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If I forget you, O Jerusalem, may my right hand cease to function. May my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you, if I do not exalt Jerusalem as my greatest joy! (Psalm 137:5–6)

There's no place that's more central to Jews and Christians than Jerusalem. It's the city of the kings and prophets, the place where Jesus preached, worshiped, and was crucified. As central as Jerusalem is to our history and our faith, Jerusalem faces a threat to be redivided today. This threat to Israel's sovereignty, however, is not from one of our enemies.

From the 1840s, the U.S. had a consulate in Jerusalem, then under the Ottoman Empire. When Israel declared independence, and Jerusalem became its capital in 1948, the consulate became a U.S. diplomatic outpost in Israeli Jerusalem. But the U.S. established its embassy in Tel Aviv because it did not recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital,

Epiphany and the MagiBy Gail Seidel / Bible.org

The visit of the Magi (recorded in Matthew 2:1–11), celebrated on January 6, marks the end of the 12 Days of Christmas and

is also known in the church calendar as Epiphany—"the appearing."

The name "Magi" may be derived from the Persian word *magoi*, referring to those who were deeply interested in religion, including the study of the stars and their impact on human events. Scholars think "the east" could refer to the Medes and the Persians or perhaps to the Chaldeans.

While we know little about these men who followed the spectacular star, their demeanor is especially noteworthy. They told King Herod

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David's Awe of God's Word and Righteousness


(Psalm 119:129-144)

1. David's Awe of God's Word (119:129-136)

David knew that God's Word is His communication to His people. Therefore, David cherished the Word in his soul. The Word of God is His complete library, communicated through the Holy Spirit, to the writers whom God chose to record it.

Paul wrote to Timothy that the Word, "is able to make us wise unto salvation" (2 Timothy 3:15).

David continues in Psalm 119:130, where he writes that the Word gives light and understanding. He makes a special point to say the Word is for "the simple";

regardless of a person's station in life, that person can understand God's Word. This is not a putdown. Instead, it points to God's mercy in making His Word available to all people.

In the next section, starting with verse 131, David makes an interesting comparison: He longs for the Word to quench his spiritual thirst, just as someone in the sweltering heat longs for their physical thirst to be quenched.

In verses 132–135, David calls on God for mercy, direction, protection from his enemies, and further instruction. Like David, we should spend time meditating



on God's Word and praying for the discipline to obey it. We must also call on God for His mercy, direction, protection from our enemies, and further instruction.

David ends this section by stating how distressed he is because people ignore the law. In verse 136, he says, "Rivers of water run down from my eyes." This offers a clear picture of the sorrow David felt because God's law was not being respected and obeyed.

2. David's Awe of God's Righteousness (119:137–144)

David writes in verse 137 that the God of the universe is righteous. This was comforting to David, and it should be to us, too. No matter what is going on in the world around us, and regardless of what personal failure we experience, God will deal with us in His righteousness.


God never changes. Hebrews 13:8 emphasizes this about our Lord: "Jesus Christ, (continued on next page)

the same yesterday, today, and forever." This should invoke a hallelujah from you!

Verse 138 tells us that God's "testimonies," or His law, are also righteous. They are true from the beginning to the end.

David turns attention to himself in verse 139. He is astonished and disgusted that men would ignore the commands of God. He expresses his anger and is concerned that it may consume him. If you've heard of "righteous indignation," then you know what David was experiencing.

In verse 140, David describes God's Word as "very pure," and he loved it.



And in the next verse, we read David's humble description of himself. He struck a balance between his humility and his unwavering commitment to God's Word.

Verses 142–144 complete this section, as David concludes with three reminders:

- 1) God's righteousness is everlasting.
- 2) God's law is truth.
- The righteousness of God's law is everlasting.

Finally, David asks God for a greater understanding of His Word. This prayer will also serve us well.

forthrightly that they came to worship this star-foretold King. They had their gifts ready. Seeing the Christ Child prompted adoration, giving, and worship. Afterward, God warned them in a dream not to follow Herod's instructions, so they returned to their country by another route.

God was purposeful in including the Magi in the narrative of the Christ Child—the One

called Emmanuel, the Word in human flesh (Matthew 1:23; John 1:1, 14). The revelation of Christ to the Magi is a symbol of His revelation to the whole of the gentile world to all nations.

Rather, it is a clarion call for us to worship the same Christ they worshiped in the first century. Psalm 95:6–7 says, "Oh come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our Maker. For He is our God; and we are the people of His pasture, and the sheep of His hand."

The patriarch Abraham was known by the name *Avram* (the Hebrew version of Abram) when he lived in the land of Ur in Mesopotamia. In Genesis 11, we learn that Terah, his father, set out from Ur to go to the land of Canaan, but ended up settling in Haran with his whole family. From what we see in Scripture, Avram thrived in Haran. One day, however, God called on Avram to "go" from that place into the land of Canaan. And with the command to go, God also gave him wonderful promises. Even though Avram and his household were beginning an unknown venture, God assured them that He would bless them.

Sometimes it's easy for us Believers* to stay where we are. We get comfortable; we know and relish our routines. Fear of the unknown often keeps us from venturing into uncharted territory. Yet from Avram's story, we see that when we follow God's prompting, our new normal includes blessings beyond our dreams.

