let us know; let us press on to know the LORD; His going out is sure as the dawn; He will come to us as the showers, as the spring rains that water the earth" (Hos. 6:3). Salvation is "of the LORD." May God help us pursue Him b'khol levavkha—with all our heart—because the LORD has promised, "You will seek Me and find Me, when you seek Me with all your heart" (Jer. 29:13).



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
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

# "With the mouth confession is made unto salvation."

—Romans 10:10 By Todd Baker, ZLM Staff Theologian

In Tel Aviv, the Lord led Kenny and me to Yoel—a thirty-eight-year-old Jew with a heart for the Palestinian people. When he was serving in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) in Gaza, he regularly took food to poor Palestinian families, knowing they could kill him at any time. Here was an act of compassion that the Israel-bashing international media would never report! Kenny and I told Yoel his actions followed the teaching of the greatest Jew who ever lived—Yeshua the Messiah who said, "Love your enemies,

bless those who curse you, do good to those who hate you" (Matthew 5:44).

From this compliment, Yoel learned that we were Bible Believers in Jesus the Messiah. Yoel said that he had attended yeshiva (religious school) as a fifteenyear-old Orthodox Jew studying to be a rabbi. When the head rabbi caught him reading the New Testament in Hebrew, the rabbi screamed, "You are Jewish and Jesus is a Christian!" Yoel's own research had persuaded him that Yeshua was Jewish; that He came to fulfill prophecies about the Messiah given in the Tanakh (Old Testament) by Moses and the prophets. Kenny and I showed Yoel a list of the Messianic prophecies that Yeshua fulfilled, and explained how this evidence proves Yeshua is the Messiah of Israel. Yoel said that the six-hour movie *Jesus of* Nazareth convinced him Jesus could be the Messiah.

Kenny and I know that the Lord used us to complete Yoel's understanding of Yeshua being more than just a great rabbi. Discussing the prophecies of Isaiah 9:6 and Micah 5:2—that the Messiah would be divine, and hence God—Yoel suddenly exclaimed without prompting, "I believe Yeshua is the Messiah!" Just like when Simon Peter boldly confessed to Jesus, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matt. 16:16–17). And like Peter, Yoel had just received this revelation from the Holy Spirit through God's Word.



Hoping he wasn't saying it to please us, we asked Yoel if he really meant what he had just said. "Yes, I believe He is," he responded. With his confession, Yoel was saved (Romans 10:10)!

Yoel accepted our invitation to express his faith through prayer. We thanked God for Yoel's faith and asked Yeshua to fill Yoel with the Holy Spirit. Then we welcomed Yoel as a Jewish brother in the faith the Chosen People first gave to the world. We put him in touch with a local Messianic congregation in Tel Aviv where he can fellowship with other Believers and get grounded in the Word. Kenny and I feel honored that the Lord used us to confirm Yoel's faith and hear his verbal confession unto salvation in accordance with Romans 10:10.

After ten years of sowing the Gospel seed among the Jewish people, we're seeing the harvest of saved souls. Jesus Christ first planted the seed in Israel two thousand years ago (Matt. 13:37). Praise God, it continues to bear fruit there today.





The Old Testament is historically backed up by the Dead Sea Scrolls, the Septuagint, and the family of manuscripts that make up the Masoretic Text. The New Testament is backed up by about 24,000 manuscripts dating from the second century to the tenth century A.D. Even with all these variants, these copies read accurately with each other more than 98 percent of the time. The two percent difference is very minor, and in no way contradicts or denies any major doctrine of the Judeo-Christian faith. For further study on this important and broad subject, please see two excellent books: *A General Introduction to the Bible* by Norman Geisler and William Nix, and *The Journey from Texts to Translations* by Paul D. Wegner.

# The Six-Day War —June 1967

King Hussein of Jordan signed a defense pact with Egypt on May 30, 1967. Egypt's President Nasser then announced:

The armies of Egypt, Jordan, Syria, and Lebanon are poised on the borders of Israel...standing behind us are the armies of Iraq, Algeria, Kuwait, Sudan, and the whole Arab nation.

President Abdur Rahman Aref of Iraq joined in the war of words: "The existence of Israel is an error which must be rectified... Our goal is clear—to wipe Israel off the map." On June 4, approximately 465,000 troops—more than 2,800 tanks, and 800 aircraft—ringed Israel.

