
Israel—Light To The Nations

"Indeed He says, 'It is too small a thing that you should be My servant to raise up the tribes of

Jacob, and to restore the preserved ones of Israel; I will also give you as a light to the gentiles, that you should be My salvation to the ends of the earth." (Isaiah 49:6)

Jesus did not arrive out of nowhere, but came according to the promises that God had made to the "fathers"—Abraham, Moses, David, and other Hebrew patriarchs. He was the "light of the world" (John 8:12), but He arose out of the light of Messianic hope and expectancy already given to Israel. Even Jesus Himself said: "Salvation is of the Jews." That is, the very concept of world redemption came to us through the people of Israel.



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Dividing God's Land

In Joel 3:1–2, God states that He will bring back the people of Judah and Jerusalem and then enter into judgment with the nations who have scattered His people and divided His land.

God calls the Jews My people and Israel My land. Nations that come against the Jewish people and the Land of Israel are thus coming against God's own possession: "The Lord your God has chosen you to be a people for His own possession out of all the peoples who are on the face of the earth" (Deuteronomy 7:6). God has even sworn to give Israel to the Jewish people—"the land which He promised on oath to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob" (Genesis 50:24). (continued p. 3)

To better understand this biblical principle, consider that light is often used as a metaphor for truth in Scripture. It reveals eternal realities, illuminating the way things really are, since our spiritual understanding can often be veiled.

"Oh, send out Your light and Your truth! Let them lead me..." (Psalms 43:3)

This aspect of light as a revealing agency of eternal truths is especially so regarding the true nature and character of God, which brings us to Israel's central role in being a "light to the nations."

The nation of Israel has gifted the world with many spiritual blessings, the foremost being our Messiah. It was also through Israel that God chose to reveal His nature and character to the world.

In His covenants with Israel, God reveals His personality. We see His grace and faithfulness, His holiness and justice. This is summed up in one powerful passage in Exodus where God describes His own attributes to Moses on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:5–7).


Through the revelation at Sinai, we understand that He is the awesome and all-powerful Creator, and yet He does not want to stay out there in eternity forever. Rather, He loves creation and wants to interact with humankind, even to "dwell" with us (Exodus 29:43–46; Revelation 21:3).

The Sinai revelation gave rise to ethical monotheism—belief in the one true God and Creator of all, Who is ultimately good and holy and engaged with the world, and to Whom we will all give answer some day, thereby encouraging us to live uprightly.

Humankind's highest wisdom in ancient times gave us the Greek pantheon of selfish gods. But Israel insisted the Creator is not like that; He is merciful, holy, slow to anger, and ever open to the repentant soul.

This was a precious light shining forth into darkness. And the Israelites were made custodians of this light for all peoples.

We see this in the visible symbols of light which God placed in the Wilderness Tabernacle, and later at the Temple—the menorah and the holy fire that fell upon the altar. The light of God's glory and presence was also seen in the pillar of fire that accompanied Israel in the desert, and was reflected in the glory that shone upon the face of Moses.



Israel has carried this magnificent light for generations, and indeed the Apostle Paul lists "the glory" as one of the great redemptive gifts to the world which "belong" to Israel (Romans 9:4). Thus, Christians should be forever grateful for this divine light which has come to us through Israel.

Having just visited Greece, Turkey, and Israel, I can attest to the difference between the God of Abraham and the gods of the Greek pantheon. The yearning in mankind for a Father in Heaven is innate; it is the "Godsized hole" in the heart. The Greek poets reached to invent that Father but fell short with their all-too-human little gods with various frailties. Not so with the God of Abraham. Paul introduced the Greeks to Abba, El Shaddai, and Ha'Rishon v'HaAcharon (the First and the Last) and changed the world forever. —Myles

Therefore, the struggle over the division of the Land is not simply a political conflict between the State of Israel and the Palestinians. In reality, the nations, under pressure from the Palestinians, are challenging God to a duel. God will enter into severe judgment with the nations who have divided His land and will condemn them in the Valley of Jehoshaphat—meaning the Valley of Decision (Joel 3:2).

One might question whether Joel's prophecy applies to our time. Joel lived in the post-exilic period around 400 BC, or some 100 years after the return of the Israelites from the Babylonian exile. So, one could deduce that he was referring

to the Babylonians. Yet neither the Babylonians nor the Assyrians ever divided the land.

Joel does not accuse just one nation—as would be the case with Babylon—but rather all the nations who have scattered Israel as a

people and divided the Land of Israel.
Therefore, it is clear that he is referring to
the time after the dispersion of the Jews
throughout the nations following the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 AD.