While Avram's name meant "exalted father," he was childless. For decades, he lived with a name that constantly reminded him of his inability to produce offspring and establish his lineage. But God called Avram to trust Him and to trust His promises. When Avram was faithful and reached his destination, God gave him a second promise: he would have a son. In addition, God promised that Avram's "seed" (offspring) would be like the stars—impossible to count. Later, God confirmed this by giving him the name Avraham, which means "father of a multitude."

One thing David and I have learned over our 32 years of marriage is that we should not stay put when God is calling us to "go!" For it's in the *going*—the obedience—that God's blessings come. And we must do our part. We must be willing to "pack up our tents" and head out into the unknown.

Are you ready? Are you willing to give up the *known* for the *unknown?* God has wonderful plans for you. I'm already anticipating your unexpected blessings.

Non-Jewish Children with Jewish Names

As he lists the names of his grand-children, **Joop van Ooijen** recites what sounds like a roll call in a typical Israeli classroom: Yair, Odelia, Netanya, Yoaz, and Shilon are some of his grandkids with modern names.

But neither the van Ooijens nor their 16 children are Jewish. They are a Protestant Christian family in the Netherlands, which is one of a handful of places in Europe where it's common for non-Jews [gentiles] to have names that are perceived as being distinctly Jewish.

"We're a devout family, and the Bible is always present in our lives — which means Judaism is always present in our lives, and we named our children to reflect that," said van Ooijen, a 69-year-old chemicals retailer.

Besides popular Biblical names like Simon, David, Ruth, and Esther, other distinctly Jewish Biblical names seem to be common in devout Christian circles in the Netherlands.

But many Dutch parents who aren't religious also give their children Jewish-sounding names because they perceive the Bible as part of Dutch heritage and are drawn to the short, decisive sounds of Hebrew names.

"We didn't want something foreign and English-sounding, but we also wanted a serious name that carries a certain weight for when the child grows up," stated Jantine Vonk, a 35-year-old mother of two, Aron and Thirza.

The popularity of Biblical names in the Netherlands has risen significantly since the 1980s. Thirza, for example, was virtually nonexistent in the 1950s. But from 1990 onwards, at least 20 babies were named Thirza, with the peak occurring in 2000 with about 120 Thirzas. [Thirza is a



variant of Tirzah, one of the daughters mentioned in Numbers 26:33. Also, the city of Tirzah is first mentioned in Joshua 12:24.] With boys, the same trend is visible in Levi, a name that almost no one received in 1980. In 2014, there were at least 8,000 Levis in the Netherlands.

Some families have discovered a downside to their children's Jewish names. "There's a lot of anti-Semitism in the school system," van Ooijen noted. "Our children with Jewish names got pestered, some even bullied for it."

Chris Vonk, the father of Aron and Thirza, said, "We considered the possibility that our children might be teased or pestered because they have Jewish-sounding names, but we decided to give them those names anyway. Kids will always find something to tease with. So let it be with those names."



We Americans are led to suppose that war in the Middle East is almost constant and that Israel herself never stops fighting. In one sense, there's some truth to that; the Israeli people haven't really been able to relax since 1948, when they were restored to the Promised Land. God promised to restore them, but His message through the prophets includes many warnings about conflicts. Peace will not come to the Middle East until the Prince of Peace Himself establishes it.

But if we consider war around the world, a surprising truth emerges. An Israeli native pointed out that since the war for Israel's independence, Israelis have only spent 27 days in actual combat. That's all! Probably no 27 days in all history have received so much media coverage nor scared so many people so much. In contrast, our own nation was at war for some eight years in Vietnam and three years in Korea during the same period. The Russians spent similar stretches of years extending their empire, and they're still at it.

Now admittedly, when the Israelis go to war, they are efficient. They bring everything they have and they use it 24 hours a day. Virtually everybody in the country is in the army, and it's a wonder that things haven't been much harder for them. But if we take the Biblical reports as given, the Lord goes to the battle with His people and He looks after them. And when He says that they will remain in the

land (Amos 9:15), He means what He says. Israel will fight another few days before all is said and done, but their enemies will never succeed when they try to cross God's boundaries.

At least two more wars are scheduled in prophecy for Israel, and the Holy Land will survive them as usual. The Russian Invasion, at the beginning of the Tribulation Period, will be another of those "instant wars," and the Battle of Armageddon will be stopped by the King when He comes.

Until that time when the fighting gets spiritually serious, there's little to worry about. We know that our Kingdom is secure. In the meantime, we should remember to look upwards to Heaven because peace is on the way.

Jewish Fan Schooled Charles Dickens

As a writer, literature professor, and a U.S. Jew, I am pained when authors whom I admire launch exaggerated or misinformed attacks on Israel. I was distressed when Irish novelist Sally Rooney declared that she wouldn't allow her latest novel to be published in Hebrew by an Israeli publisher "that does not publicly distance itself from apartheid and support the UN-stipulated rights of the Palestinian people."

With their focus on words, writers should do better, especially when they organize, join, or promote anti-Israel endeavors. If their misrepresentations are without malicious intent, they're in desperate need of further education.

Over a century ago, one reader sought to so educate Charles Dickens.

Dear Mr. Dickens, a picture book recently written by Nancy Churnin, tells of the exchange between Dickens and Eliza Davis, a Jewish woman who wrote to protest anti-Semitism in Oliver Twist.