Israel had no choice but preemptive action. To do this successfully, Israel needed the element of surprise. Had it waited for an Arab invasion, Israel would have been at a potentially catastrophic disadvantage. On June 5, the order was given to attack Egypt.

The United States tried to prevent the war through negotiations, but it was not able to persuade Nasser or the other Arab states to cease their belligerent statements and actions. Still, right before the war, U.S. President Johnson warned, "Israel will not be alone unless it decides to go alone."

On June 5, Israel was indeed alone, but its military commanders had conceived a brilliant war strategy. The entire Israeli Air Force, with the exception of just 12 fighters assigned to defend Israeli airspace, took off at 7:14 a.m. with the intent of bombing Egyptian airfields while the Egyptian pilots were eating breakfast. In less than two hours, roughly 300 Egyptian aircraft were destroyed.

A few hours later, Israeli fighters were sent to attack the Jordanian and Syrian air forces. By the end of the first day, nearly the entire Egyptian and Jordanian air forces, and half the Syrian air force, had been destroyed on the ground.

The battle moved to the ground. and some of history's greatest tank battles were fought between Egyptian and Israeli armor in the blast-furnace conditions of the Sinai desert.

While most IDF (Israel Defense Forces) units were fighting the Egyptians and Jordanians, a small, heroic group of soldiers was left to defend the northern border against the Syrians. When the Jordanians and Egyptians were subdued, reinforcements could be sent to the Golan Heights where Syrian gunners commanding the strategic high ground made it exceedingly difficult and costly for Israeli forces to penetrate.

Israel sent a message to King Hussein saying Israel would not attack Jordan unless he initiated hostilities. When Jordanian radar picked up a cluster of planes flying from Egypt to Israel, the Egyptians convinced Hussein the planes were theirs, and he ordered the shelling of West Jerusalem.

It turned out the planes were Israel's, returning from destroying the Egyptian air force on the ground.

It took only three days for Israeli forces to defeat the Jordanian legion. On the morning of June 7, Israeli paratroopers stormed the Old City and secured it before Defense Minister Moshe Dayan arrived to formally mark the Jews' return to their historic capital and their holiest site.

At the Western Wall, the IDF's chaplain blew a *shofar* to celebrate the reunification of Jerusalem.

#### Immune system getting old? Process may be reversible

Researchers at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa have discovered a way to reverse the aging process by removing old B lymphocytes (a kind of white blood cell in vertebrate immune systems) from old mice and forcing the production of young, potent cells to replace them. The findings were reported in the January 2011 issue of the scientific journal *Blood*.

"As with every aging process in the body, it is generally thought that immune system aging, including that of the B cell population, is a progressive process that cannot be stopped or reversed," says lead researcher Prof. Doron Melamed of the Technion's Rappaport Faculty of Medicine.

"But we have succeeded in showing that it is possible to turn back the aging process."

The immune system gets weaker with age—a fact reflected by a significant increase in illness among the elderly, and a dramatic decrease in their ability to respond to vaccination. The B lymphocytes are major cellular components in the function of the immune system, and responsible for antibody production.

According to Melamed, many studies have

shown the B cell population undergoes dramatic reductions with age as a result of a decline in the body's ability to produce new B cells, and a selection process that leads to an accumulation of old B cells with a limited response capability.

Using old mice, the Technion researchers showed that active removal of the B cells changes the body's cellular homeostasis and generates conditions of chronic deficiency in these cells. To overcome this, the body reactivates the bone marrow, forcing it to produce B cells again at a rate not different than that which exists in young mice. The researchers found that the newly generated B cells replaced the old cells that were removed and led to up to 400% improvement in the ability of the treated mice to respond to vaccinations.

"This paper shows—for the first time—that physiological aging is a regulated process that can be reversed," Melamed concludes. "It also presents a novel approach for rejuvenating the immune system and for enhancing the efficacy of vaccination among the elderly population."

