Lieutenant Colonel Magdi Mazarib is a Bedouin, a Muslim Arab who grew up in northern Israel, intimate with its green, hilly landscape from an early age.

He is also the Israeli army's highest-ranking tracker and commands a small unit of Bedouin soldiers who serve as the Jewish state's gate-keepers. As part of a minority within the Arab-Israeli community, itself a minority among the Jews of Israel, Mazarib is at ease protecting his country's borders from fellow Muslims.

"This is our country," he states in perfect Hebrew with a light Arabic accent. And its Jewish symbols, such as the Star of David or the theme of the national anthem, do not perturb Mazarib. "The flag of England also has a cross on it, and the Jews there are fine with it," he says at the Bedouin Heritage Centre, which houses a memorial to the 182 Bedouin killed fighting for Israel.

What are the defining characteristics of colonialism? It is the movement of one people into the land of another in order

to economically exploit that land through either its natural resources or the wealth of the indigenous inhabitants.

Isn't that what has happened in Western Europe? Muslims, with no historic claim on the lands of Western Europe, have managed to move in by the millions. Then they aggressively and often fraudulently exploit every possible benefit offered by the non-Muslim indigenes: free education, free healthcare at the Western (not Muslim) level, subsidized housing. These and other benefits are offered to those coming from wretched (made wretched by

The amiable officer believes that Bedouin across the Middle East are envious of the way those in Israel live. "The state of Bedouin in Israel is better, as far as the respect we get, our progress, education," he says.

Bedouin are not the only native Arabic speakers in Israel's military, but they dominate the elite tracker units guarding the northern and southern borders.

Drugs smuggled from Lebanon pose a threat. "The axis of drugs, crime, and espionage is the same axis," he says. "There is almost no drug smuggling that is not related to Hezbollah."

Cooperation between the Jewish people and Bedouin tribes began before Israel became a state in 1948, when the northern tribes sided with the Jews, whom they believed would win the war against the Arabs.

In the south, some Bedouin fought against the Jews in 1948; some fought with them. Still others fled the Negev to the Hebron Hills. Israel kept the Negev Bedouin under military rule until 1966 when the Bedouin there accepted Israeli sovereignty and agreed to enlist in its military.

In Israel, the military enjoys status, and a man's army service can be a central component in evaluating his worth. Trackers get plenty of respect, says Amar Khilf, a 19-year-old Bedouin who serves in Mazarib's unit. "A patrol can't go out without a tracker, you can't clear the border without trackers," Khilf says. "Nothing can happen without trackers. You get more respect than regular combat soldiers."



Although Mazarib is following in the footsteps of his father, his uncle, and his brother who also served as military trackers, he doesn't see the same future for his eldest son, who is currently in school. Mazarib envisions his son—the only Bedouin in his class—serving in one of the army's top elite units before taking up a senior role in Israeli society.



To him, the Bedouin integration into Israel's army and society are evidence of the possibility of Jewish-Muslim coexistence, which "could serve as an example of how to solve the entire Jewish-Arab conflict," he says.

Islam) societies—a fantastic cornucopia of expensive benefits.

The Muslim colonists do not accept, but rather begrudgingly put up with, the local laws and customs, but only insofar as these do not directly contradict their own laws and customs. Muslims are suffused with an ideology that teaches them that they are superior to all who are not like them, that is, who are not Muslim. Nothing — no objective observations about the political, economic, social, intellectual, and moral failures of Muslims—gets through and forces them to rethink.

They live battening on those they despise, but whom they must continue (for now) to endure and also prevent from looking too deeply into the texts and tenets of Islam. Muslims find ways to explain away the attitudes of Islam, so obviously dangerous for non-Muslims. That is today's colonialism, the colonizing of non-Muslim lands by Muslims. Over the past 1,400 years it has been the largest and most successful colonialism in modern history. And it doesn't stop.

It should be properly identified. The Muslims who enter Europe are not coming to integrate into European society, to embrace the Enlightenment and the Universal Declaration of the Rights of Man. Nor are they coming to contribute (with a very few exceptions) to the economic or any other well-being of the lands within Dar al-Harb (the area of the world not under Islam and in which Muslims are to wage jihad, holy war for Islam). Muslims come to Europe to get what they have heard—what they know—is generously available for their taking. They take it as by right, as the jizya they deserve but at present cannot exact since Muslims do not yet rule. (Jizya is a tax paid by non-Muslims to Muslims as proof that non-Muslims accept subjection to the Islamic state and its sharia laws.)



The Lord Is Our Refuge



The word refuge appears 111 times in the Bible. It refers to a place of restoration and safety. Its use in Psalm 14:6 is directly tied to the Person of the Lord.

"The Lord is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" is the way the sons of Korah expressed it in Psalm 46:1. (See Myles's column on page 6 to learn this significance.)

