Not every Israeli observes Passover, but every Israeli knows Passover is coming. Preparations for the seven-day holiday are impossible to ignore, visible in almost every facet of life in the weeks leading up to Seder night.

Israel's Central Bureau of Statistics reveals that 88% of Israelis take part in a *Seder* [Passover dinner]; 47% eat only *kosher* [Jewish dietary law] during the holiday.

Some 200 Israel Defense Forces (IDF) chaplains are pressed into service for the massive task of koshering the hundreds of kitchens, mess halls, and eating corners used by soldiers at bases countrywide. According to Capt. and Rabbi Zev Roness, "The army prepares more than a month before Passover to ensure that all of the army kitchens meet the highest kosher-for-Passover standards."

Street scenes in Israel change every day before Passover according to what's halakhically [according to Jewish law] necessary: Several days before the Seder, young men wielding blowtorches preside over huge vats of boiling water stationed every few blocks on the street and in the courtyard of every mikveh (ritual bath).

The lines to dunk metal utensils grow every day as overwrought mothers, anxious to cleanse every last gram of *chametz* [leavening] from their homes, lug oven racks and stove tops through the streets. At the last minute before the Seder, blowtorches blast away the chametz.

No alarm clock is needed in the pre-Passover period—clanging garbage trucks do the trick as they roll through the neighborhood every morning for two weeks before Passover to accommodate all the refuse from the furious cleaning going on. Two days before the Seder, there's the annual pickup of oversized items and appliances. Dozens of antiquated computer monitors and old toaster ovens stand forlornly next to the garbage bins.

The day before Passover, families seek out empty lots to burn the remainder of their *chametz*. Sputtering fires dot the city despite the Jerusalem municipality signage for the location of official *chametz* burning bins. Flower shops stay open all night for the two days before Passover, working feverishly to complete the orders that will grace the nation's Seder tables.

For observant Jews, a prohibition against cutting hair during the seven weeks between Passover and *Shavuot* [Pentecost] jams barber and beauty shops with customers in the pre-Passover days.

Mailboxes overflow with appeals to help the poor. Newspapers fill with articles about the hundreds of Israelis who volunteer in the weeks before the holiday to collect, package, and distribute Passover supplies to the needy.

In Jerusalem alone, more than 40 restaurants close a few days before Passover. They clean out their kitchens and re-open with rabbinic supervision to serve

kosher-for-Passover meals to tourists ... and to the hordes who are sick of cooking after the Seder.




With jihad on the rise and the West in a seeming stupor, this world clearly needs an outpouring of the Spirit of Sar Shalom — the Prince of Peace. The community of faith needs revival and a social awakening, like the movements of the past.

During the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, Americans experienced a number of awakenings (between 1727 and 1882). In the twentieth century, the 1904–1905 Welsh Revival changed the United Kingdom and the world. In 1906, the year of San Francisco's historic earthquake, God visited Los Angeles with a spiritual earthquake at the Azusa Street Revival. The modern African spread of Christianity began in East Africa during the 1930s.

The current rebirth of the Messianic Movement connects to the 1970s' Jesus People Movement, when certain visionary leaders welcomed young hippies into fellowship. Leaders like Chuck Smith in Southern California and Don Finto in Nashville became a blessing to the young Jews who were flooding into places where the Word was going forth. Pastor Chuck led Calvary Chapel and helped build the Yardenit—the popular baptism site on the Jordan River, and Don Finto wrote the seminal Your People Shall be My People. In the book, Don chronicles his journey from Replacement Theology to recognizing the relationship between Israel, the Church, and Messiah's second coming. Don's book has opened the eyes and hearts of thousands, including many pastors.

Two names stand out in the Jewish world of that era: Moishe Rosen who founded Jews for Jesus and Zola Levitt. Moishe took evangelism to the streets, and Zola brought Israel to the airwaves. Through Zola's creative partnership with TV producer Ken Berg, millions of households have learned about Christianity through Jewish eyes.

Katharine and I benefited greatly from the foundational work of those pioneers. I often say that we stand on the shoulders of giants.

But the hour is late, and on our watch we see the calls for a global caliphate, as jihad repeatedly strikes at civilization.

As some in the Church awaken to the Jewish identity of their Messiah, many others are drawn into new permutations of Replacement Theology, like the one that revises history to claim that Yeshua was a "Palestinian" freedom fighter whose work was a political and social justice battle with the evil Jewish rulers of His day.

Yeshua is the promised Messiah of the Jews who came to give His life for the lost sheep of the house of Israel and then mercifully open the door to the gentile world, so that

"none should perish" (2 Peter 3:9).

I remain in awe at what I witnessed last night. Our local Shabbat gathering *(shown below)* prayed in Arabic, English, Hebrew, and Farsi. We prayed for His peace and for deliverance from darkness, including the bondage of Islam.

Stand FIRM and Take Action!