Davis (1817–1903) wrote that Dickens's portrayal of "the Jew" Fagin in *Oliver Twist* landed "like a hammer on [her] heart," as Churnin writes. To Davis, Fagin promoted "a vile prejudice" against her people. This bewildered Davis, who had considered Dickens heroic because he "used the power of his pen to help others."

In response, Dickens wrote that Fagin was based on real-life Jewish criminals. "Any Jewish people who thought him unfair or unkind— and that included Eliza!— were not 'sensible' or 'just' or 'good tempered," Churnin relates. Davis tried again, but Dickens didn't respond.

Yet the Jewish character in his next novel, the estimable Mr. Riah in My Mutual Friend, was no Fagin. After that novel appeared, Davis thanked Dickens for "a great compliment paid to myself and to my people." The author's

response was much warmer. In a magazine essay, Dickens referred to Jews as "an earnest, methodical, aspiring people." And in a later version of *Oliver Twist*, Dickens instructed the printer to remove references to "the Jew" and to use Fagin's name instead.

There's another aspect of Eliza Davis's story that resonates: Instead of calling Dickens out publicly, Davis approached him one-to-one.

Against the tide of rising anti-Semitism, *Dear Mr. Dickens* provides a positive, action-oriented message of *tikkun olam*—the Jewish value of repairing the world. The book also promotes an important message about confronting injustice with written words.

Although I've occasionally gone public, private communications with writer-friends and acquaintances—especially after the May 2021 war between Israel and Hamas—have proven far more fruitful, yielding corrections, deletions, and other changes. For this, I've expressed thanks.

I don't expect "great compliments to me and to my people" from authorial idols and colleagues. All I'm seeking is fairness and freedom from vile prejudice.

despite its 3,000-year Biblical history and its choice as modern Israel's seat of government.

The Jerusalem Embassy Act of 1995, a bipartisan law, declared Israel's capital as Jerusalem, noting it "should remain an undivided city," and called for the U.S. to move the embassy there. Because of a clause that allowed successive presidents to defer doing so, moving the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem didn't happen until 2018. Then the consulate that had been operating as a separate entity was closed and merged its work into that of the embassy. So, what's the problem?

For over 3,000 years, Jerusalem has been the heart and center of Biblical Israel, the Jewish people, and modern Israel. The Bible mentions Jerusalem over 600 times, but it is never cited in the Koran.

The stand-alone consulate was grandfathered in when Israel restored sovereignty and when Israel reunited Jerusalem in the 1967 Six-Day War. But U.S. policy remained schizophrenic: supporting Israel but not Israeli authority in Jerusalem. The consulate became a diplomatic office to "the West Bank" and, at the time of the Jerusalem Embassy Act of 1995, a diplomatic office to the newly-created Palestinian Authority (PA).

I live in the Judean mountains, over the "Green Line" from what was Israeli territory before 1967, sometimes called "the West Bank." For years, U.S. diplomats came to this area to assess and report back on life on

the ground. I hosted many such diplomats in my home, offering them tours and insight into modern Jewish life in Judea. Invariably, the same diplomats would visit me before or after visiting Palestinian Arab communities nearby with the same agenda.

Besides being invited to the U.S. Embassy's Independence Day celebration, for several years the U.S. Consulate invited me to their parallel celebration on another day.

The parallel celebration included not only Jewish ("settler") leaders from "the West Bank," but also Palestinian Arab leaders. One year, I found myself very close to then-Prime Minister Salam Fayyad of the PA. For people supposedly not able to live together, we coexisted fine in the consulate's backyard.

The U.S. Consulate is closed, and presumably, the U.S. can find another venue to celebrate its independence with Palestinian Arabs and Jewish Israeli "settlers." But now, the Biden Administration wants to reopen the consulate as its diplomatic office to the PA, in a building in central Jerusalem that is part of sovereign Israel. Such a move is unprecedented — one nation having a diplomatic office to another entity in the capital of a third nation.


Opening a U.S. Consulate to the PA in Jerusalem is a dangerous precedent. It will not bring peace but will push peace further out of reach. Recognizing PA sovereignty over any of Jerusalem presupposes the outcome of negotiations that should be resolved between the parties. Even if the tried-and-failed "two-state solution" is the default U.S. position, setting up a consulate to the PA in western Jerusalem contradicts that. This would embolden

> from Israel on other issues. specifically relating to Iran.

A U.S. Senate bill has been proposed to prevent the opening of a separate consulate in Jerusalem. But unlike the 1995 law that was overwhelmingly support the current bill. If the U.S. wants a diplomatic office to the PA, it should be in Ramallah along with 39 other countries whose



Scripture reminds us to pray for the peace of Jerusalem. Shalom, "peace" in Hebrew, comes from the same root as *shalem*, which means "whole." It is also central to the name Jeru-SALEM. So, when you pray for the peace of Jerusalem, please pray that the American effort to redivide Jerusalem will fail. Pray for Jerusalem to remain whole, under Jewish and Israeli sovereignty.