The Roman leader Pompey had already divided the land between 63–55 BC and allocated it to the Idumeans, the Itureans, the Samaritans, and the Ptolomeans, leaving only the small area of Judea for the Jews. After the fall of the Roman Empire, the Byzantines occupied Israel, followed by the Persians, then the Muslims, the Crusaders, and finally the Ottomans, who were defeated by the British in 1917.

The 1917 Balfour Declaration, which was incorporated into the British Mandate by which pre-state Israel was governed from 1920 to 1948, states: "His Majesty's

Government views with favour the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people." The Mandate granted to the Jews the entire area between the Mediterranean Sea and the Jordan River, and from Mt. Hermon in the north to Eilat in the south. This was formally recognized in 1922 by 52 states in the League of Nations; it was revised by the UN, founded in 1945, in the Partition Plan of 1947.

The Partition Plan divided the area that was initially assigned by the League of Nations solely as a Jewish state into two states, one Jewish and one Arab, with Jerusalem as an international zone to be

administered by
the UN. The
Jews accepted
the division
of their
Promised
Land. The
Arabs flatly
rejected it.

The fact that the United Nations was asked to decide for or against a Palestinian state reflects the events prophesied by Joel, that one day all

the nations will be judged by God with regard to their position on His land and His people.

Blessed is he who decides in favor of God and His land.

Civilizations rise and fall based on their decisions regarding the Abrahamic Covenant (Genesis 12:3). The U.S. has never been this alienated from Israel in word and deed. Believers in America must stand for and speak out for our Middle East ally in the face of worldwide pressure and at the risk of losing popularity. Now is the time and we are the people. —Myles

Ask The Chaplain

Jesus said He did not come to destrov the law but to




fulfill it. And He did keep kosher because He was Jewish. We know He never ate pork or other non-kosher food ever. How do we reconcile this?

Jesus also made sacrifices in the Temple on Passover (Mark 14:12; Luke 2:41–42). Must we do that, too? Of course not, because His once-for-all-sacrifice on the Cross put an end to those sacrifices that were required under the Law (Hebrews 9–10).

We can't pick and choose doing parts of the Law we like or what is convenient; if you are going to be justified by the Law, you have to obey all of it. But Christians are not justified by the Law; we are justified by the blood of Jesus. Either He fulfilled all the law in His life or He didn't.

Paul said Messiah Jesus is the fulfillment of the Law for Believers (Romans 10:4). He completed the Law by His life and ministry. Jesus explains how He fulfilled the Law and the Prophets in Luke 24:27: "And beginning at Moses and all the Prophets He explained to them in all the Scriptures concerning Himself." In other words, He showed how He was the answer to prophecy, His life and ministry the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets.

Nowhere in the New Testament are we required to place ourselves under the ordinances of the Law—like eating Kosher, offering animal sacrifices, etc.—since Christ Jesus has fulfilled all those requirements for us. You can't call Israel's Haifa coast a surfers paradise. But you can catch some decent waves when ocean storms stir up the normally calm Eastern Mediterranean waters. I've seen plucky lads (rarely any females) in their thermal wetsuits in mid-winter, grabbing every swell imaginable. With today's short, pointy-nose boards, the better riders are able to milk many twists and turns out of each brief ride.

One summer, as a 12-year-old Southern California boy, I fell in love with surfing. The board I learned on was 9.5 feet, fully twice my height. To carry it, I folded a towel 14 times (well, OK, 4 times) to keep my head from being disfigured by the weight of the monstrous piece of fiberglass-covered polyurethane foam.

Our "Good Friends" the Saudis

Just when you think the U.S. is waking up to the truth about Israel's rights, some-body muddies the waters of effective Middle East strategy.

We stopped along the way to see Caesarea Maritima, Mt. Carmel, and Megiddo; continued through Nazareth and Cana, and ended with the view of the Sea of Galilee. And that was just the first day!

Best memories of the tour: Galilee—the area of our Lord, Yeshua; and the pilgrims praising and worshiping on a first-century fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. We all felt the Holy Spirit that morning as we sang and prayed. As usual, I started crying as the *Star Spangled Banner* played and then *HaTikvah*, Israel's national anthem.

We finished with *Amazing Grace* in Hebrew. I tell you, there was not a dry eye anywhere.

We each left a piece of our heart as we planted trees with our own hands and prayed over the Land of Israel. Then came Qumran and the Dead Sea Scrolls, and Gideon Springs, where faith is tested.



World Ports Safer With Tracking Technology

As a Toyota sedan approaches a busy airport, an Israeli-developed vehicle identity recognition (VIR) system instantly gives security personnel a summary of the car's make and model, the country or state that issued the license plate and the holder of the plate.

Much more than simply tracking users at this sensitive security point, the VIR is also a first alert. What if the car is recognized as a Corolla but the plate is registered to a Ford Focus owner? Either the license plate was switched or the car is stolen—a clear red flag.