# Silent Extermination of Irag's "Christian Dogs"

In early April, an Iraqi Muslim scholar issued a *fatwa* that, among other barbarities, asserts that "it is permissible to spill the blood of Iraqi Christians." Inciting as the *fatwa* is, it is also redundant. While last October's Baghdad church attack which killed some sixty Christians was widely reported, the fact is, Christian life in Iraq has been a living hell ever since U.S. forces ousted the late Saddam Hussein in 2003.

Among other atrocities, beheading and crucifying Christians are not irregular occurrences; and messages saying "you Christian dogs, leave or die" are typical. John Eibner, CEO of Christian Solidarity International, summarized the situation well in a recent letter to President Obama:

The threat of extermination is not empty. Since the collapse of Saddam Hussein's regime, more than half the country's Christian population has been forced by targeted violence to seek refuge abroad or to live away from their homes as internally displaced people. According to the Hammurabi Human Rights Organization, over 700 Christians, including bishops and priests, have been killed and 61 churches have been bombed. Seven years into Operation Iraqi Freedom, Catholic Archbishop Louis Sako of Kirkuk reports: "He who is not a Muslim in Iraq is a second-class citizen. Often it is necessary to convert or emigrate, otherwise one risks being killed." This anti-Christian violence is sustained by a widespread culture of Muslim supremacism that extends far beyond those who pull the triggers and detonate the bombs.

The grand irony, of course, is that Christian persecution has increased exponentially under U.S. occupation. As one top Vatican official put it,



Christians, "paradoxically, were more protected under the dictatorship" of Saddam Hussein.

What does one make of this? Saddam appears to have made use of the better-educated Christians, who posed no risk to his rule. Moreover, by keeping a tight lid on his nation's Islamists [advocates of Islam as a political system]—who hated him as a secular apostate no less than the Christians—the latter benefited indirectly.

Conversely, by empowering "the people," the U.S. has unwittingly undone Iraq's Christian minority. Naively projecting Western values on Muslims, the U.S. continues to think that "people-power" will naturally culminate into a Western-like, egalitarian society—despite all the evidence otherwise. The fact is, in the Arab/Muslim world, "majority rule" traditionally means domination by the largest tribe or sect; increasingly, it means Islamist domination.

Either which way, the minorities—notably the indigenous Christians—are the first to suffer once the genie of "people-power" is uncorked. Indeed, evidence indicates that the U.S.-backed "democratic" government of Iraq enables and incites the persecution of its Christians. (All of this raises the pivotal question: Do heavy-handed tyrants—Saddam, Mubarak, Kaddafi, et al—create brutal societies, or do brutal societies create the need for heavy-handed tyrants to keep order?)

Another indicator that empowering Muslim masses equates to Christian suffering is the fact that, though Iraqi Christians amount to a mere 5% of the population, they make up nearly 40% of the refugees fleeing Iraq. It is now the same in Egypt.



#### Red Cross: No Humanitarian Crisis in Gaza

"There is no humanitarian crisis in Gaza." So states categorically Mathilde Redmatn, the deputy director of the Red Cross in the Gaza Strip.

"If you go to the supermarket, there are products," she said. "There are restaurants and a nice beach. The problem is mainly in maintenance of infrastructure and in access to certain goods such as concrete. Israel has the legitimate right to protect [its] civilian population, but this right should be balanced with the right of 1.5 million people living in the Gaza Strip."

She acknowledged that Israel has eased its closure on Gaza and has partially lifted export bans.

#### Turkey's Bait & Switch

Ever since Turkey's Islamist Justice and Peace AKP party under Recep Tayyip Erdogan won the November 2002 elections, Western officials have upheld the AKP, Erdogan, and his colleagues as proof that political Islam is consonant with democratic values. During Erdogan's June 2005 visit to the White House for instance, then-president George W. Bush praised Turkish democracy as "an important example for the people in the broader Middle East."

Unfortunately, nine years into the AKP's "democratic" regime, it is clear that Erdogan and his colleagues' embrace of the language and tools of democracy was a mile wide and an inch thick. They used democracy to gain power. Now that they have power, they are systematically destroying freedom in their country.

Turkey's freedom of the press ranks 138th on the country index compiled by the international media freedom group Reporters Sans Frontiers. Sixtyeight journalists languish in Turkish jails for the crime of doing their job. The most recent roundup of reporters occurred in early March. And it is demonstrative of Turkey's Islamist leaders' exploitation of democratic freedoms in the service of their tyrannical ends.