In times of trouble, it helps to have the perspective of Elohim. For example, during these times when men seek to control the destinies of nations and steer multitudes away from the God of Israel, the Bible tells us in Psalm 33:10–11, "The Lord foils the plans of the nations...But the plans of the Lord stand firm forever."

Psalm 2 says that while the nations rage against the Lord and His anointed, "He who sits in the heavens shall laugh, the Lord shall hold them in derision," showing that the plans of the Lord remain firm no matter what men do.

The Lord calls us in these days of prophecy's birth pangs (Matt. 24:8) and times of trouble to know our God and to "stand firm and take action" (Daniel 11:32).

The Lord, through His grace, allowed Myles and me to join the board of FIRM (Fellowship of Israel Related Ministries). FIRM.org.il states: "FIRM is a global fellowship of Biblically-grounded believers committed to cultivating Messiah-centered relationships that bless the inhabitants of Israel—Jews, Arabs, and others—and the Jewish community around the world." This allows the Body

of Messiah not only to connect with national Israel but, more importantly, to connect with the Body of Messiah in Israel.



Psalm 122:6 instructs us to pray for the peace of Jerusalem—the only national capital that our Lord directs us to pray for. A practical way to do this is to take FIRM's 1% challenge. Give 1% of your time daily to pray for Israel and the Jewish people. One percent amounts to about 14 minutes per day—praying for their peace, God's protection over them, their sensing God's presence among them, and that God's heart for the Jews will be revealed to the world. Even when we can't spend the whole time in prayer, we can hold them in our hearts. It isn't the religiosity of 14 minutes; it is about carrying the heart of God.



1945-2015: Seventy Years Later

OUR MAN IN HAIFA By Eitan Shishkoff (r) with wife Connie

How did it feel to descend into that Italian village cellar, filled with German soldiers? I never asked my dad that, but I wish I had—that and a hundred other questions about his combat experience in World War II. He said that he captured the German platoon single-handedly, and I believed him. My father never exaggerated, nor did he boast. In fact, he did his best not to discuss the war. His clipped sentences told us that it was gory and sad beyond description.





It's now seventy years later and a fitting time to remember. My mother and father both served in World War II. She was an officer in the U.S. Navy. Dad led infantrymen in the U.S. Army and saw action in Europe and North Africa. I'm proud of their medals and of their selflessness in giving prime years to help defeat the hideous monster of Nazism.

The Allied Forces brought victory to Europe in 1945. Numerous concentration camps were liberated that year, including Auschwitz-Birkenau, Buchenwald, Bergen-Belsen, Dachau, Ravensbrück, Mauthausen, and Theresienstadt. These very names conjure images of unimaginable suffering by millions, especially the six million Jewish men, women, and children who were systematically and ruthlessly slaughtered between 1941 and 1945.



Auschwitz survivor Elie Wiesel's extensive writings relive the nightmare. Long before winning the Nobel Peace Prize, Wiesel penned *Night*, a gripping account of his teenage years in the death camp. What surprised me was his statement of hope amid the total darkness: "We decided that, if we were granted our lives until liberation, we would not stay in Europe a day longer. We would take the first boat to Haifa." Knowing that Israel had risen from the ashes to become a home for Jewish refugees, the prisoners dared imagine a future.

One cannot understand the nature of Israelis without touching the Holocaust. Our intensity, our drive to defend ourselves, our assertiveness with each other, the invisible backdrop of trauma — all these trace back to the immeasurable tragedy that ended seventy years ago. I do not justify wariness, arrogance, or mistrust. But awareness of the utter devastation that preceded Jewish escape and *aliyah* (coming home to Israel) from the death camps is essential for Believers to participate in the Messianic revival promised by the prophets.

Israel and Jewish people everywhere are still threatened with extinction, now—in 2015. Ironically, Europe again provides a prime stage for this sickening drama to unfold. This time, the foe is a terror-drunk "caliphate" driven by hate. To whatever degree we Believers can stand up, speak up, and lift up our best prayers, we must. It is time to identify with the sons of Jacob—as in my parents' generation—with sacrificial courage.

Whereas you have been forsaken and hated, so that no one went through you, I will make you an eternal inheritance, a joy of many generations. — ISAIAH 60:15





Our theme for the Seder was Jesus in the Passover. Our people loved it. Because it was a meal, we had to limit attendance to eighty-eight people. Our gym couldn't hold any more tables. In fact, we turned people away.

I look forward to next year and having Rabbi M. R. back with us. I just wanted to share this with you and let you know we love you and God's people.

I'm glad you have discovered the joys of knowing your Jewish roots. Passover may be the finest Bible study of them all (along with the other Feasts). If the letter of rebuke by the pastor who despises Jewish things dismayed you, see the following letter. — Zola

Dear Zola,

I think the pastor who disagreed with Christians attending a Passover Seder was exactly right. I respect the Jewish traditions for they point to Christ. But you are <u>causing division</u> in the Body and creating <u>strife</u>. You elevate yourself by the <u>flesh</u>, not the Spirit, who would do <u>no</u> such <u>thing</u>. It was also <u>accusatory</u> like Satan. — P.C.