Now more than ever, we need to make God our refuge. The instability of these times has taken some by surprise. Many feel themselves adrift, and it seems that our country is beginning to face the challenges that other nations have lived with since time immemorial. Thankfully, the Word is our guide, and ancient Israel's trials and triumphs were recorded as an example for us.

Now all these things happened to them as examples, and they were written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the ages have come. 1 Corinthians 10:11

When the Israelites came across the Jordan River, in Numbers 35 they were instructed:

9 Then the Lord spoke to Moses, saying, 10 "Speak to the children of Israel, and say to them: 'When you cross the Jordan into the land of Canaan, 11 then you shall appoint cities to be cities of refuge for you, that the manslayer who kills any person accidentally may flee there. ... 15 These six cities shall be for refuge for the children of Israel, for the stranger, and for the sojourner among them."

God knew that His people would need this provision in order to avoid wrongful judgment due to accidents. He wanted to allow His mercy a season to operate.

There are two main points that stand out here. One is that God is committed to His righteous view steeped in His mercy. He made sure that those who committed manslaughter would not be considered murderers. The other point leaps from these pages: His inclusion of the "stranger and sojourner" in the refuge plan.

We are to be human "cities of refuge" for those around us. We can provide spiritual safety and a non-judgmental attitude as they learn of the Lord's mercy. In contrast to critical religiosity, characterized by backbiting and slander, we can be those who offer an oasis for those in need. Perhaps they are caught in sin, or have been violated, or have given up hope.

As God's representatives, we can offer a pathway for the stranger and the sojourner similar to the one that God instituted in Bible times. People can use us as a provision to await the true and righteous Judge, who will remember mercy as He finds those who shelter in our midst.

Egypt's Christian Children Pray

In a country rocked by change and division, some 1,400 eight- to fourteen-yearold Egyptian children gathered last summer to worship and ask God to let them be the salt and light for Jesus in their communities.



Egyptian "Donald Duck" Tweets Hate


In most of the world, children's entertainment is about happy, innocent fun, child-friendly education, and positive vibes.

Not so in much of the Arab world, where children's TV programs—from cartoons to poetry recitals [see comment below]—are all too often used as a tool to incite violence and hatred.

Who can forget Hamas's answer to Mickey Mouse, Farfur, who together with his co-host Saraa, preached anti-Semitism and encouraged children to take part in terrorism? [See this history at www.levitt.com/newsletters/2007-09.pdf#page=6 and www.levitt.com/newsletters/2007-07.pdf#page=10.]

At the time, after seeing how the Islamist terror group had appropriated her father's work to encourage genocidal hatred, Diana Disney Miller — daughter of Walt Disney — voiced her disgust to the New York Daily News:

"Indoctrinating children like this, teaches them to be evil. The world loves children and this is just going against the grain of humanity. ... What we're dealing with here is pure evil."





Now the Egyptian voice of Donald Duck has illustrated how such hatred goes far deeper than a pre-written script, adding his voice to the chorus of hate by tweeting a distinctly non-child-friendly message.

Wael Mansour, who on his profile claims to be an "Egyptian Singer, TV & Radio Host... Official voice of Donald Duck in Disney Middle East," tweeted recently that "I truly wish #Israel is demolished, I hate Zionism, I have so much hate inside me with every child they murder or land they seize!"

Media watch organizations such as the Middle East Media Research Institute (MEMRI) and Palestinian Media Watch (PMW) regularly report on the widespread incitement and anti-Semitic



indoctrination which is often broadcast throughout the Arab and Muslim world, though most Western media outlets rarely pick up on it.

Israel's History: All About Roots

The oldest of Israel's trees have lived through wars, religious upheavals, conquests, and defeats; the youngest have seen the return of the Jews to their ancient homeland. What if they could talk?

Cedar of Lebanon at Kibbutz Ma'aleh HaHamisha (Ascent of the Five)

Named for the five members of a pioneer group who were murdered while preparing the ground for their settlement, Ma'aleh HaHamisha was established in

1938. The following year, four cedar trees were planted next to the communal dining room: two Atlas Cedars and two Cedars of Lebanon. When Theodor Herzl was reinterred on the mountain that bears his name, one of the latter cedars was replanted near his grave.




Jerusalem Pine at the Masrek Nature Reserve

As tired, unshaven Palmach* forces neared the hostile Arab village of Beit Machsiain in 1948 during the War of Independence, one of them observed that a row of tall pine trees resembled the teeth of the comb (masrek) he wished he could run through his unruly hair! In time, HaMasrek became the official name of a nature reserve, today part of the Jewish National Fund's Rabin Park.

* Palmach—the elite fighting force of the Haganah, the underground army of the Jewish community during the period of the British Mandate for Palestine.