VIR is the newest product of Hi-Tech Solutions (HTS) Israel, which has specialized in optical character recognition (OCR) solutions since 1992. Forty countries use HTS products to fight terrorism and crime, as well as manage cargo, traffic and toll roads—including all ships leaving the ports of the United States.

The privately held Rishon LeZion-based company owns its technology. It does all development at a customer service and R&D center in the northern Israeli town of Migdal HaEmek.

Each of Ports America's 42 seaports in the U.S. is equipped with HTS technology to speed merchandise from ship to shore and keep tabs on it at the same time. At these ports and 15 European and Asian ports as well, the software identifies every container in real time during loading and unloading, and cross-checks information on the source and destination of the container.

HTS recently completed a successful cargo-scanning pilot program at a major



airport in Europe, and its system has been digitally scanning cars entering Ben-Gurion International Airport near Tel Aviv for several years, alerting security personnel if any driver is listed as a suspicious person. Similar systems are installed at other airports and at entrances to office and residential complexes.

Border crossings are another hot spot where HTS technology is increasingly deployed around the world. HTS vicepresident Meta Rotenberg says border patrols are primarily concerned about smuggling of drugs, weapons, and even people. The company's software counts and monitors every vehicle coming in and out.

Recently, the company began to integrate its recognition software on handheld devices used by municipal inspectors and police officers around the world for maintaining order in cities, roads, and parking areas. That can extend to catching speeders, monitoring municipal traffic loads, and tracking down stolen vehicles.

They say, "You're never alone in Israel"—a tongue-in-cheek reference to the high tech security measures used to protect the country. Our recent trip into Bethlehem illustrated this sentiment clearly: The birthplace of Yeshua has been so commandeered by Muslims that the border crossing is difficult for everyone. The Israelis are forced to monitor, check, and re-check vehicles for terrorist supplies. The situation causes a hassle for the honest Arab inhabitants, and a potentially deadly assignment for the uniformed and armed Israelis.

Tiny Token of Christian Faith from 6th Century Jerusalem By Matti Friedman, Associated Press

A tiny, exquisitely made box found on an excavated street in Jerusalem is a token of Christian faith from 1,400 years ago, says Yana Tchekhanovets of the Israel Antiquities Authority, one of the directors of the dig where the box was found.

When the lid is removed, the remains of two portraits are still visible in paint and gold leaf. The figures, a man and a woman, are probably Christian saints, possibly Jesus and His mother.



Byzantine 0.8 by 0.6-inch Christian icon box made of bone with a cross carved on the lid, likely carried by a Christian Believer who lost it on one of Jerusalem's streets around the end of the 6th century A.D.

The box was found in an excavation outside the walls of Jerusalem's Old City in the remains of a Byzantine-era thoroughfare. Uncovered two years ago, it was treated by preservation experts and extensively researched before it was unveiled at a recent archaeological conference.

The box is important in part because it offers the first archaeological evidence that the use of icons in the Byzantine period was not limited to church ceremonies, she said. Part of a similar box was found three decades ago in Jordan, but this is the only well-preserved example to be found so far. Similar icons are still carried today by some Christian Believers, especially from the Eastern Orthodox churches.

The relic was found in the City of David excavation. The politically sensitive dig is located in what is today the Palestinian neighborhood of Silwan, just outside the Old City walls in East Jerusalem, the section of the Holy City captured by Israel in the 1967 Six-Day War and now claimed by Palestinians as their capital.

To sum it all up: the relic, precious to Christians, is most likely from the 6th century—*before* Islam existed. The neighborhood, King David's, has been part of the Jewish capital for 3,000 years. The land WON by Israel in 1967, is NOW

claimed as the capital for what Muslims hope will be the 57th Muslim state. That Jerusalem is never mentioned in the Koran and prayers are directed toward Mecca must be minor points. One wonders what other treasures and illuminating finds will be unearthed in other "politically sensitive" digs. —Myles





Thirty-Five Million Americans Harbor Anti-Semitism

Millions of Americans harbor an ugly secret—they're suspicious of the Jews.

A nationwide survey released recently by the Anti-Defamation League found that 15% of the country holds deeply anti-Semitic views—and that number appears to be growing.

"It is disturbing that with all of the strides we have made in becoming a more tolerant society, anti-Semitic beliefs continue to hold a vise-grip on a small but not insubstantial segment of the American public," the ADL's Abraham Foxman said.

Old stereotypes about Jews being pushy and controlling the economy are festering—especially among the least-educated Americans, the survey found.

Among other things:

- 19% answered "probably true" to the statement "Jews have too much control/influence on Wall Street," a five percentage point increase since 2009.
- 14% agreed with the statement that "Jews have too much power in the U.S. today," an increase from 13% in 2009.
- 15% agreed Jews are "more willing to use shady practices."
- 16% agreed that Jewish "business people are so shrewd, others don't have a chance."
- Other anti-Jewish canards continue to be believed by millions of Americans.
- Some 31% believe the Jews were responsible for crucifying Christ.