Dear P.C.—

The pastor was *not* right. He was wrong. Scriptural facts are not a matter of opinion. If you respect Jewish traditions, defend them. Where does it say Christians are supposed to be the nicest people in town? Peter and Paul wouldn't subscribe to that, and it would surprise the Lord as well. I certainly don't mean to cause division but merely to teach. I am not elevating myself but trying to rightly divide the Word of God. (2 Tim. 2:15)

Satan's mission is to persuade Believers that our sins are not forgiven by the Cross, and that we need to worry about them day and night, thereby becoming ineffective teachers of the Gospel. I was not correcting the pastor's sins, which like mine and yours are completely forgiven, but rather his lack of knowledge. In cursing Jewish things, he has violated one of God's mightiest precepts: the Abrahamic Covenant in which the God of Israel said, "I will bless them that bless thee and curse them that curse thee" (Genesis 12:3).





If I am wrong, correct me. When your pastor is wrong, correct him. We are "called soldiers" in an army I wouldn't want to belong to if that army is always dressed for a parade and saying nothing but kindnesses to one another and the enemy. —Zola

Moslem Mob Attack on Niger Churches

In protest over the cartoons lampooning the Prophet Mohammed in the French magazine *Charlie Hebdo*, Moslems in Niger set fire to at least 45 churches and looted the homes of a number of Christian ministers. Ten people were killed. Followers of Christ fled for their lives.

The horrors in that West African nation did not generate much press coverage. There were no solidarity marches for Niger's tiny Christian community. There was no wall-to-wall cable news coverage. The Associated Press account was four paragraphs. *USA Today's* coverage lacked any commentary from pastors or priests. But they did find an imam who reminded the newspaper's readers that the Islamic faith is peaceful: "Don't forget that Islam is against violence," he said as the ruins of 45 Christian churches smoldered across the nation.

But the story of what really happened during that terrifying time deserves to be told. Something rather remarkable happened when the mob attacked one pastor's house.

"While the mob was burning the front of the house, his Moslem neighbors came in through the back and they hauled out clothes and everything they could get through the back window," missionary Neal Childs related.

The following day Neal and his wife surveyed the ruins of the church house.


"It was still smoking and warm with ashes. As we were looking through the rubble, my wife came across the Bible." The Bible was charred but not destroyed, and it caused a stirring in the hearts of the Christian couple.



Franklin Graham, of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, posted a photograph of the Bible on his Facebook page, along with a sobering thought: "Can you imagine the international outcry if this were the Koran?" Can you imagine the international outcry if Christians burned 45 mosques?

But that's not what happened in Niger. The Christian community did not retaliate. They did not respond with angry voices.

"That's because we are people of mercy and grace and faith," Neal said. "We don't react in the flesh and we don't react out of anger. We keep preaching the Gospel and living as an example before the people."

Praying for the Peace of Jerusalem

Your ministry closes each broadcast and letter by quoting from Psalm 122:6, but how do you reconcile that verse with the following verses in the Book of Jeremiah: 7:16, 14:11, and 16:5?

I don't mean to sound argumentative.
I'm a Christian who prays for the Jews.
They are God's chosen people.

To pray for the peace of Jerusalem looks forward to the Second Coming of the Lord

Jesus—the Prince of Peace—who will bring permanent peace to Jerusalem, the Middle East, and the whole world when He reigns for a thousand years (Revelation 20:1–6). Then, and only then, will the prayer of Psalm 122:6 be truly answered.

The verses in Jeremiah refer to the evil generation of Judah in Jeremiah's day who were not given peace. Because of their idolatry and disobedience to the Lord, they were taken away into Babylonian captivity never to see the land of Israel or the city of Jerusalem again.

In your Jan. 2015 newsletter (page 33), Sean Savage tells us of the little golden bell discovered by Eli Shukron. The paragraph states, "The golden bells needed to ring when the high priest entered the Holy of Holies."

Please note: Leviticus 16 tells us that when the high priest entered the Holy of Holies, (which he did only once a year on Yom Kippur), he had changed from his high priestly garments into plain white linen with no bells nor other decoration. I fear that Savage's statement perpetuates the third-century myth that the High Priest had a rope tied around his ankle so he could

be dragged out if the bells stopped ringing. Another untruth.

Good observation. The Torah stipulates (Exodus 39:26) that the bottom hem of the High Priest's robes should alternate with pomegranates and bells. So bells were part of the holy garments. However, you are correct: When entering and coming out of the Holy Place and the Holy of Holies, the high priest would be dressed in unadorned white linen garments. When the atonement rite for national Israel was finished, he would take off these garments and wash in a mikveh. When ceremonially cleansing the Tabernacle itself, he put on not only the linen garments but also the holy (belled) garments (Lev. 16:32).

You're also right about the apocryphal tale of the rope being tied around the high priest, which gets too much airtime today. There is no ancient document or source corroborating this practice.