All four of my children have served in the IDF, and one son remains available for reserve duty. The experience has not only taught each of them the value of our country, but also has built character

qualities that are essential for adult life, especially in Israel.

A few weeks ago, our youngest and many other soldiers whose families are part of our congregation completed their mandatory service. This entails two years for the women and three years for the men. Finishing their grueling period of training, followed

by being under command, is a big deal. These kids are no longer kids. They have become young men and women who've seen too much and have given some of their best years for the sake of defending Israel.

As anyone who stops to look can readily see, our country is surrounded on all sides (with the helpful exception of Jordan) by enemies who passionately desire our destruction. This reality demands a well-trained, seriously armed, constantly alert army. Every family in Israel is touched by this requirement, including all of those in Messianic congregations. That makes the IDF a meeting ground for nearly all Israelis, of every background and national origin.

In fact, one of our biggest national debates concerns the question of mandatory military service for the ultra-Orthodox Jews. Until now they have been granted exemption from the price paid by every other family—sending our children into the IDF to provide security for the entire nation, including those who refuse to serve.

This exemption is now being challenged, however. A popular proposal will require





ultra-Orthodox men to serve a reduced term in the Israeli military. If passed, the measure will help unify the secular and religious sectors in our sometimes divided society.

With sincere appreciation and a father's pride, I want to salute those who are entering, those actively serving, and those who've completed their years of service in the IDF. Your hours without sleep, dark and dusty border patrols, submitting to extensive orders you don't like, questioning suspected terrorists, endless paperwork—and more—all ensure that we Israeli citizens can go about our business with little worry for our safety. Hated of All Nations

Add to the above anti-Semitism the reliable British aversion to Israel and the time-honored Roman Catholic antipathy toward the Jews, and much of the free world is already in agreement with the sad prophecy of Matthew 24.

Ask The Chaplain

In light of what is happening in Egypt, I was wondering what you thought about Ezekiel's prophecy in 29:6–12?

God predicted 40 years of desolation for Egypt. I recently read that when Nebuchadnezzar conquered Egypt, he would have taken captives. Those captives were allowed to return home when the Persians defeated Babylon, and this period could easily be referred to as approximately 40 years; therefore, there is no need to expect a future fulfillment.

That explanation doesn't sit right with me, but thinking that there will be a 40-year period of desolation for Egypt in the future raises many more questions in light of the Rapture and whether or not there is a delay between that event and the start of the seven-year Tribulation.

The historical context of Ezekiel 29 takes place during


the reign of Hophra who was Pharaoh of Egypt from 589-570 B.C.

Ezekiel places the vision as occurring during the tenth year and tenth month, which would be around 579 B.C. (Ezekiel 29:1). This prophecy is about Pharaoh Hophra and all of Egypt; verses 6–12 extend out then to about 568 B.C. In a nutshell, Ezekiel prophesies that Egyptians would experience a 40-year scattering from their land. When did this happen?

A recovered ancient Babylonian chronicle suggests that Egypt was conquered around 568 B.C. Forty years after this date, the Persians instituted a policy of resettlement for many of the peoples who had been dispersed to Babylon, and so the Egyptians were regathered at this time.

There is nothing within the context to suggest that the forty years are eschatological (related to the End Times).

The Forgotten Refugees of 1948

A Google search for 1948 refugees produces 6 million results. All but a few (at least by page six) deal with Palestinian Arab refugees, as if they were the only refugees of 1948. But it is estimated that from the beginning of the 1948 Arab-Israeli War through the early 1970s, up to a million Jews fled or were expelled from ancestral homes in Muslim countries, most to Israel.

In 1948, Middle East and North African countries had considerable Jewish populations. In most cases, the Jewish population had lived there for millennia. Today, the indigenous Jews are virtually extinct. Few know this history because the Jewish refugees of 1948 were granted citizenship by the countries to which they fled, primarily Israel. By contrast, many Muslim countries refused to integrate the Palestinian refugees.

Palestinians monopolize the refugee issue due to institutionalized favoritism at the UN. All non-Palestinian refugees around the world (nearly 55 million) are cared for by the UN Refugee Agency, which is mandated to help refugees rapidly rebuild their lives, usually outside the countries that they fled. But Palestinian refugees (who originally numbered 652,000) have a UN agency dedicated exclusively to them (UNRWA).

UNRWA's unique definition of "refugee" includes anyone "whose normal place of residence was Palestine between June 1946 and May 1948, who lost both their homes and means of livelihood as a result of the 1948 Arab-Israeli conflict." So, in addition to families who lived in the area for generations, UNRWA's definition includes any migrants who arrived as recently as 1946 but were then displaced. And because the definition includes "descendants of fathers fulfilling the definition," UNRWA's refugee population has grown from 652,000 to 5,300,000 today (making resolution of the "Palestinian" refugee issue even harder).