- And 30%—a percentage that has stayed steady since 1964—insist Jews are "more loyal to Israel than to America."
- Nearly half of all respondents agreed with the statement that Jews "stick together more than other Americans." And a quarter of the country says Jews "still talk too much about what happened to them in the Holocaust."

The survey found that the most-educated Americans were the least prejudiced and foreign-born Hispanics were more likely to hate Jews than U.S. born Hispanics.

- Some 29% of the African-Americans surveyed expressed strong anti-Semitic views.
- On the plus side, even the anti-Semites gave Jews credit for their strong faith in God (79%), being big on family (84%), and for contributing to American culture (64%).

An adage says, "Just because you're paranoid doesn't mean they're not out to get you." Just below the surface of any "civilized" culture, anti-Semitism is ready to explode into its next expression against the Jews. Germany was considered the apex of modern civilization in the early 20th century. Blame-shifting and scapegoating are as old as the Garden of Eden, and could happen anywhere, even in America. —Myles

Promoting Hatred For Israel


This past fall, it became known that the German EVZ Foundation had financed two high school student programs that promoted hatred of Israel. This state foundation was created to compensate Holocaust slave workers and fight contemporary anti-Semitism. In one of the programs, Dutch-Jewish anti-Israel extremist Hayo Meyer came to the Anne Frank High School in Gutersloh. He equated Palestinian suffering with the mass murder of Jews in the Holocaust and termed Israel a "criminal state."

Since then, in the Nesbru High School in Asker, Norway, an exhibition sponsored by Norwegian Church Aid, was held on "Palestine." It included a picture of an Israeli flag crossed out and "Murder" written in reverse underneath it. After protest by an Israeli student and some bad publicity, the school finally decided to remove the exhibition. It is crucially important to know much more about hatred spread against Israel and Jews in schools in the Western world. This contributes to the formation of a new generation of Israel haters and anti-Semites.

Very few studies give information on these topics. In the 1990s, Mitchell Bard studied the most widely used history textbooks in American high schools. Regarding Israel, he found them "full of factual errors, oversimplification, omission, and distortion." Bard concluded that American "high schools are, as far as anti-Israeli teaching is concerned, even worse than universities."

In 2008, another analysis by Gary Tobin and Dennis Ybarra confirmed this. They also found that Arab and Muslim interest groups try to whitewash and glorify all things Islamic and thus promote Islam. In this way, a whole series of lies has permeated American textbooks.

We should not be surprised, but soberly consider how much intervention is needed to awaken society and revive the Church, especially concerning Israel. Replacement Theology reaches its peak in Arab maps where Israel has been literally "wiped off the map" and in textbooks that contain "history" that never happened. The Good News is that a Jewish King is returning to a Jewish Jerusalem to reign over a worshipping world made up of Jews and gentiles—distinctly different, yet with a shared destiny. Only God can work this one out! —Myles



"Moderate" Abbas Reveals True Colors

The assumption has been that if a Palestinian state is approved, it would be based on pre-'67 borders, which many believe are indefensible. [Ed. Note: Israel captured the West Bank, the Gaza Strip, the Sinai Peninsula, East Jerusalem, and the Golan Heights when it won the Six-Day War in 1967.] Yet the application presented to the UN by Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas is not based on pre-'67 borders. It is based on the original 1947 partition plan of UN Resolution 181.

First, aside from the irony of requesting the identical item from the identical body that his Arab brethren rejected in 1947, Abbas's application negates what virtually all proponents of the "two-state solution" have supported, (including the Saudi proposal in 2002): a return to pre-'67 borders.

Second, the area of land designated for Israel under the '47 partition is 5,500 sq. miles—30% smaller than the 8,000 sq. miles the '67 borders encompass.

Third, it would mean that several hundred-thousand Jews now living inside the pre-'67 borders would end up outside Israel and inside a hostile Palestinian state. This is in addition to the roughly 300,000 Jews who have been living in Judea and Samaria who also will be required to move, as Abbas is already on record saying, "there will be no room for a single Jew to live in Palestine."

Thus, potentially over 500,000 Jews would be forced to relocate, even though Israel has a 20% Arab population that is not being asked to move.

Fourth, Jerusalem would no longer be inside Israel. It would be cut off, well inside and completely surrounded by the Palestinian state.