Comment from Myles:

Todd deserves credit for tying the final knot on the rope-on-the-priest *mishigas* (Yiddish for craziness. Knot-rope pun intended.). I can't count how often I have heard this rope story from church pulpits! The meaning and beauty in Scripture regarding the Tabernacle service needs no dramatic enhancement.

"I Will Show You Great and Mighty Things"

JEREMIAH 33:3 By Todd Baker

While spreading Yeshua's gospel in Eilat, Israel, I witnessed to Noam, a 27-year-old college student studying psychology. He was very open and friendly but flat-out told me that he was not sure if God really exists. I recounted to Noam my former life as a smug, vitriolic atheist who did not believe in the existence of God no matter what anyone told me.

But God met me where I was. Yeshua, God in the flesh, revealed His visible *Shekinah* (divine presence) glory to me thirty years ago, fully convincing me that the God of the Bible does exist, and that the Scriptures are His infallible Word. My experience encouraged me when hearing Noam say that he needed a similar event to occur in his life in order to believe in God and Yeshua as the Messiah.

I reminded Noam of God's promise in Jeremiah 33:3, where He expresses a desire for us to call on Him with our whole heart, promising to show us "great and mighty things" which we did not know. At this point, Noam asked me to pray for him to receive such a revelation pointing to Yeshua.

I explained to him that the *Tanakh* (Hebrew Bible) narrates the promised

coming of the Messiah, and the *B'rit Hadashah* (New Testament) announces His arrival with the virgin birth of Yeshua. I asked Noam if he would like to read about the life of Jesus the Messiah in the New Testament. He answered, "Yes," adding that he had studied only an overview of Jesus in school.

To his astonishment and delight, I produced a Complete Hebrew Bible with the Old and New Testaments and cheerfully offered it to him for his serious study. I explained that Zola Levitt Ministries' To The Jew First outreach visits Israel often in an effort to reconnect the Jewish people with Jesus and the God of Israel's inspired Word about His Son. Noam exclaimed, "I am blushing with surprise. I did not expect this!"

My Gospel witness for the Lord Jesus concluded by assuring Noam that if he truly seeks the Lord with an open and honest heart, the promise of Jeremiah 33:3 will be kept because God is eager to reveal Himself through His Son for Noam's salvation. Retiring Your Nursing Home Concerns



Nursing home expenses are less likely to break the bank than most people believe. Now you may be able to put to bed a worry that has generated a specialized type of insurance. The excerpts below come from a recent article by financial columnist Scott Burns. The statistics he offers could inspire you to bank what you otherwise might spend on premiums. —Mark

Question. I'd like your opinion for sheltering our money. I'm 67 and my wife is 62. Our pensions are adequate, and I'm collecting Social Security. Our IRAs are substantial as are our savings; we're in fairly good shape. We believe, however, that one of us going to a nursing home could exhaust our savings. How can we ensure the other will still have money to live on?

Answer. There is no direct way to shelter your savings from the possible, but not inevitable, cost of long-term care (LTC). Purchasing an LTC insurance policy would involve an annual premium, which could increase. Such a policy would pay for the bulk of possible LTC costs whether you remain at home, become a resident of an assisted-living facility, or live in a nursing home.

But before you do that, let's consider a different perspective. First, you probably have enough financial assets to support LTC for awhile. Your Social Security and pensions should cover your basic expenses.

Genworth is one of the major providers of long-term care insurance. Their 2014 survey of long-term care indicates these median costs per year:

- \$41,184 to have a home health aide
- \$42,270 for one person in a private, one-bedroom unit in an assistedliving facility
- \$50,735 for a semi-private room in a nursing home
- \$65,700 for a private room in a nursing home.

For most people, these costs represent a fast track to poverty. However, your odds are against running out of money because most nursing home stays are relatively brief. How brief? A 2010 study published in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society found that only 27.3 percent of those dying in the study period lived in a nursing home prior to their death. The median length of stay (half stayed longer, half stayed shorter) was five months. Sixty-five percent of nursing care residents died within one year of admission. The average length of stay was 14 months, due to a small number of people who had very long stays.

Viewed another way, 72.7 percent of those dying won't need nursing home care, and 65 percent of the 27.3 percent of those who do will die within a year of admission. This suggests that about 90 percent of the population will either have no need for a nursing home stay or will stay less than a year.

The Great Lamb of God

The story of Passover goes all the way back to the beginning, to Eden itself, when Adam and Eve broke covenant with God and ate from the forbidden tree. Because of their transgression, our original ancestors incurred the plague of death and were exiled from the Divine Presence, though God graciously promised to heal them through the coming Seed of the woman—the Savior who would crush the head of the serpent and break the fangs of his venomous sting (Gen. 3:15). Soon after making this great promise, God clothed our original parents with the skin of a sacrificed lamb (Gen. 3:21), linking their coming deliverance with the "Lamb of God slain from the foundation of the world" (1 Pet. 1:18–20). The very first "Passover" was in the garden. And the story of Passover extends to the world to come, where in the redeemed paradise of God we will celebrate the victory of the Lamb who was slain for our redemption (Rev. 5:12–13).