Turkey is a cautionary tale for the West which is now faced with the prospect of AKP-like regimes from Egypt to Tunisia to Jordan to the Persian Gulf. And the real issue that Western leaders must address is how things in Turkey were permitted to deteriorate to the point they have without any U.S. or European official lifting a finger to stem the Islamist tide.

#### Anti-Semitism in Norway

I recently completed a tour of Norwegian universities, where I spoke about international law as applied to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. But the tour nearly never happened.

Its sponsor, a Norwegian pro-Israel group, offered to have

me lecture without any charge to the three major universities. Norwegian universities generally jump at any opportunity to invite lecturers from elsewhere. When my Harvard colleague Stephen Walt, co-author of *The Israel Lobby*, came to Norway, he was immediately invited to present a lecture at the Norwegian University of Science and Technology in Trondheim. Likewise with Ilan Pappe, a similar demonizer of Israel, who teaches at Oxford.

My hosts expected, therefore, that their offer to have me present a different academic perspective on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict would be eagerly accepted. I have written half a dozen books on the subject presenting a centrist view in support of the two-state solution. But the universities refused.




The dean of the law faculty at Bergen University said he would be "honored" to have me present a lecture "on the O.J. Simpson case," as long as I was willing to promise not to mention Israel. An administrator at the Trondheim school said that Israel was too "controversial."

The University of Oslo simply said "no" without offering an excuse. That led one journalist to wonder whether the Norwegian universities believe that I am "not entirely house-trained."

Only once before have I been prevented from lecturing at universities in a country. The other country was Apartheid South Africa.



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#### France Bans Burka

In April, France became the first country to ban veiling the face anywhere in public. French President Nicolas Sarkozy said the veils imprison women and contradict this secular nation's values of dignity and equality.

Those caught violating the ban—including women wearing *nikab* veils with just a slit for the eyes—are liable for a fine of 150 Euros (\$221) or lessons in French citizenship. People who force women to don a veil are subject to up to a year in prison and a fine of 30,000 Euros (\$44,000), and possibly twice that if the veiled person is a minor.

The law is worded to trip safely through legal minefields: The words "women," "Muslim," and "veil" are not even mentioned. The law says it is illegal to hide the face in the public space.

Sarkozy said that the veils are not welcome in France. Moderate Muslim leaders

in France and elsewhere agree that Islam does not require women to cover their faces. Such laws have been stirring controversy across Europe. A summary (from Reuters) of European policies on wearing the Muslim veil:

**France** is the first country in Europe to ban full-face veils. Under the new law, police escort the veiled person to a police station and ask her (him?) to remove the veil there for identification.

In 2004, France banned headscarves from state primary and secondary schools under a law against conspicuous religious symbols, which also covers Jewish *kippa* skullcaps and large Christian crosses. Female university students may wear headscarves that do not cover the face, since they are adults. Teachers and other civil servants may not wear any religious symbols at work.

The **Dutch** minority coalition government is under pressure from Geert Wilders's anti-Muslim Freedom Party to introduce a ban on wearing full-face veils in public places.

**Italy:** Some towns have tried to ban burkas with local decrees. A 1975 law provides for fines and jail time for those who cover their face with anything that prevents their identification by police.

**Belgium's** lower house voted a year ago in favor of banning the full veil. However, the ban has not been enacted and is on hold owing to long-term political deadlock.



The wearing of Islamic veils or headscarves is officially prohibited at universities in predominantly Muslim but constitutionally secular **Turkey.** However, the Higher Education Board, in a landmark decision last October, ordered Istanbul University to prevent teachers expelling female students who do not comply with the ban from classrooms. Civil servants are also banned from wearing the headscarf, which is otherwise commonly worn by many Turkish women, including the wives of Prime Minister Tayyip Erdogan and President Abdullah Gul.

Seven of **Germany's** 16 states have banned teachers in state schools from wearing Islamic headscarves; and Hesse in February became the only German regional state to ban face veils for public sector workers.

An opinion poll last year indicated that 61 percent of Germans favor a burka ban.

After decades of ignoring the Islamic threat to their respective nations, the Europeans seem finally to realize that they are now at risk. —Lou, former ZLM editor