By requesting the '47 partition lines, Abbas is essentially asking for a second chance to accept a UN resolution his Arab brethren rejected 64 years ago. This alone is precedent-setting. It also demonstrates that he has no interest in peaceful coexistence with a Jewish State of Israel within secure and defensible borders. Rather, his goal appears to be to grab as much land as he can, while remaining committed to "the complete liberation of Palestine, and eradication of Zionist economic, political, military, and cultural existence." (Article 12 of his Fatah Party's Charter)

The Middle East already has 22 Arab countries, with a combined population of more than 300 million. Israel's six million Jews represent 2% of that figure, yet in order get "justice," the Arabs require a 23rd state and the Jews are being asked to slice up their already tiny state. Moreover, if Abbas has his way, Israel will be 30% smaller than the already indefensible pre-'67 borders, and its capital will be in the middle of his hostile state.

Healing and Praise

It is good to praise and trust the LORD despite our afflictions, and indeed, suffering itself presents an invitation to come before God in prayer (James 5:13). Suffering offers us a *nisayon*, a test, for our hearts to be exercised in ways otherwise rendered impossible should the path of our lives be attended without real struggle.

In this connection I am reminded of a quote from Sadhu Sundar Singh, "Should pain and suffering, sorrow, and grief, rise up like clouds and overshadow for a time the Sun of Righteousness and hide Him from your view, do not be dismayed, for in the end this cloud of woe will descend in showers of blessing on your head, and the Sun of Righteousness rise upon you to set no more for ever."

It's been said that both the devil and God want your soul, but their approaches are diametrically opposite to one another... God offers you a bitter cup that, after it has been duly tasted, will be turned sweet, whereas the devil offers you an artificially sweetened cup that, after it has been duly tasted, will be found bitter to the last of its dregs... When you accept your suffering as ordained by God—by the LORD of Glory who could easily deliver you from all trace of its presence in but the twinkling of an eye—your heartache is sanctified, and your praise becomes more dear to Him. Only the wise and loving LORD knows how bitter waters may be made sweet; only the great Refiner of our souls knows how to bring beauty up from ashes... I hope you don't mind if I answer these letters as a group, in the interest of space. Several of your letters were lengthy, which makes it difficult for us to reprint them in their entirety. However, they deserve consideration. The cartoons in our *Levitt Letter* have stirred quite a bit of controversy. Some appreciated them, some thought they were inappropriate, and some called them blasphemous. What seems clear from the wide range of reactions is how *subjective* these things can be. I don't want to minimize our responsibility to be appropriate, but I honestly believe that the cartoons merely "spice" up the magazine, and are not our *raison d'etre* (reason for being).

As a new Believer, I received a pearl of wisdom from Moishe Rosen (founder of Jews for Jesus). He said, "Myles, if it's not the Bible, read it with a pencil!" In other words, Scripture is sacred, but minor things (especially man's ideas in print) are just that: minor. They are negotiable, can be crossed out, erased, and debated because they are "subjective."

The *Levitt Letter* addresses many issues of extreme importance. We use the Bible as our standard of faith and practice. Beyond that, like Jewish people from time immemorial, we employ humor to lighten the burden of life.

Some will "get it," some won't. Some jokes hit the target, some miss. Please don't let cartoons deflect from the thrust of our purposes: the Gospel to the Jew first, the centrality of Israel in God's plan, and His desire that none should perish. Blessings —Myles



Use Only MY Bible—No, Only MINE!

Dear ZLM,

I would like to see the KJV used as the Scripture source in the *Levitt Letter*. Many people hold to a "KJV only" view, and I am one. How can a Believer trust a "Bible" that is copyrighted for money? Jesus and his martyrs gave their lives so men would have the Word of God freely given, not copyrighted. I entreat you to consider this request and I pray that God will move you.

Dear J.T.—

There is not one monolithic manuscript that is free from copyist or scribal errors—including the family of manuscripts that comprise the *Textus Receptus* that constitutes the KJV. But the miracle of preservation is such that out of all the 24,000 manuscripts we have (dating from the first century B.C. to tenth century A.D.), and with over 240,000 variant readings or so between them, not one difference changes or denies any major doctrine of the Judeo-Christian faith. When compared, **these manuscripts agree with each other over 98% of the time,** and the less than 2% variance concerns minor issues of grammar, inclusion, or omission—which, again, do not impact any major orthodox doctrine of the faith. God's miraculous preservation of His Word over the long centuries from original composition to multiple copies is truly amazing!

You might be surprised to learn that modern translations are based on texts <u>older</u> than the KJV (the benefit of further archaeology). Most modern translations—New Revised Standard, New International Version, New American Standard, and even New Living Translation—have incorporated this new scholarship. The New King James <u>did</u> update the OT but still used the *Textus Receptus* for the NT.


Israel v. Bermuda

BIBLE QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Answers in a Nutshell from Todd

C. (NJ) asks: Does Ezekiel (40–44) teach that there will be animal sacrifices for the nations during the thousand-year reign of Christ?