The account of our redemption is revealed on two levels in Scripture—one that concerns the paradise of Eden (the universal level), and the other that concerns the paradise of Israel (the particular level). Therefore, Yeshua is *both* rightly called the "Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world" (John 1:29) *and* "the Messiah, our Passover Lamb Who has been sacrificed for us" (1 Cor. 5:7). Likewise, He is called the "Seed of the woman" and "the Son of David"; He is the "Second Adam," and the "King of the Jews," and so on. Israel's redemption in Egypt, therefore, serves as a picture of both the universal salvation promised in Eden (i.e., the lamb slain from the foundation of the world) as well as the revelation of the sacrificial ministry of Yeshua as Israel's promised Messiah. Yeshua is both the Savior of the world as well as Israel's King and Deliverer.

Though God instructed each household to select its own lamb for the Passover, the Torah refers to "the" Lamb of God, as if there was only one: "You shall keep it [i.e., the Passover lamb] until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall slaughter him (in) at twilight (Exod. 12:6). Indeed there is only one "Lamb of God" that takes away the sins of the world, and that is our Savior, Yeshua the Messiah!

This Passover Season let us join the great refrain of the heavenly host by boldly proclaiming: "Worthy is the Lamb Who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!" (Rev. 5:12). Amen.







"My Grandfather Would Have Shot Me"

In the mid-1990s, near the end of the period during which she lived in Israel, **Jennifer Teege** (r) watched Steven Spielberg's film *Schindler's List*.

It was not until years later that Teege, a German-born black woman who was given up for adoption as a child, discovered that one of the central characters in the film, **Amon Goeth**, (r) was her grandfather.


Many viewers recall the figure of Goeth, the brutal commander of the Plaszow concentration camp in Poland—played in the film by Ralph Fiennes—from the scenes in which he shoots

Jewish inmates from the porch of his home. But Teege, who had not been in touch with either her biological mother or biological grandmother for years, had no idea about the identity of her grandfather.

During a 2008 visit to a library in Hamburg to look for material on coping with depression, she happened to notice a book with a cover photograph of a familiar figure: her biological mother, Monika Hertwig (née Goeth). She immediately withdrew the book, which was titled *I Have to Love My Father, Right?* and based on an interview with her mother.

"The first shock was the sheer discovery of a book about my mother and my family, which had information about me and my identity that had been kept hidden from me," Teege says. "I knew almost nothing about the life of my biological mother, nor did my adoptive family. I hoped to find answers to questions that had disturbed me and to the depression I had suffered from. The second shock was the information about my grandfather's deeds."

Teege embarked on a long personal journey in the wake of the unknown family heritage and published the memoir *Amon* in German in 2013. It is due out in English in April under the title *My Grandfather Would Have Shot Me: A Black Woman Discovers Her Family's Nazi Past.*

Regarding your statement about a child's right to "freedom from religion," I believe that decision is best left to the parents. I am wary of a government coming between people of faith and their responsibilities as parents. I draw the line when a religion (no names, but it may be a political ideology of world domination in the form of a "religion") inculcates children with hatred and encourages murder to advance the cause.

About criminal activity among Jewish people: of course, there are "bad apples" in every group. I take to heart what our friend Walid Shoebat, former PLO terrorist, says, "The Jews and Christians will give you a headache, but the Moslems will take your head off"... big difference! Raymond Ibrahim gave this excellent analysis on pp. 8–9: "The Old Testament is clearly describing historic episodes; whereas the Koran, while also developed within a historical context, uses generic, open-ended language that transcends time and incites believers to attack and slay nonbelievers today no less than yesterday."

Christianity teaches adherents to "love one's enemies" and has undergone positive reformation through the centuries.

The Koran and the hadith are currently being used to justify the kinds of action we see in ISIS, Hamas, Hezbollah, Boko Haram, al-Qaeda, and the PA,

all of whom celebrate the slaughter of non-Moslems and name streets and town squares after homicide bombers who kill Jews and Christians.* Hope this helps — Myles



Ski Goggles You Control with Your Eyes

Outdoor sports buffs are abuzz with news of novel augmented-reality ski goggles. The **RideOn** prototype looks like a regular pair of protective eye gear, but the Israeli visual tech and engineering experts behind the new product say RideOn is "the world's first true augmented-reality (AR) goggles for skiing and snowboarding."

The idea that Israelis—who live in a hot country—would revolutionize the way snowboarders and skiers move may seem ridiculous. But Alon Getz, CEO and cofounder of RideOn, says that while the film *Cool Runnings* was based on a Jamaican bobsled team "with nowhere to practice, Israelis have a local ski resort, and tens of thousands of Israelis go to Europe every winter to ski."