Jewish refugees from Muslim lands rebuilt their lives in Israel and elsewhere. But the fact that they quietly adapted, and that Israel granted them full citizenship, doesn't lessen the wrongs committed by their countries of origin. These refugees suffered legal and often violent persecution that resulted in emotional and physical loss. They lost billions in property and endured huge socioeconomic disadvantages when forced to rebuild their lives from scratch. Israel was unfairly burdened with the colossal social and economic cost of suddenly absorbing so many refugees.





Mideast peace is possible only when Muslim states recognize their role in two historic wrongs: 1) displacing one million indigenous people only because they were Jews, and 2) perpetuating the plight of Palestinian refugees by denying them citizenship. The first wrong requires financial compensation. The second should be remedied by granting full citizenship to Palestinian refugees (and their descendants) who have resettled in Muslim lands. Both wrongs have festered for too many decades.

The Eyes of the Heart

By John J. Parsons

"Keep your heart with all vigilance, for from it flow the springs of life." - Proverbs 4:23

Repentance means learning to see from a radically new perspective. As we change our focus, we see that "everything is new" (2 Cor. 5:17). Perception is a matter of heart, and therefore we choose to see and hear what we want to see and hear (Isa. 6:10; John 12:40). If we do not see God, it's because we have decided to turn away from His presence (Rom. 1:18-22). Our desires determine what we see and how we focus; we choose to interpret reality by an act of will, not by merely seeing with the physical eyes. We believe in order to see, not the other way around, and what we see is therefore disclosed by faith (Matt. 9:29). Often we do not see things as they are, but how we want to see them. We see as we are in our hearts: "As a man thinks in his heart, so is he" (Prov. 23:7).

How you choose to see defines the world you will inhabit. The eyes follow the heart, and therefore seeing is a matter of inner attitude (Matt. 6:22-23). Yeshua said that our problem comes from within: "Out of the heart proceed evil thoughts," and these thoughts show up in our actions (Matt. 15:19; Prov. 11:27). The Spirit of God indeed creates a new heart and spirit within us (Ezek. 36:26), but the "eyes of the heart" must be enlightened by constantly turning to God (Eph. 1:18). We must set the LORD *always* before us (Psalm 16:8). We need the "good eye" of the Spirit to impart purity of heart, thereby enabling us to see the Presence of God all around us (Matt. 5:8; Isa 6:3).

We are told: "Seek and you will find" (Luke 11:9), which implies that you will find whatever it is that you are seeking. Look for the good and the good will be disclosed; look for evil, and you will discover it, too. The optimist believes this is the best of all possible worlds; the pessimist is afraid the optimist is right. Both look at the same world, but both have two radically different visions. We can either put all our energy into not falling, or we can focus on the walk before us. Changing your vision means no longer looking at the hell of your past, but looking to the promise of a glorious future. Focus on God and His great love for you; do not return to the house of bondage,

the prison house of fear. Keep the "eyes of your heart" on Yeshua who is the Light, the Compassion, and the Healing touch of the LORD our God. May you hear Him say,

"Blessed are your eyes, for they see, and your ears, for they hear (Matt. 13:16).

The Truth About Wealth

WISE AS A SERPENT / By Mark Levitt

Materialistic wealth is transitory. Unlike spiritual riches, which accrue in Heaven as well as on Earth, gold and silver must be left behind. The excerpted *Wall Street Journal* article below delves into stewardship strategies to guard against spendthrift tendencies and failure to diversify investments.

Despite heated rhetoric, the top 1% is hardly a fixed group. To the contrary, the wealthiest are the most crash-prone. Private-banking chief Maria Elena Lagomasino has studied why so many rich people she knew were blowing up. Entrepreneurs, tech tycoons, real-estate titans, and even CEOs, who were known for their money savvy, would make millions one year and lose it the next. Her report, called "Beating the Odds: Improving the 15% Probability of Staying Wealthy" grouped the factors into five main categories:

Overconcentration. Rapid riches often involve betting big on a tech start-up, real estate, or gold. When those assets boom, the gains are huge. When values decline, they can take an entire fortune with them.

Leverage. Debt amplifies gains and magnifies losses. Unexpected changes in the rich's businesses or incomes can turn manageable debt levels into wealth destroyers.

Spending. Some rich folks' spending exceeds their cash flows and returns, leaving them one crisis away from a financial collapse.

The "toxic cocktail." The first three reasons are often linked, with the newly wealthy betting big and borrowing big on a business, then using their paper wealth to fund a large




lifestyle. These three factors can unwind at the same time, instantly destroying huge fortunes.

Family issues. These include divorce, inheritance battles, and family-business disputes.