A. Yes; Ezekiel interpreted literally says there will be animal sacrifices offered during the Millennial Kingdom. But they will be no more efficacious to permanently take away sin than they were during the Old Testament times. No sacrifice before or after Messiah Jesus saves. These sacrifices are memorial in nature, pointing back to the Cross of Christ. For just as the Lord's Supper is a memorial looking back to the Cross, so too do the sacrifices by Israel in the Millennial Kingdom point back to the Cross.

D.F. asks: When did the early Church start building "buildings" to gather in to worship the Lord as a congregation? **A.** The earliest so far discovered is the Upper Room where Jesus celebrated His last Passover on Earth and where James and the Apostles met with the early Church. Archaeologists excavated in the last decade and found the Messianic seal on the mezuzah at the entrance and on anointing receptacles inside the structure. The seal fuses together the Menorah, Star of David, and Christian fish symbol. So **by the late first century,** Believers were already worshipping in building structures. Please see the book about this amazing archaeological find, *The Messianic Seal of the Jerusalem Church* by Raymond Fischer and Reuven Schmalz (at bookstores and Amazon.com).

L.A. asks: Is Islam an offshoot of Old Testament Judaism? Is Mohammed in the Koran reacting to a heretical branch of the Eastern Church in his day that was common in Arabia known as Monophysitism? Did he ever meet Orthodox Christians? **A. Islam is not a deviant form of Judaism:** note that many Koranic utterances call for the destruction of the Jew, whereas biblical Judaism promises that God's love, preservation, and protection of the Jewish people are guaranteed forever. True, both religions forbid eating pork, but this is a superficial similarity. Mohammed did have contact with the Coptic, Syrian, and Arabic Christians—and called for their destruction as infidels. He did adopt Docetic Gnosticism when writing in the Koran that Jesus did not really die on the Cross but only appeared to, as a phantom.

P.A.R. asks: Zola once stated on TV that the Dome of the Rock has an engraving on the top that says, "God had no son." I have mentioned this to several people, and they do not know what I am talking about. I do not believe that Zola would make this up. **A.** Yes, you heard Zola correctly. Written in Arabic around the circular border of the Dome, it states that **Allah has no son, nor has he begotten or is begotten.** I confirmed this with the late Zvi Rivai, award-winning Israel guide and chief tour guide for Zola Tours for about twenty years. It shows at once the anti-Christ spirit behind the religion of Islam!

S.M.S. asks: Is this transliteration from Hebrew to English correct? **Zechariah 12:10 in English:** "They will look on me, the one they have pierced, and they will mourn for him as one mourns for an only child, and grieve bitterly for him as one grieves for a firstborn son." The key word here is "pierced." The English translation is "the One they have pierced." However, in Hebrew, it translates "those who were pierced." It's plural, not singular. It is mourning the deaths that were in Jerusalem at the time of the destruction of the First Temple. **A.** The Hebrew text of Zechariah 12:10 is third-person masculine singular. The ancient rabbis and the Jewish writers of the New Testament understood it to be a Messianic prophecy referring to the suffering Messiah—fulfilled in the death of Jesus when He was pierced in crucifixion (John 19:37).

S.M.S. asks also: I would like your interpretation of Jeremiah 16:16 and whether it refers to an end-times Holocaust. **A.** The historical context of Jeremiah 16 is the Babylonian invasion of Israel in 586 B.C., not the end-time eschatological judgment and Israel "converting" to Christianity. **Verse 16 refers to the soldiers of Babylon** making a meticulous house-to-house search of Jews living in Judah and Jerusalem to either kill them or carry them away captive to Babylon. The first rule of Bible interpretation is context.

S.E. asks: Matthew 5:32 says, "But I tell you that anyone who divorces his wife, except for sexual immorality, makes her the victim of adultery, and anyone who marries a divorced woman commits adultery." What about physical or emotional abuse? These are not grounds for divorce? A man beats his wife daily and she can't divorce? **A.** The Word of God in **1 Corinthians 7:15 allows for divorce in case of abandonment.** That would most certainly include abuse where the spouse's safety is threatened. Logic, common sense, and the attributes of God's mercy and justice are such that He would not expect anyone to stay married under these heinous circumstances.

Constantine's "Christianity"

Why Iran Might Welcome Bombing

Israel's quarrel is with Iran's Khomeinist regime. A Shiite version of pan-Islamism, Khomeinism harbors global ambitions. For Khomeinists, Iran is not a nation with its own national interests but part of an Islamic *ummah* (world) that is at war with the United States and its allies. And the Khomeinists are trying to seize control of the Israel-Palestine issue in the hope of seducing the Arabs into accepting their hegemony.

This isn't a new strategy. Egypt under Nasser used it, as did Libya under Kaddafi, Iraq under Saddam Hussein and Syria under Hafez al-Assad. Just as those Arab despots armed terrorist groups against Israel, the Khomeinist regime is using Hamas, Islamic Jihad, and Hezbollah to target the Jewish state.