Ask the Chaplain

The Abrahamic Covenant is an eternal, unconditional covenant God made with Abraham. Genesis 12:1-3 notes six components of this covenant:

- l. a land
- 2. a great nation
- 3. a great name
- 4. a blessing for Abraham
- 5. a curse
- a blessing for all the families of the Earth

The Lord had said to Abram, "Go from your country, your people and your father's household to the land I will show you. I will make you into a great nation, and I will bless you; I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through you." — Genesis 12:1-3

Five times in Genesis 12, God says, "I will." This assurance signifies that He alone has the power and unfailing commitment to keep the covenant and to fulfill its promises to Israel, the gentile nations, and its ultimate fulfillment through Abraham's greatest Descendant, Jesus Christ.

In the Ancient Near East, two parties of a conditional agreement typically passed between the pieces of a sacrificial animal. But Genesis 15 records that God put Abraham into a deep sleep while God alone moved between the animal pieces. This act shows that the Lord alone will keep all the promises of His covenant.

The Jewish people — the nation of Israel — are Abraham's descendants in fulfillment of this covenant. God emphasized that He will treat other people like they treat the Jewish people. If people curse and harm the Jews, God will harm and curse them. But God will bless and benefit people who bless the Jews. God has confirmed the veracity of this covenant in the continued pattern of defeat, ruin, and annihilation of those who have sought to harm the Jewish people.

The covenant guaranteed a homeland for Abraham and his "seed" — a land that will be theirs forever (Genesis 17:7–8). The land aspect of the Abrahamic Covenant will ultimately be fulfilled at the return of Jesus Christ, when the Jewish people will live within the expanded land boundaries that God originally specified to Abraham and foretold in Ezekiel 48.

Abraham's "seed" has three basic meanings in Scripture, and context determines the meaning:

- In a physical sense Seed usually refers to the Jewish people.
- 2. In a spiritual sense Believers are the seed of Abraham; Believers are justified by faith and are blessed with Abraham (Galatians 3:7–9).

To The Jew First

Proclaiming the Gospel in Tzuba

Our **To The Jew First** team spent a full day of ministry in and around Jerusalem. We passed out five complete Hebrew Bibles in the land of Yeshua the Messiah. Our most memorable encounter of the day happened with the last couple to whom we gave a copy of God's Word.

August Rosado and I were in the ancient area of Tzuba, on the western outskirts of Jerusalem. We were looking for the ancient cave of John the Baptist, which Israeli archaeologists discovered in 1999. They believe this could have been a location where John immersed people in an ancient mikvah (pool of water used for baptism) that was also discovered there.

Coming down from Tel Tzuba, August approached a parked car where a family of four were preparing to leave. The father was a friendly young man named **Elad**, which in Hebrew means "God is eternal." He and Noa, his wife, went out of their way to help us by looking up the exact location of the cave on their iPhones.

Elad then spotted my Star of David and Cross necklace and



asked if we were Christians. August and I replied that we were Bible-believing followers of Yeshua. We added that the Messianic prophecies

He fulfilled prove Jesus is the only true Messiah of Israel.* Astonishingly, Elad responded by saying that it could be true. He asked us to explain more, so we shared in detail from the Scriptures.

Elad then asked us why God chose the Jewish people. In response, we shared from Deuteronomy 7:6, Isaiah 42:6, and Romans 3:1–3. These passages emphasize that God chose the Jewish people because of His love for them, and He chose them to record His divine revelation codified in the *Tanakh* (Old Testament) and the *Brit Hadashah* (New Testament).

God's ultimate purpose for the Jewish people was to reveal Yeshua the Messiah and the salvation from sin and death that He alone offers. We suggested that Elad and Noa take a Hebrew Study Bible from us with a Messianic prophecy study guide centered on Jesus as the Messiah. They were thrilled and so glad to hear our message! At their invitation, August and I plan to meet them for further fellowship and teaching when we return to Israel.

Beloved in Messiah, please pray that our encounter and newfound friendship with this precious Israeli couple will allow them and their children to grow in the grace and knowledge of Yeshua the Messiah.

Waiting until Full Retirement Age rather than claiming earlier will yield larger benefits for many years.

Basic Rules

- You and your ex must have been married for 10 consecutive years or longer, remaining eligible even if the marriage ended long ago.
- Both you and your ex must be at least age 62 before you can claim benefits as an ex-spouse. (It's often wise to wait until full retirement age to claim; see the graphic above.)
- To collect on an ex's record, don't remarry before age 60.
- You and your ex must be divorced for two years or longer, or your ex must already claim retirement benefits for you to claim.

Common Misconceptions

 Your benefit could be reduced or denied if your ex-spouse claims Social Security in a certain way.

over your benefits.

- I have to discuss my claiming plans with my ex. No, you don't. Nor do you need your ex's permission. It's your benefit for your retirement, even if you've been divorced for longer than you were married.
- If my ex claims against my record, my own retirement benefit will be reduced. Not so. Your ex's claim does not reduce or affect your benefit.



Answer: This was the case with Johnny Carson (1925–2005), the beloved, late-night TV talk show host who was married four times. His first marriage lasted 14 years; the second, 9



When Johnny died, his fourth and current wife, upon reaching full retirement age, would "step into his shoes" and receive the same monthly amount as Johnny. Two qualifying ex-spouses were also eligible to "step into his shoes" as surviving ex-spouses who met the qualifications. All three women were likely receiving the same full survivor benefit amount as Johnny.