Investors and entrepreneurs may stay wealthy by using new financial tools. They should avoid having more than 20% to 30% of their net worth in a single asset. Limiting debt is also critical to avoiding crashes. Experts say a family's debt shouldn't exceed 25% of its assets.

Entrepreneurs who launch companies and bet everything on their success are loath to cash out too soon. Smarter would be to regularly sell off small chunks of their stock as soon as their companies go public. They may be losing some upside, but they are building a critical safety net in case of a fall.

Aside from being the most crash-prone, "How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!" (Mark10:23). The WSJ article suggests worldly wisdom for beating the mere 15% likelihood of preserving worldly riches. The Bible gives heavenly insight for 100% success at inheriting The Kingdom. 



Predestination or Free Will?


Dear ZLM Theologians,

Detecting Babies in Hot Cars

Israeli Advances in Science & Medicine

Well before the current spate of tragedies involving infants being left in broiling cars, a smattering of Israeli companies were busy working on solutions to prevent such occurrences. According to **Kidetect**, which uses sensors to detect when a child has been left in a car, 160 such incidents were reported in Israel from 2008 to 2012. The Kidetect system (\$225) opens all the windows and sets off the car alarm.



There are "all sorts of situations" in which parents might forget their kids in the car, says Arieh Israeli, who developed a similar system called Kiddy Guard. When Kiddy Guard's motion detectors and weight sensors determine a child has been left in a parked vehicle, it alerts the driver by text message and a car key beep, while automatically opening the window.

"Despite the fact that everyone says: 'It will never happen to me' because we're connected to the child, we don't take our eyes off him, we check on him several times a night—despite it all, it happens," Israeli says.

Intervox, a system designed for school buses and other special vehicles, uses voice sensors to detect distress before setting off the alarm, sending a message, and even sending images to a central computer for monitoring.

Parents can find a pricey car seat that connects to a smartphone, which not only lets the parent know if he has left his kid in the car, but also reminds him to buckle in his kid, monitors temperature, lets him know if his child has gotten out of the seat, and even sends an alert to an emergency contact's email address.

At a mid-range price, parents can get a clip that sets off a little reminder every time the parent moves more than 15 feet from the baby's car seat. For those parents who want a little reminder but don't want to deck out their cars with new technology, a handful of mobile applications are available.

For Android users, the Don't Forget Your Baby app will subtly tell you out loud, in English, not to forget your baby the moment your phone disconnects from any pre-selected Bluetooth device in the car.

Baby Reminder, a free iPhone application, lets users enter their regular child pick-up and drop-off times. iPhone users who don't want an app can simply schedule a location-based reminder to alert them when they've reached their destination.

Low-tech solutions exist as well.

Life Belt is a keychain that clips into a strip tied around the steering wheel. When you park and unclip your keys, the bright orange strip catches your eye with the phrase "I'm waiting for you in the back."

Chronic Stress Leads to Disease

Constant low levels of cortisol destroy normal regulation of the immune system, putting stressed-out people at risk of autoimmune disorders.

An intricate dance goes on between our immune and neurological systems, and by analyzing the microscopic choreography, Israel's Prof. Alon Monsonego has made a unique discovery. As he explained in the European Journal of Immunology, chronic stress leaves us more vulnerable to developing an autoimmune disorder. Every neurological syndrome involves the immune system, says Monsonego.

When we experience an episode of acute stress-a traffic accident, for exampleour adrenal glands release the hormone cortisol, the stress hormone. Cortisol temporarily suppresses the immune system and adds glucose (sugar) to the bloodstream in seconds, giving our bodies optimum power to get through the dangerous or frightening episode. But when we experience chronic stress - say, caring for a relative with Alzheimer's or working under pressure—we've got low levels of cortisol coursing through our blood all the time.

After a while, the constantly present stress hormone permanently damages immune-system cells, and the cells that survive become aggressively resistant to the hormone. In other words, chronic stress causes a breakdown in the normal regulation of the immune system. And that can lead to autoimmune diseases, in which we produce antibodies that destroy our own tissues. These diseases include multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, and Type 1 diabetes.

"Which one you develop depends on genetics and environment," Monsonego says, adding that chronic inflammation from conditions such as arthritis also triggers the release of cortisol.



A test to measure effects of cortisol

Chronically stressing lab mice who were exposed to a disease similar to multiple sclerosis, Monsonego and Ben-Gurion University of the Negev colleagues Dr. Idan Harpaz and Prof. Hagit Cohen showed that the mice were more prone to develop the disease than they were under normal conditions. The effect was more significant in female mice than in male mice. Not surprising, since more women than men develop autoimmune disease. The Israeli team's revelation of the mechanisms that cause damage to immune-system regulation is unprecedented. The potential practical applications of this discovery are immense.