Yet the Khomeinists appear to welcome a bombing campaign from Israel and/ or the United States. Such an attack that is not part of a broader strategy to topple the Khomeinists would only strengthen their regime.

That's what happened in Egypt in 1967, when Nasser was defeated but allowed to remain in power. And in 1986, after Libya was bombed by the U.S. but Kaddafi was allowed to live to brag about his "great victory." Similarly, in

1991 Saddam Hussein was defeated but allowed to remain in power.

In 2006, in military terms, Israel defeated the Lebanese Hezbollah. Hezbollah lost a quarter of its full-time fighters and all its bases close to the frontier, as well as 80 percent of its arsenal. Yet, because its leadership was left intact in Beirut, it could claim "the greatest victory in modern Islamic history."

Another reason that Khomeinists may welcome bombings that only wound them: They face a difficult election next spring, with the threat of another insurrection against their corrupt and bloody rule. A bombing raid would give them an excuse to crush the opposition in the name of national unity and claim fresh legitimacy.

The Khomeinist regime is a mortal enemy of the Iranian people, of Israel, and of the West. Those who are thinking of a bombing raid should remember Machiavelli's advice: "Do not wound a mortal enemy and let him live. Either turn him into a friend or kill him."

The U.S. used this strategy in WW II: Destroy, humiliate, and then rebuild. Consequently, Germany and Japan became allies of the United States. Modern battles seem to have lost that edge, and the new rules of engagement require half measures that put our own troops at risk. Israel's experiences in Lebanon and Gaza are prime examples of this warfare without follow-through. Let's pray for wisdom on the part of Israeli and American leaders. —Myles

Adding Magnesium To Water

Israel's Health Ministry wants magnesium to be added to potable water because the increasing desalination of the water supply has removed much of the mineral.

If the Water Authority and other authorities agree, Israel will become the first country in the world to add magnesium to its water.

Of the 1,400 million cubic meters of water that are consumed every year, 300 million are already desalinated from the sea due to the dearth of rainfall, the ministry said. This figure could rise to 750 million in 2020. Desalination, which eliminates the salt, also removes the magnesium, which is vital for normal function of cells.

Recommended human consumption of magnesium, according to the World Health Organization, is 30 milligrams per liter, or 400 milligrams per day. But most Israelis get no more than 200 to 300 milligrams, which is considered very low. Water supplies about a fifth of magnesium to the body; a deficit can cause health problems, such as ischemic heart disease, high blood pressure, and cancers such as ovarian, breast, rectal, and stomach. Thus, the lack of magnesium consumption, the ministry said, is "worrisome."

Perspiration causes the loss of additional magnesium, as does chronic stress, which increases the amount of adrenaline in the body, which causes the mineral to be eliminated through the urine.

The ministry said that a professional, interdisciplinary committee was appointed to look into the matter that included representatives of the Water Authority, the ministry's public health, nutrition, and environmental protection branches, and the Israel Union for Environmental Defense. They wrote that increasing the amount of magnesium in the water would cost




\$36.4 million and save 250 lives a year from cardiovascular disease alone.

However, the plan has its opponents who argue that only 1 percent of the country's water supply is for drinking, thus the mineral need not be added to all supplies, and that there are other ways to give the population additional magnesium such as pills or supplementing food. They also argue that water costs would rise. But the ministry counters that Israel has one of the highest desalination rates and that the population needs supplementation.

Meanwhile, if the decision does go through, the civil and environmental engineering department at the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa has developed a better and cheaper method for adding magnesium to desalinated water, making it fit for drinking and agricultural uses. Under the Technion technique, seawater is the source for magnesium, which is exchanged with calcium using a process called cation exchange.





62 Years Late



The reason was that Hamas had decided to blacklist Carlsson's "fixer"—a person who arranges contacts and interviews for visiting journalists and takes them around. After reluctantly allowing him to enter Gaza, Hamas officials instructed Carlsson to find a new "sponsor" that the group approved.

Carlsson says the restrictions are reminiscent of the former Soviet Union and that Hamas wants fixers to know that the only way for them to make money is not to be critical of the regime. "This is a way to tighten the flow of information," he said.



Rewriting Jewish History

Palestinians are using archaeology to advance their statehood bid. Prominent archaeologist Gabriel Barkai called it "cultural intifada."

The PA will seek World Heritage status for the birthplace of Jesus—Bethlehem—now that the UN's cultural agency (UNESCO) has admitted them as a full member. Hamdan Taha, the Palestinian Authority minister who deals with antiquities and culture, also listed Nablus and Hebron among 20 cultural heritage sites which he said could be nominated as World Heritage Sites.