May this article brighten the financial outlooks of many readers and those they care about. (See 1 Timothy 5:3–16.)

were favorites from 1934-1955. Larry was born in 1902 in Philadelphia to a Jewish family as Louis Feinberg. Forty percent of their 190 short films included either Hebrew or Yiddish.

Heeding the Call of Hope

"For You will light my lamp; the LORD my God outshines my darkness." - Psalm 18:28

The only way out of the painful ambiguity of life is to hear a message from the higher world — the Heavenly Voice — that brings hope to our aching and troubled hearts: "Faith comes by hearing the word of Messiah" (Romans 10:17). And yet what is the meaning of this message, if not that all shall be made well by Heaven's hand? There is hope, and one day all your fears will be cast into outer darkness, swallowed up by God's unending comfort. "Go into all the world and make students of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). This calls us to share our hope that what makes us sick — our depravity and despair — has been healed by Yeshua, and that we escape the gravity of our fallenness if we accept His invitation to receive life in Him. "For it is You who light my lamp; the LORD my God outshines my darkness" (Psalm 18:28).

Exercising faith means actively listening to the eternal Voice, the Word of the LORD that calls out in love searching for your heart's trust. To have faith means validating God's faith in you—understanding that you are worthy of salvation, that you matter to God, and that the Voice calls out your name, too. Living in faith means accepting that you are accepted and welcomed. Trusting God means that you endure ambiguity, heartache, and darkness, yet you still allow hope to light your way.

Therefore, stay strong and keep hope, for we are saved through hope (Romans 8:24). Faith is the conviction of things unseen (Hebrews 11:1). Do not be seduced by appearances; do not be deceived in thinking that this world should be your home. No, as Believers we are strangers and pilgrims here; we are on the journey to reach "the city of living God, the heavenly Jerusalem ... the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in Heaven" (Hebrews 12:22–23). Therefore, do not lose heart. Keep to the narrow path. Set your affections on things above since your real life is "hidden with Christ in God" (Colossians 3:1–4). Do not yield to the temptation of despair.

Look beyond the "giants of the land" and reckon them as already fallen. Keep pressing on. Chazak, chazak, ve-nit chazek— "Be strong, be strong, and let us be strengthened!"

Fight the good fight of faith. May the LORD our God help you "take hold of the eternal life to which you were called" (1 Timothy 6:12).



Faith in our Leaders Bible heroes like Ruth and David weren't perfect but succeeded by placing their hope and trust in God. Firsthand accounts and original source documents portray George Washington as a man of faith who experienced divine guidance and protection on multiple occasions.

The Cost of Faith Risks accompany a faithful life. Consider the Bible's Esther and Mordecai.

John Adams helped gather representatives of the thirteen colonies around a set of principles that would become the Declaration of Independence.

The Actions of the Faithful Living out faith sometimes requires boldness. The Bible chronicles Peter's actions, e.g. his attempt to walk on the water. Benjamin Franklin called members of the Constitutional Convention to prayer.

The Application of Faith Narratives about men and women of faith pervade the Holy Scriptures. Most of our Founding Fathers believed in the Bible's God of Israel. Their deeds and writings testify to putting faith into action.

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

In this nine-program series, Myles and Katharine Weiss contrast the horror that was the Holocaust with the miracle that is the modern State of Israel. Throughout the series, we hear firsthand accounts from Holocaust survivors Noah Klieger, Meir Stern, and Eva Mozes Kor.

The Hope To Jewish refugees from Nazi-occupied Europe, the "Work Makes You Free" sign over the entrance to Auschwitz offered false hope. In 1948, Jewish hopes materialized when the modern State of Israel was born in a day (Isaiah 66:8).

The Ground Holocaust survivors recount riding in cattle cars bound for Auschwitz. The blood-soaked ground beneath the Death Wall contrasts significantly with the life-giving produce that grows in Israel today.

The Survivors In Auschwitz, we hear about the Jewish people's extremely slim chances for survival. In Israel, a "start-up nation" today, we hear from executives of high-tech companies.

The Chosen A survivor recounts her experience of Auschwitz, where many were sent to their deaths. From Caesarea, we hear about Israel's restoration and desire to "repair the world" (*Tikkun Olam*).

The Heart The crematoria at Auschwitz grimly remind Believers of the battle between good and evil. Myles and Katharine speak of Jewish contributions in the arts.

The Process After hearing how Holocaust survivors survived Dr. Josef Mengele's inhumane medical experiments, we visit Be'er Sheva's impressive technology center where science in Israel advances mankind's welfare.

The Future Believers standing with the Jewish people and with Israel are an important component of the nation's Divine deliverance and resilience.

The Peace After viewing the stunning fields in Northern Galilee from a hot air balloon, we hear from Israelis who endured hardship to become established in Israel. Myles sings a benediction over the pond at Auschwitz.

Extended Interview with Holocaust Survivors (bonus program) Holocaust survivors speak further about being sent to death camps, survival techniques, liberation, and overcoming the traumatic experiences of their youth to live meaningful lives.

Apollonia Fortress

Seaside Apollonia is one ancient town, established at the latest in the fourth century B.C. It has been the home of Samaritans. Greeks, Romans, Muslims, Crusaders, Jewish immigrants, and most recently, well-to-do Israelis. The Crusaders left the most memorable mark on the place

in the shape of a fortress that juts out to the sea. The fortress existed in its entirety for only 24 years before it was razed by Muslim conquerors. Nowadays, it's a popular nature reserve that also includes a Roman villa, a moat, and a mosque.