Getz, along with two friends, software engineer Ori Kotek and entrepreneur Zur Erez, came up with their idea of augmented-reality glasses for navigating, playing, and interacting through eye movements. "We wanted to find our locations on a ski resort map instantly, or to quickly contact each other when we'd get separated. We wanted to do these things without having to take our gloves off, or use our phones," says Getz.

They created a floating UI (user interface) with which the wearer interacts without losing visibility. The RideOn system can identify if you're moving or inactive and shows content on the screen depending on your position.

Soon, those days of fumbling with the ski map and trying to find your run will be a thing of the past. With RideOn goggles, you can get off the chairlift, stop and look around, and the screen in front of you will tell you how to get to red, green, black, or blue runs. It will also navigate you to the nearest ski lodges, restaurants and bars, as well as find ski-lift locations and check queue wait times. The goggles also have a play feature that lets you compete against yourself and your friends in various games and improve your time and accuracy.

"Everybody that puts these goggles on their head is amazed," says Getz. He and Kotek say they expect a sizeable demand for their goggles, which target a worldwide ski market of around 115 million people in 80 countries. They believe RideOn goggles will revolutionize the ski experience.





Diagnosing Cervical Cancer by Smartphone

Every two minutes somewhere in the world, a woman dies from cervical cancer, the leading cause of cancer death among women in developing countries. This is an avoidable tragedy, as cervical cancer is easily treatable. Ariel Beery, a 35-year-old former New Yorker living in Israel, was so troubled by this grim statistic that he and his childhood friend, optics expert David Levitz, determined to do something about it as fast as they could. Their company, MobileOCT, has developed a low-cost imaging device that transforms a smartphone camera into a colposcope that allows community healthcare workers to detect and treat cervical cancer without the need for electricity or running water—or even a clinic.

"More than five billion people around the world have access to mobile phones, but not to a physician," Beery explains. "We can do on a mobile phone what a \$100,000 device can do, with 10 times better magnification than using just the naked eye, raising diagnostic accuracy significantly."

MobileOCT is developing point-of-care diagnostic solutions for oral and skin cancer as well. But Beery explains that he focused first on cervical cancer because of the urgent need. "If we have the potential to save lives, we have an obligation to do so as quickly as possible," says Beery. Advanced beta prototypes are already being used to take diagnostic images of patients in Kenya, Botswana, Haiti, Mexico, and the United States through collaborations with Partners in Health, Massachusetts General Hospital's Global Health group, the University of Pennsylvania, and Scripps Health in California. The final product version will enable optical biopsies as well.

"We learned from partners in the field that they want to start imaging right away, for documentation of sexual violence and training purposes," Beery explains. "Healthcare providers worldwide often have little ability to document those cases for legal and healthcare purposes, and they need to understand the effects of sexual violence and follow-on complications that might occur. We have a moral obligation to provide, as quickly as possible, a device they could start doing that with."



Pending positive results from clinical trials in Israel, California, Connecticut, and Pennsylvania, the optical biopsy capability is expected to be added on later. Over time, increasing levels of accuracy could be added to the examinations in the field.

"Our company began as

a biomedical optical company, using light to characterize tissue," Beery explains. "We're still working toward that as a clinical research aim."

Gynecologist Bruce Kahn of the Scripps Clinic has said that he believes this breakthrough imaging technology could one day replace the Pap test for cancer and HPV testing everywhere.



How Jewish Reporters In Islamic Lands Hide Their Identity by RON KAMPEAS (1) JTA.org



Don't bring it up. If it comes up, change the subject. If you can't change the subject, consider an outright denial. Those are some of the strategies used by Jewish reporters working in the Arab and Muslim Middle East to conceal their religious heritage.

Dual American–Israeli citizen **Steven Sotloff**, beheaded in 2014 by ISIS, was likely not targeted because of his Jewishness; **James Foley**, another journalist kidnapped by ISIS and beheaded a month earlier, was Catholic.

The captors of **Daniel Pearl**, a *Wall Street Journal* correspondent kidnapped and beheaded by terrorists in Pakistan in 2002, made a point of Pearl's Jewishness. In the video showing his execution, they included Pearl saying "My father is Jewish, my mother is Jewish. I am a Jew" among his final words.

As ethnic and sectarian origins loom large in every encounter, keeping Sotloff's Jewish identity under wraps made sense, said Janine Zacharia, who has reported in the region for *The Washington Post*.

"The first question whenever I met anyone in the Arab world was 'where are you from,' and they weren't asking whether it was the United States or Canada—it was 'are you a Muslim or a Jew?'" said Zacharia, who now lectures at Stanford University. "I would say, 'I'm from New York or D.C.,' and if they persisted, I would say, 'My grandfather is from Greece,' which is true. I didn't want to say what my religion was," she said.



Another Jerusalem-based correspondent, who asked not to be named because she is still reporting in the region, said, "You hear it in conversation. 'You're not a Jew, are you?'" This correspondent, who knew Sotloff, said of Libya during the overthrow of Muammar Gadhafi in 2011, "There was so much indoctrination against Jews, but they didn't know Jews."