Professor Taha is a pioneer of the new Palestinian revisionism. Last January, *National Geographic* magazine ran a "Travel Palestine" ad that appeared to blot out the State of Israel's existence. Published by Taha's Ministry of Antiquities, the ad said, "Palestine lies between the Mediterranean coast and Jordan River." This is just one example of Taha's propaganda successes around the world. (See Ben-Hur article on p. 34.)

As their UN bid brings the Palestinians closer to an independent state, the historical and archaeological claims are playing an increasingly prominent role in the building of the national consciousness.

The former Vatican archbishop in Jerusalem, Michel Sabbah, who just promoted an appeal to the UN and U.S. to "stop the Hebraization of Jerusalem," and the current Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, Fouad Twal, who is denouncing the "Judaization of the city," are just two major Christian figures who embraced Taha's rhetoric.


Taha is also mastering a new Palestinian denial meant to cancel any trace of Jewish presence in the Holy Land. According to Taha, the Bible is a "mythological narrative."

On the outskirts of Nablus, Tel Balata, site of Joseph's Tomb, is one of Judaism's holiest sites. Despite Tel Balata being identified with ancient Shechem in Samaria, where the Israelites buried Joseph's bones when they

returned from Egypt, Palestinians now claim that the tomb in reality is the final resting place of Sheikh Yusuf Dukat, a locally venerated Muslim who lived about 150 years ago.

When Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu declared in 2010 that two religious sites, Rachel's Tomb in Bethlehem and the Cave of the Patriarchs in Hebron, would be among 150 Israeli heritage sites considered for renovation, Taha declared that the Jewish character of the two holy shrines was "artificial" and "a robbery." He said that even the Dead Sea Scrolls were "stolen" from Palestinians.

On October 21, 2010, UNESCO formally declared that Rachel's Tomb is the Bilal ibn Rabah mosque, endorsing one of Taha's lies. The world is now told that the Jews stole the past, that the Jewish monuments are Arab treasures stolen by the Zionists, and that the Jews are no more than invading colonizers.

Archaeologist Barkai once said that this revisionism is even worse than Holocaust denial. Yet for now, Palestinians are winning the war to rewrite history.

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Ben-Hur—A Palestinian?


New York Times had to correct). (See "Rewriting Jewish History" on p. 32.)

The Crucifix Provokes Muslims

The Washington, D.C. Office of Human Rights confirmed that it is investigating allegations that Catholic University violated the human rights of Muslim students by not allowing them to form a Muslim student group and by not providing them rooms without Christian symbols for their daily prayers. The investigation alleges that Muslim students "must perform their prayers surrounded by symbols of Catholicism—such as a wooden crucifix, paintings of Jesus, pictures of priests and theologians which many Muslim students find inappropriate."

John F. Banzhaf III, a George Washington University professor, asserts that Muslim students are "particularly offended" because they have to "meditate" at the school's chapels and cathedral, where they pray while "having to stare up and be looked down upon by a cross of Jesus."

Banzhaf notes that neighboring Georgetown University, a nominally "Christian" university, "provides its Muslim students with a separate prayer room and even a Muslim chaplain"—as if it is not well known that Georgetown's Arab and Islam departments receive much largesse by way of donations from the radical Wahhabis of Saudi Arabia—who, incidentally, refuse to permit churches, or even a Bible in their country.

Conversely, consider Muslim behavior toward Christian symbols, specifically the crucifix, where Muslims are the majority and thus in charge.

A Christian student in Egypt who refused to obey his Muslim teacher's orders to cover up his cross was strangled and beaten to death by the teacher and fellow students. When the headmaster was informed of the attack, he ignored it and "continued to sip his tea." As usual, Egyptian

media, insisting the conflict was "non-sectarian," covered it up.

The Maspero massacre, in which the Egyptian military killed dozens of demonstrating Christians—including running over live Christians with armored vehicles—was a product of anti-Christian sentiment. Muslims insisted that a Coptic church be stripped of its dome and cross, so it would not resemble a church. As a Muslim elder put it, "the Cross provokes us and our children." When Christians refused to budge, Muslims destroyed the church. This is what Christians were protesting when the Egyptian military mowed them down to cries of "Allahu Akbar" (Allah is Greater").



Where Islam is weak, Muslims, spear-headed by Islamist organizations like the Council on American Islamic Relations [CAIR], demand respect for their "human rights." Where Islam is strong or dominant, Muslims simply violate the human rights of others. In all cases, the motivation is the same: to suppress all things "infidel" until, in the words of the Koran (2:193), "idolatry is no more and Allah's religion reigns supreme."

Spot on! My friend former Muslim terrorist Walid Shoebat wryly notes, "The evangelicals will give you a headache, but the Muslims will take your head off"—a disparity deftly illustrated in this article. —Myles



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
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