Antipatris Fort

Antipatris Fort is also known as Binar Bashi, a variation on the Turkish word for fountainhead. It was built in the late 16th century by the Ottoman rulers of the Land of Israel to guard the passageway between the sources - or fountainhead — of the Yarkon River and more distant areas

and is located on the ancient Via Maris trade route linking Egypt and Syria. The impressive fort is now part of Tel Afek National Park, which boasts a lake and extensive recreational grounds.



Startup Unveils Electric Flying Car





AIR, an Israeli startup, has unveiled the design for its "flying" vehicle, an "electric vertical takeoff and landing" (eVTOL) aircraft for individual consumers. The company said its aircraft "puts the freedom to fly directly in the hands of consumers" for "adventure, fun, and day-to-day flying."

AIR ONE is an all-electric, two-seater eVTOL that offers a range of 110 miles on a single charge at speeds of up to 155 miles per hour, with a flight time of one hour. The aircraft has collapsible wings for easy parking and the ability to take off from or land on any flat surface.



AIR has developed software that will allow ordinary people, not just trained pilots, to operate and navigate an aircraft. Because safety is paramount, the vehicle also has a monitoring system enhanced by Artificial Intelligence (AI) to provide frequent inspections.

The company is currently working with two prototypes and will begin test flights in February 2022 with Israel's Civil Aviation Authority. AIR has also been working with the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration to obtain G-1 certification, which outlines initial safety and environmental standards for civil commercial operations. Pending regulatory approval, AIR hopes to finish the certification process by the end of 2023 and start delivering the aircraft in 2024.

Similar eVTOL companies in the U.S. already have G-1 certification. Archer Aviation, a Palo Alto-based firm, is developing an aircraft to shuttle people through cities, while Santa Cruz-based Joby Aviation is developing an all-electric, five-seater passenger aircraft.

In Israel, the aerospace company Urban Aeronautics developed the CityHawk, which is designed for multiple trips in urban areas as commercial air charters and emergency medical services (EMS). Urban Aeronautics has had over 300 successful test flights of its prototypes, which have been in development since 2006.

Finally, we can have the famous flying car from *The Jetsons* cartoon series we watched as kids! — David




Using Copper to Cure Diabetic Wounds

An innovative Israeli-made wound dressing significantly stimulates the healing of diabetic wounds, according to a new study by physicians at the Rambam Health Care Campus in Haifa.

"Copper Oxide Impregnated Wound Dressings," developed by Herzliya-based MedCu Technologies, have already received clearance by the major international regulatory bodies - including the FDA in the United States - for use in acute and chronic wounds. ["Cu" is the chemical symbol for copper.]



"What is special about our dressing is that it contains particles of copper oxide," said Dr. Gadi Borkow, MedCu's co-founder and chief medical officer. "Copper has a very powerful antimicrobial efficacy—it kills a wide spectrum of pathogens [including] bacteria, fungi, and viruses; therefore, it helps clear the wound and protect it from infections," he added.

Foot wounds or ulcers are very common among diabetics: about 15% of such patients experience them. They often develop on the bottom of the foot and have a high chance of infection or hospitalization. A high level of glucose in the blood can interfere with healing.

By the end of the treatment for the diabetic patients who participated in the study, the size of their wounds showed an average reduction of 65%. All wounds registered improvement regardless of their initial size or other interfering factors, other than weight-bearing pressure.

Copper is an essential element in human bodies. It enhances wound healing by aiding in the production of new capillaries. MedCu's wound dressing stimulates this capillary-production process. "The most frequent reason chronic wounds do not heal is that there is no production of new blood capillaries," Borkow said. "Without new blood reaching the wound, there is a problem of lack of oxygen, no activation of the immune system, no removal of toxic waste."

MedCu's wound dressings are already available and in use. They differ from other forms of treatment for diabetic wounds that are often burdensome and painful and may require hospitalization.

Auction of Auschwitz Tattoo Stamps "Abhorrent"

Several Holocaust charities condemned the attempted sale of Auschwitz tattoo equipment by a Jerusalem-based auctioneer.

Meir Tzolman of Tzolman's Auctions told a reporter, "I want to make sure that the item gets into the right hands and does not disappear from the pages of history." He said he intended to "increase awareness" and not to "diminish the value of the Holocaust."

The auction lot includes stamps that would have been dipped in ink as well as an instruction booklet.

Tzolman's website noted that the equipment is one of only three similar collections that still exist. (The two remaining collections are in museums.)

Karen Pollock, chief executive of the UK's Holocaust Educational Trust, commented, "This is abhorrent and plummets to new depths of depravity — making a profit off the equipment used to maim and mark Jews out for death. It's despicable and these items should never be on sale."

While the bid for the items was over \$3,000, an Israeli court issued a temporary injunction blocking the sale. The anonymous owner has since indicated that he wants to donate the items to the Haifa Holocaust Museum.

Iran's Textbooks Push Anti-Semitism

Iranian schoolkids are learning anti-Semitism, hatred, and conspiratorial ideas from their textbooks. One is a theory that Western media hyped the COVID-19 pandemic to thwart large-scale attendance at last year's celebration of the Iranian revolution, according to a study published by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL).