Many governments in the region tend to ban entry to Israel-based correspondents, regardless of religious heritage. Jerusalem correspondents traveling to Arab




Jewish Reporters in the Middle East

"60 Minutes" correspondent **Lara Logan** (right) was repeatedly sexually assaulted by thugs yelling, "Jew! Jew!" as she covered the chaotic fall of Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak in Cairo's main square in February of 2011. The day before, Logan had told Esquire.com that Egyptian soldiers hassling her and her crew had accused them of "being Israeli spies." Logan is not Jewish.

In December 2012, chief foreign correspondent for NBC News **Richard Engel** and his crew were in an area of Syria they believed was held by rebels when they were jumped by heavily armed gunmen, believed to be pro-regime and trained by Iran's Revolutionary Guard. Engel's captors used psychological but not physical torture, hoping to exchange the journalists for comrades held by the rebels. Engel, whose father was Jewish, later said that his captors knew little about him and his crew.

CBS News correspondent, **Bob Simon**, 73, the embodiment of the fearless foreign correspondent, died in February in a car accident in New York City. In 1991, during the Persian Gulf War, he crossed into Iraqi-controlled Kuwait where Iraqi soldiers saw him and three crewmen and captured them. They were taken to Baghdad where they were beaten with canes and nearly starved for 40 days—a time he called "the most searing experience of my life."



"We got beaten up a lot, and badly," he told the *Los Angeles Times* in 1992. "But in my mind, I found I reached a certain accommodation with the beatings. Your instinct immediately afterward is to check, 'Can I see? Can I hear? Am I OK in the vital parts?"

He knew the situation was bad but knew political prisoners in Iraq had it much worse. During one interrogation, an Iraqi captain forced open his mouth, spit in it and called him a Jew, which he was. He was based in Israel.

After he was released, he said CBS News offered him his choice of several assignments, but he wanted to return to Tel Aviv, where he had been based since 1977.

"People find it funny," he told *Newsday* at the time, "that I'm probably the only journalist who goes there to relax."

An Israeli journalist walked for hours around Paris while wearing a Jewish *kippa* (yarmulke) to test attitudes toward Jews and documented multiple threats and insults hurled in his direction.

Zvika Klein, (shown below) a reporter for the news site **nrg.co.il** and *Makor Rishon* daily newspaper, released the footage from his recent walk around Paris and its suburbs.





Many anti-Semitic incidents occurred while Klein was walking in the suburb of Sarcelles, which sports a large Muslim population, whereas his wandering through the center of Paris was considerably calmer by comparison.


In one scene, a person wearing a black knit cap said "Jew" and walked alongside Klein, who was being filmed secretly by a colleague wearing a backpack fitted with a rear-pointing recorder. In two separate incidents, one involving a man and the other a woman, passersby spat in Klein's direction as he walked past them.

In another part of Paris, passersby called out "Vive Palestine" at him. In several cases, locals hurled profanities at Klein, calling him a homosexual and suggesting he had come to their neighborhood looking for sex.

His video, <u>10 Hours of Walking in Paris as a Jew</u>, drew inspiration from Shoshana Roberts whose <u>video</u> shows her being sexually harassed repeatedly while walking

around New York City.

The number of anti-Semitic incidents recorded in France more than doubled in 2014 over the previous year, reaching a five-year-record of 851 instances.

Moslem Dutch Mayor: Integrate or Leave

Just hours after the *Charlie Hebdo* shootings, the Moroccan-born mayor of Rotterdam told Moslem immigrants who do not appreciate the way of life in Western civilizations, "pack your bags and leave."

Labor politician Ahmed Aboutaleb, a former journalist who was appointed mayor of the Dutch city in 2008, is known for his straightforward stance on integration. The 53-year-old won the praise of London mayor Boris Johnson over his comments attacking fellow Moslems who move to Western nations but refuse to accept the Western way of life.

Johnson hailed Aboutaleb as "straight to the point." He added, "If we are going to win the struggle for the minds of these young people, then that is the kind of voice we need to hear—and it needs above all to be a Moslem voice."

Mayor Aboutaleb grew up the son of an imam in northern Morocco, but moved to the Netherlands in 1976.

Killers Honored as 'Martyrs'

Palestinian terrorists mercilessly slaughter unarmed Jewish civilians, and rather than be subjected posthumously to scorn and rejection, they are held aloft as "martyrs" and role models. Such was the dignity paid to **Ghassan** and **Uday Abu Jamal** (below) who stormed a synagogue in Jerusalem during morning prayers in November, butchering Jewish worshippers with meat cleavers and a pistol.

These blatant glorifications of terrorism were all but ignored by the mainstream international press, which continues to insist the Palestinian Authority is a moderate and viable peace partner.

Passover Conveys Message of Jewish Unity

Between 19 BC and 4 BC, King Herod I renovated the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem, enlarging and beautifying it. During this period, Jewish pilgrimages to Jerusalem occurred on what are known as the *shalosh regalim*, "three pilgrimage festivals."