Because not everyone reacts to stress in the same way, a blood test to measure the effect of cortisol on immune-system functioning would provide a valuable tool for preventing an autoimmune disease from developing, Monsonego says. "A certain lifestyle may not be stressful to one person but very stressful to someone else. For people who are in danger of any type of chronic stress, early detection can help them pay attention to it and reduce stress before they get sick."

For those who already suffer an autoimmune disease, the same blood test would help physicians determine appropriate doses of the synthetic cortisol (steroids) generally prescribed as treatment for these diseases. Monsonego is now completing a study with his collaborators on the physical effects of chronic stress on earlystage Alzheimer's patients and their spouses.

EU: Hezbollah Military Are Terrorists

The European Union's 28 members recently declared the military wing of Hezbollah a terrorist organization, dealing a political blow to the powerful Lebanese group. "It is good that the EU has decided to call Hezbollah what it is: a terrorist organization," said Dutch Foreign Minister Frans Timmermans.

There was no immediate official reaction from Hezbollah, a dominant military and political force in Lebanon where it heads a leading bloc in national politics and participates in the parliament. The Hezbollah-linked al-Manar news agency labeled the decision a capitulation to pressure from Washington, which has long listed Hezbollah as a terrorist organization.

The EU blacklisting implies that members associated with the group's military wing could be denied visas, and assets associated with Hezbollah could be frozen. The move could complicate fundraising efforts for the Lebanese group, which is closely allied with Iran.

The fact that the EU singled out the group's military wing and did not blacklist its political side was significant, analysts said, since it indicated the EU's desire to maintain some kind of relations with Hezbollah's political side. However, untangling who is tied to the group's military operations and who is strictly political could prove difficult.

Hezbollah's general secretary, Hassan Nasrallah, is widely seen as the political and military leader of the group, which arose out of the 1982 Israeli conflict with Lebanon. Hezbollah also fought a 34-day war with Israel in 2006.




"We should not forget that Hezbollah is a significant political force in Lebanon, and we must be able to have contacts with the movement regardless of what we think of its activity," Swedish Foreign Minister Carl Bildt told journalists before the EU meeting.

One complicating issue is the fact that hundreds of European troops participate in a UN peacekeeping force along the "blue line" separating Israeli and Lebanese territory. The UN troops are deployed in a sprawling zone of southern Lebanon that is meant to be a buffer with Israel, but is considered Hezbollah's heartland.

The European decision comes months after Bulgarian authorities accused Hezbollah of complicity in a suicide bombing on a bus in 2012 that killed five Israeli tourists and one Bulgarian in the Black Sea resort of Burgas, drawing

Hezbollah has also thrown its military weight behind the government of Syrian President Bashar Assad in its more than two-year conflict with an insurgency led by mostly Sunni Muslim rebels. The formal entry of Shiite Hezbollah into the conflict in neighboring Syria has enraged many Sunni Muslims in Lebanon and elsewhere.

Islam on Cows, Horses, Camels, & Women

One of the few positive developments following the rise of the Islamists during the "Arab Spring" is that today many average and/or nominal Muslims are seeing the true face of Islam and its teachings. And many—as evinced by Egypt's ousting of the Muslim Brotherhood—don't want to deal with it.

For example, during a recent episode of *With Dr. Islam Buhira* on Al Qahira Wa Al Nass TV, Buhira explained how he had attended "a conference in Morocco on the status of women in society, post Arab Spring," and how at the conference, the following interpretation of the Koran by renowned Islamic exegete, al-Qurtubi (d.1273), was read: "Women are like cows, horses, and camels, for all are ridden."

After quoting al-Qurtubi's words, Dr. Buhira continued in a disappointed tone: "This is how al-Qurtubi speaks about women, who include his mother, his daughters, basically all Muslim women. He says they are 'all ridden.' This is what makes them similar to animals." The idea that "Women are like cows, horses, and camels, for all are ridden," is recorded in *Tafsir al-Qurtubi* (see vol. 17, p. 172), one of the Islamic world's most authoritative exegeses (religious commentaries) on the teachings of the Koran. In fact, comparing women to beasts is not uncommon in Islam, tracing back to Prophet Mohammed himself, who is recorded saying, "Women, dogs, and donkeys annul a man's prayer" (Musnad Ibn Hanbal, vol. 2, p. 2992).

I have previously translated and discussed Mohammed and the Koran likening women to animals in the context of how female concubines in Islam are not deemed human, as the Arabic relative pronoun used in the Koran to indicate captive sex-slaves is "it"—as in an animal—not "she" (e.g., Koran 4:3).



Even so, many Muslims, including women, are only now learning about these texts and teachings. The fact is, many Muslims really don't know much about Islam beyond the Five Pillars. But they have been conditioned to believe that whatever sharia says must be laudable and judicious—sharia being the law of their god as delivered by their beloved prophet. Moreover, in the last couple of decades, the slogan "Islam is the solution" became popular as a panacea to all of society's ills.