Specific textbook examples include teaching students to chant "Death to Israel," a nation the books describe as a fake regime that must be eliminated. They teach that Jews have conspired against Islam from its earliest days, forging Islamic scriptures and using warfare and even Freemasonry to achieve evil aims.

Students are taught that U.S.-led sanctions against Iran are part of a "satanic plan" to eliminate Muslims'

religious beliefs. Textbooks also note that the Iranian people, through their nuclear scientists in particular, "have achieved a blessing with your great jihad and the blood of your bounteous youths."

In 2020, in response to the global pandemic, Tehran updated school textbooks to include a conspiracy theory alleging that Western media exaggerated the coronavirus to drive down turnout at crowded ceremonies for the regime's 41st anniversary. Iran is the Middle Eastern country worst hit by COVID-19.

Jonathan Greenblatt, CEO of the ADL, added, "It is no secret that the Iranian regime continues to promote extremism and terrorism and feeds its people on a steady diet of anti-Semitic and anti-American propaganda. Iran's textbooks show how deeply ingrained this official campaign of incitement is within society, and how they are reaching impressionable young people with these xenophobic and dehumanizing messages as part of the formal teaching curriculum."

The ADL called on the U.S. and other countries to "take coordinated action to condemn and to counter Iran's state-sponsored incitement of anti-Semitism, including in its schools."

Jewish Marine in Viral Photo

When Meryl Jaffe heard that President Biden deployed 3,000 U.S. Marines to Afghanistan, she had a feeling that her son, Matthew, was among them. Her family was tracking the U.S. Marine Corps on social media to verify their suspicions.

"Matthew's sister, Rebecca, saw it

Mosaic Floors from Ancient Church Discovered

For over a thousand years, the fabled Church of the Apostles was lost. According to Christian tradition, it was built on the site of the house belonging to Apostles Peter and Andrew, in the village of Bethsaida on the shore of the

Sea of Galilee. Now archaeologists believe they have found not only Bethsaida but also the ancient church.

The structure was discovered near remnants of a Romanera settlement matching the location of Bethsaida as described by the first-century A.D. historian Flavius Josephus. Researchers excavating the site, el-Araj, discovered proof that the structure was an elaborately decorated church. It has gorgeous mosaic floors and inscriptions, and was built in the late fifth or early sixth century.

While mentions of the church are found in Christian writings dating from A.D. 725, there has been no confirmation of its existence.

Archaeologists R. Steven Notley of Nyack College and Mordechai Aviam of Kinneret Academic College of the Galilee cannot categorically prove that this is the Church of the Apostles, but no other suitable structure has been found in that area of the lake. It's the only candidate and would befit a grand tradition, measuring approximately 89 feet by 52 feet and being richly decorated.

The team unearthed a mosaic floor with inscriptions made of tiny yellow, red, and orange tiles. Byzantine churches typically had such mosaic inscriptions. The floor bears two inscriptions written in ancient Greek,

although only parts remain somewhat intact. One is a dedication to the bishop that describes a renovation of the church during his time in office. This indicates that the church was major enough to warrant fixing up, Aviam said. The second inscription mentions the church deacon who built the compound.

Another site, e-Tell, only a few miles to the north, has been under excavation for 35 years. Some researchers claim that it is the ancient Jewish fishing village of Bethsaida. While the Biblical-era remains at that site are stunning, no remains from the Byzantine Period have been found there.

Notley and Aviam note that their site has remains from the Roman Period, when the place would have been a Jewish fishing village, and from the Byzantine time. So they believe that

they have discovered the real Bethsaida. The archaeologists hope that continued excavations will provide evidence that this was the famed Church of the Apostles.

Temple-Era Amethyst Seal Discovered

A unique Second Temple-era seal, the first of its kind to be discovered in the world, was recently recovered during a dig around the foundation stones of the *Kotel* (Western Wall), north of the City of David in Jerusalem.

The seal, designed to be worn as a ring, bears the image of a bird (possibly a dove) next to a branch that may depict the persimmon perfume plant, an ingredient of the incense produced for the Temple. The ancient persimmon (unrelated to today's common orange persimmon fruit), was an expensive plant also used to produce medicines, ointments, and perfumes.

The oval seal, made of amethyst in shades of purple and lilac, is 0.4 inches long, 0.2 inches wide, and 0.3 inches thick.

Archaeologist Eli Shukron, who conducted the excavation on behalf of the Israel Antiquities Authority and the City of David at the Western Wall, said: "This is an important find because it is the first time a seal has been discovered in the world with a description of the precious and famous plant about which we could only read in sources and historical descriptions."

According to the researchers, toward the end of the Second Temple Period, "the use of stone seals expanded and became more common. But in most stamps

discovered so far with plant descriptions, it is common to find plants that were common in the Land of Israel at the time: vines, dates, and olives, which belong to the seven species." [See Deuteronomy 8:8.]

"Examining the seal, we immediately noticed that the fruit that appears on it is unlike any of the fruits we have encountered to date," noted Shua Amorai–Stark, professor emerita in the Art & Aesthetics Department at Kaye Academic College of Education in Beersheba, Israel.

After an in-depth examination of the findings, the researchers hypothesized that it was the persimmon perfume plant.

Amorai-Stark added: "The dove is a positive motif in the Hellenistic, Roman, and Jewish worlds. It symbolizes wealth, happiness, goodness, and success."