All of the festivals—Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot—center around the story of the Exodus in some way. But Passover is the first and foremost of the bunch.

Jerusalem always held a special place in the hearts of the Jewish people, but as the Romans built roads and as Herod expanded the Temple, the pilgrimage to Jerusalem became commonplace and served as a message of unity—"one Temple, one God, one Passover"—for all of the Jews, said Prof. Jonathan Klawans of Boston University's Department of Religion.

Yet detailed writings about what the pilgrimage festivals may have looked like during Temple times don't exist. According to Talmudic scholar Dr. Joshua Kulp, author of *Schechter Haggadah: Art, History and Commentary,* most knowledge on the subject comes from the works of the ancient historian Josephus. While later writings (such as the New Testament) describe what it was like in Jerusalem during the Second Temple era, those works were written at a later time.

It isn't known where people stayed or slept when they were in Jerusalem, or how many people were there (though most assume a large number), or what people felt at that time. What is known, Klawans says, is that the pilgrimages were a social experience that pulled the Jewish people together.

It's also clear that for Passover, pilgrimage participants ate in Jerusalem as family units. A representative from each family would take an animal, bring it up to the Temple, and have it slaughtered. Then the representative would bring the animal back, and the family would cook and eat the sacrificial meat. During this festive meal, families also drank wine, but not a specific number of glasses. They sang songs—specifically, the *Hallel* prayer [Psalms 113–118], which is also part of the modern Passover *Seder*.

According to scholars, the Passover *Seder* as we know it today was developed between the destruction of the Temple (70 AD) and the end of the Rabbinic Period (500 AD).

"The Seder we have today is an organized meal with instructions," said Kulp. "The Seder tells us how many cups of wine and

when to drink them. It tells us when to wash our hands, to say blessings. There is even a ritualized way of telling the Passover story."

But exactly how much of the contemporary *Seder* relates to the pilgrimage meals? Klawans said it isn't so much that the formulaic *Seder* aligns to the pilgrimage and sacrifice, but rather, that the perception of that connection is the key to understanding Passover.

"Is having a *Seder* like going to the Temple? There are obvious differences. But the perception of continuity really drives people," he said. "Jews today in

Pennsylvania or Boston or Jerusalem are holding *Seders* at the same time and in basically the same way, and that is significant for us.

Tova Hametz, who lives in the Old City of Jerusalem, echoes Klawans's sentiment, but adds that she believes a deep unity can be felt to this day in Jerusalem, which she calls "the epicenter of the universe."


"It is the holiest place," she says. "We are in HaShem's backyard. Now that all the Jews are scattered in exile, we sometimes forget about belonging here [in Jerusalem], where one still can experience the inspiration and community consciousness of being together in celebration."

Hametz lives on a narrow street, about 6 feet wide, through which passersby navigate to reach the *Kotel* (Western Wall) from the Jaffa Gate. On Passover, thousands of people walk down her street.

"I open my door and I can sit on the front steps with my daughter and watch as they flood down the street," she says. "And it is not for an hour or two, it is all hours of the day and night. They come in masses—some running, some walking. Every kind of person you can imagine. Every variety of dress. Every size and background and color."

While Hametz says she can only try to imagine what it must have been like when the Temple existed in all its greatness, she focuses on living in the place where the next Temple *could be built* at any moment. And on Passover, as the throngs of rowdy people keep her up in awe, she tries to remain conscious of what it means to be a Jew.

Hametz says, "Seeing the experience of everyone coming here, to the *Kotel*, together—that is what it means to be in Israel, to be a Jew, to be a part of the whole."





Cuneiform Tablets Reveal Life of Jews Exiled to Babylon ARCHAEOLOGY JNS.org / news service



A new Jerusalem exhibit opened in February displays ancient clay tablets found in Iraq that reveal what life was like for Jews exiled from Judea to Babylon more than two millennia ago. The 100 cuneiform tablets show transactions and contracts between Jews



forced into exile by Babylonian King Nebuchadnezzar around the year 600 BC.

The tablets belong to the Al-Yahudu archive, named after the southern Iraq city where the exiled Jews settled. Purchased by an Israeli collector in London two years ago, each tablet is no bigger than a hand palm and focuses on one Judean family over four generations, all of whom had biblical names.

"It was like hitting the jackpot," said Filip Vukosavovic—an expert on ancient Babylonia, Sumeria, and Assyria — who curated the exhibition at Jerusalem's Bible Lands Museum.

"We started reading the tablets and within minutes we were absolutely stunned. It fills in a critical gap in understanding of what was going on in the life of Judeans exiled in Babylonia more than 2,500 years ago."

"They were free to go about their lives, they weren't slaves," Vukosavovic added. "Nebuchadnezzar wasn't a brutal ruler in that respect. He knew he needed the Judeans to help revive the struggling Babylonian economy."