That is, until it went from being theory to reality.

The president of the Christian Association of Nigeria says his nation's 80 million Christians are being terrorized by Boko Haram, an Islamist sect whose name means "Western education is sacrilege." "Ritual slaughter": slaughter of animals for food following religious prescriptions. The Muslim method to produce *halal* ("lawful" or "permissible") meat consists of cutting conscious animals' throats while the name of Allah is uttered and letting them bleed to death. This makes it objectionable to most non-Muslims on animal welfare grounds. Christians and others also consider the utterance of Allah's name at the moment of slaughter as idolatry.

A major concern is that halal meat is no longer just for Muslim consumption, but is sold to "infidels" in ever greater quantity the world over. According to Islamic law, organizations providing halal certification must pay zakat (tax).

Therefore, whenever you buy one of the many halal-certified products, even without your knowledge, you are indirectly contributing to Islamic terrorists. Buy halal and you fund jihad against Israel. (Many Islamic "charities" have known links to terrorism.)

When Helen Keller Confronted the Nazis

One of Adolf Hitler's top priorities when he became chancellor of Germany in 1933 was to prevent schools from using books that the Nazis regarded as "degenerate." Eighty years ago, Germany was transformed into one huge funeral pyre for any books that differed from the Nazis' perspective on political, social, or cultural matters, as well as all books by Jewish authors.

The Hitler regime chose May 10, 1933 as the date for a nationwide "Action Against the Un-German Spirit," a series of public burnings of the banned books. The gatherings were organized by pro-Nazi student groups under the supervision of the Minister of Propaganda Joseph Goebbels.

The largest of the 34 book-burning rallies, held in Berlin, was attended by an estimated 40,000 people. Books by German Jews such as Albert Einstein and Sigmund Freud were burned, as well as books by the British science fiction writer H.G. Wells and many American writers, including Ernest Hemingway, Jack London, and even Helen Keller.

"No to decadence and moral corruption!" Goebbels declared in his remarks at the rally. "Yes to decency and morality and state!... The soul of the German people can again express itself. These flames not only illuminate the final end of an old era; they also light up the new."

A New York Times editorial sarcastically suggested that the Nazis might next begin "burning microphones" to stamp out free speech. TIME called the Nazis' action "a bibliocaust," and Newsweek described it as "a holocaust



of books." This was one of the first instances in which the term "holocaust" (an ancient Greek word meaning a burnt offering to a deity) was used in connection with the Nazis.

The outcry around the world included this moving letter from Keller, addressed to "the Student Body of Germany."

"History has taught you nothing if you think you can kill ideas," Keller wrote. "Tyrants have tried to do that often before, and the ideas have risen up in their might and destroyed them. You can burn my books and the books of the best minds in Europe, but the ideas in them have seeped through a million channels, and will continue to quicken other minds. I gave all the royalties of my books to the soldiers blinded in the World War with no thought in my heart but love and compassion for the German people."

"Do not imagine your barbarities to the Jews are unknown here," she added. "God sleepeth not, and He will visit His Judgment upon you. Better were it for you to have a mill-stone hung round your neck and sink into the sea than to be hated and despised of all men."

With all her physical challenges, Helen Keller saw, heard, and felt more clearly than many of her generation ... and ours. Rise up, you who belong to the God of Israel! —Myles



Digging The Tabernacle in the Wilderness

In the Bible, during the Hebrews' 40-year trek in the wilderness, the Tabernacle was described as a movable tent that housed the Ark of the Covenant and accompanied the Israelites as they made their way to the Promised Land.

Now, archaeologists in Israel think they've discovered one place where the Tabernaclealso known as the Tent of Meeting - was parked, a discovery that has political significance today.



The Bible describes the Tabernacle as constructed of wood and fabric, not materials designed for thousands of years of survival. Even so, archaeologists have been searching for the past few years for evidence of the Tabernacle. That search has focused on a site believed to be the ancient city of Shiloh and has yielded some intriguing findings. Archaeologists found holes carved into the ground into which beams of a temporary structure could have fit.

Hananya Hizmi, staff officer for archaeology in the Civil Administration of Judea and Samaria, says, "This is not something that was common in private residences and therefore we do not believe these structures served as family dwellings." This being the Middle East, the discovery inevitably has a political dimension. It's also located in Samaria, part of what Palestinians and most countries refer to as the West Bank.