The engraving on the seal can attest to the identity of the person who wore the ring. "If it is indeed the famous and expensive persimmon fruit, then it is likely that the seal owner was a Jew of means since the production and trade that took place around the persimmon plant was controlled by Jews living in the Dead Sea basin, where the fruit grew. It is possible that the owner of the seal was a person with an orchard for growing persimmons," explained Amorai-Stark.

Some Biblical commentators identify the persimmon in the list of gifts given by the Queen of Sheba to King Solomon.

Why Anti-Zionism is Anti-Semitism

The "Woke Left" gives this excuse: "We only are against Zionism, not against Jews. It's not anti-Semitism; it's only anti-Zionism."

Certainly, it's possible to oppose policies of the State of Israel without being anti-Jewish. Indeed, even strong Zionists often oppose discrete Israeli government decisions. For decades, until then-Minister of Finance Benjamin Netanyahu helped steer Israel toward free-market capitalism, many liberal Zionists opposed Israel's socialist economy. It is acceptable to love one's family, one's country, one's people — and still to criticize them. In America likewise, we find advocates on all sides who stand by their country but criticize the mismanagement of immigration at the southern border or during the Afghanistan evacuation.

What makes "anti-Zionism" different is that it does not aim at policy difference nor even at animus against political personalities. Instead, it invalidates a core component of the Judaic paradigm: the Jewish connection with the land.

Zionism, at its essence, is the belief that a Jew has a special connection with the Land of Israel. Not unlike tens of millions of Bibleloving Christian Zionists, the majority of Jews throughout history have harbored a unique emotional connection to the land of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah.

For Jews everywhere in the world, Israel is like a "Pesach Seder" or a "Thanksgiving Day" country: You may not love everyone at the dinner table, but you would have it no other way because they all are family.

But to define oneself as "anti-Zionist" is the same as self-identifying as "anti-kosher food." Certainly, a person may eat all the ham and bacon she likes. No one expects others to be kosher or to prefer soaked-and-salted meat. But to be "anti-kosher"? Even if you are not kosher, why be "anti" someone else living a more traditional Jewish life?

Ultimately, that is what "anti-Zionism" is. Instead of visiting Israel, one may prefer a vacation in Saudi Arabia. No one has to like people who write from right to left or who have ambulances with red Stars of David instead of red crescents or red crosses painted on them. But to be "anti-Zionist" is like being anti-kosher.

Zionism is a core part of the very definition of a Jew. That's why "anti-Zionism" is pure anti-Semitism. No one reasonably denies the Italian love for Venice or the French love for Paris. Expatriates' hearts and minds are fixed on lands of heritage. To deny only Jews that simple human yearning shared by all others is to manifest more than a mere disagreement over where ice cream should be sold or fictional works should be translated. It is to be an anti-Semite.





Finding Good in Islamic Terrorists?

A "moderate" Muslim cleric and counter-terrorism advisor to the UK government recently referred to Israel as a "terrorist state" and praised "martyrs" — jihadist code for suicide bombers.

During his speech, Imam Irfan Chishti told the crowd that if they wanted to become "mujahideen" (holy warriors), then they should "emulate the Muslim general Saladin, who expelled the Crusaders from Palestine in 1187." He then lamented, "Where is the modern-day Saladin?"

The choice of Saladin is interesting and telling. After defeating the Crusaders at the Battle of Hattin in 1187, rather than ransoming or enslaving them, as was common at the time, Saladin had the warrior monks of the military orders of the Temple and Hospital butchered before him. He then had the True Cross, Christendom's most precious relic, seized and paraded upside down in dirt and dung to Muslim jeers and spits.

Saladin also severely persecuted Egypt's indigenous Christians, the Copts — including by crucifying or hanging many thousands of them and routinely breaking the crosses off and tarring their churches — even though the Copts, who refer to Saladin as "the Oppressor of the Cross Worshippers," had nothing to do with the Crusades.


Saladin had a virulent hatred for Christianity, above and beyond his conflict with the Crusaders. Saladin's retirement wish, according to his Muslim biographer, was to invade and wage jihad on Christian Europe, "until there shall not remain on the face of this earth one unbeliever in Allah, or I will die in the attempt."

The aftermath of Saladin's conquest of Jerusalem in 1187 looks like something straight out of ISIS's playbook. Although he allowed many Christians to be ransomed, Saladin also ordered some 15,000 Christians

sold into slavery. "Women and children together came to 8,000 and were quickly divided up among us, bringing a smile to Muslim faces at their lamentation," wrote Muhammad al-Isfahani, one of Saladin's confidants who was present at Jerusalem's capitulation, before he launched into a sadomasochistic tirade extolling the sexual debasement of European women at the hands of Muslim men.



Sadly, all Imam Irfan Chishti had to do was "apologize" to be reinstated to his high-paying job as a "counterterrorist" expert in the UK. "Some of my words reflect a clear error of judgment, in the heat of the moment," Chishti said, "and do not reflect my sentiments or the sentiments of the audience. I now appreciate that my ill-chosen words will have caused offense and hurt to the Jewish community and I tender my most profound apologies."

Of course, of all his "ill-chosen words," surely those praising Saladin are not among those he would take back; for few in the West know who Saladin truly was.

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
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