With the Palestinians demanding that Israel give up Judea and Samaria, and the international community continuing to refer to the region as "Occupied Territory," this evidence of millennial-old Jewish connection to the land is significant. According to blogger Yisrael Medad who resides in the modern Israeli community of Shiloh:

The Arabs seek to negate and ignore any element of national ethos or Jewish historical connection to this land-which is important since, as we know, the 1920 San Remo Conference and League of Nations decisions of international law specifically noted the "historical connection" between the Jews and this country. ... The digs at Shiloh, deep in the heartland of the Land of Israel-which is not the Land of Ishmael-are important in countering Arab claims.



Jerusalem Holy to Jews, Not to Muslims pt.2

Jerusalem Day annually celebrates the reunification of Jerusalem under Jewish sovereignty during the 1967 Six-Day War. It is not every day that an ancient people come into repossession of its holiest city and age-old capital in a victorious war over enemies who, literally only a week before, had been waxing enthusiastic at the prospect of obliterating them.

Yet various governments withhold recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital and call for its re-division — this time with the eastern half of the city, illegally seized and annexed by Jordan in 1948, going to a proposed "Palestinian" state.

To understand why this is neither likely nor advisable, it is worth revisiting four key issues: history, demography, law, and security. Last month's Levitt Letter looked at history and demography. See www.levitt.com/newsletters/2013-09.pdf#page=33

Law: As with Judea and Samaria (mistakenly called the West Bank), the eastern half of Jerusalem was unallocated territory (under international law) that had been illegally occupied by Jordan until Israel conquered it in 1967. It is additionally part of the territory earmarked for a Jewish homeland at the San Remo Conference in 1920 that also drafted the League of Nations Charter. This decision, enshrined in the British Mandate for Palestine that shortly followed, has never been superseded by an internationally binding agreement. As the former president of the International Court of Justice Stephen Schwebel pointed out, Israel—having captured eastern Jerusalem in a war of self-defense against an illegal occupier—has a better claim to it than any other party.



Security: Any division of Jerusalem not only carves out part of the heart of the Jewish people but would also endanger Israel by introducing terrorists within rocket and rifle range of the western half of the city. Just as Sderot near Gaza has been subjected to years of incessant rocket and mortar fire from territory handed over to Palestinian control, resulting in almost half its citizenry leaving for safety, the rest of Jerusalem could share the same fate if the eastern half of the city were given to PA control.

One day, Arab-Jewish peace may come about. But there are no good reasons why Jerusalem's re-division—an act that would stunt the city, uproot Jewish habitations, overrule its resident majority, negate Israel's legal title, and endanger its inhabitants—should be part of any settlement.

Israel advocates have long alleged that their country is portrayed in an unfair and one-dimensional way by the international media, largely as an oppressor of the Palestinians.

Now i24news—the first international channel dedicated to reporting the news from an Israeli point of view—means to tell the rest of the Israel story in English, Arabic, and French.

The new station's founders insist they are not an Israeli version of the Qatarfunded Al-Jazeera pan-Arab channel. They receive no government funding, hold no political affiliation, and pledge to cover the news dispassionately and objectively.

The initiative highlights a deep-seated sense that Israel is losing the battle over international public opinion and that its voice has been missing from a smorgasbord of news outlets.

"When you talk about Israel in the international media, it is only through the perspective of the Arab-Israeli conflict. We have to show that there are a lot of things about Israel that people don't know about," said Frank Melloul, the channel's chief executive. "What I want to do with this channel is to connect Israel to the world and connect the world to the Israeli reality."

To do so, i24news broadcasts around the clock, devoting 30 percent of its content to local coverage, including culture, technology, and sports.

Its spacious studios in Jaffa, an ancient port city merged with Tel Aviv, include three glass-encased sets for simultaneous broadcasts in three languages, along with an integrated news desk for its 150 journalists.

The station went on the air in late July, and though it is not yet clear how many people are watching, i24news



says it can potentially reach 350 million households via cable and satellite operators in Europe, Asia, and Africa. An expansion to the North American market is expected in early 2014.

Melloul, a former French diplomat, helped launch France24, a satellite channel aimed at improving France's image. Other governments engage in similar outreach efforts: Russia Today, China's CCTV, and Qatar's Al-Jazeera.

The Israeli effort is funded by private money. Much of it comes from Patrick Drahi, a French-Israeli telecom tycoon who owns an Israeli cable network of TV channels and telephone service providers. Melloul said private ownership frees the station from government intervention.



i24news's Arabic broadcast looks to show a different face of Israel by highlighting its diversity. The channel's main English-language anchor, for instance, is an Arab woman. The content also tries to spotlight the tough choices the country faces.

A report about an Israeli Cabinet vote to release Palestinian prisoners ahead of renewed peace talks was followed by an in-studio debate between two parents over whether the killers of their children should be freed in return for the prospect of peace.

"It is part of the diversity of the Israeli society, and part of showing the world that nothing is easy," Melloul said. "You can discover a face of Israel you don't see anywhere else in the world."
