One of the most pressing questions for Christians has remained unchanged for two millennia: "Are we living in the End Times?" Even the first followers of Jesus had it on their minds. When they asked Jesus how they would know, He told them with a great deal of specificity:

"... many will come in My name, claiming, 'I am the Messiah,' and will deceive many. You will hear of wars and rumors of wars...but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pains. Then you will be handed over to be persecuted and put to death, and you will be hated by all nations because of Me. At that time many will turn away from the faith and will betray and hate each other, and many false prophets will appear and deceive many people. Because of the increase of wickedness, the love of most will grow cold ... And this Gospel of the Kingdom will be preached in the whole world ... and then the end will come" (Matthew 24:5-14).

"Still God's Chosen People"

Slightly over half of Evangelicals say they believe that Jews are still God's Chosen People, according to a recent survey of approximately 1,000 Evangelical Protestant Americans. By contrast, 19% were unsure, 17% believe that Christians have replaced Jews as the Chosen

People, 10% believe that Jews were never God's Chosen People, and 2% held an "other" view.

Among the respondents, 59% of those who were 70 or older said they believe Jews were still the Chosen People, while only 44% of those aged 40 and under agreed.

When you analyze that text, there are at least eight signs that Jesus tells us to look out for.

First: There will be false prophets and people who claim to be Christ or some type of "messiah" leader. Individuals will rise and teach what isn't true and will try to get people to follow them, but they won't really be of God.

Second: There will be wars and threats of wars. In other words, it will be an age of anxiety and fear of world conflict. There will also be the reality of conflict between nations.

Third: The number of natural disasters will increase.

Fourth: Christians will be persecuted for their faith. They will be ridiculed and discriminated against.

Fifth: A lot of people will turn away from their faith. They will renounce Jesus and say that they no longer believe in Him.

Sixth: There will be internal division and discord among Christians.

Seventh: Immorality and insensitivity toward immorality will reign throughout the land. We will engage ourselves in things that embarrass God, and when we do it or see it, we won't even blush.

Eighth: The final sign is that before it all ends, the Gospel will be proclaimed to everyone in the world.

So, are we in the End Times?


Right now, the online world is full of false teachers, Russia is provoking the world to conflict over Ukraine, there are many severe

for Israel and the Jews, asking respondents who put Israel and the Jews high on a 5-point scale to rank multiple issues on their priority. These included: "Supporting Holocaust survivors," "Helping needy individuals and families in Israel," "Supporting pro-Israel politicians or political positions in the U.S.," "Helping Jews outside of Israel return to their homeland of Israel," "Helping people learn about the Jewish roots of Christianity," "Supporting medical services and first responders in Israel," "Helping preserve or excavate Biblical sites," and "Supporting Messianic Believers and businesses in Israel."

Among those issues, "Helping needy individuals and families in Israel" ranked

the highest with 27% putting that as top priority, while 16% placed "Helping people learn about the Jewish roots of Christianity" as a top priority.

Ron Sellers, president of Grey Matter Research, suggested that the survey indicates that many Evangelicals in the U.S. prefer to help Israel and the Jewish people in non-political ways.

The group Christians United for Israel had some issues with the report, noting the findings were "somewhat sensationalized." The organization added, "Just because one chooses one item as a top priority does not mean they ignore all other ways of supporting Israel."

Over the past two years, the diagnoses of anxiety disorders have increased significantly. Paradoxically, during a period when our fast-paced world slowed down, anxiety increased. The COVID pandemic, in certain aspects, forced us to be still.

Many of us, however, could not be still. In addition to the constant barrage of phone alerts, social media, television, school, and work that continually occupied our minds, we discovered various activities and new hobbies to busy ourselves.

Enjoying quiet and silence is challenging for most people. For

those who struggle with anxiety, bedtime is often arduous. Anxiety, worry, and fear intensify when the mind is still because there is nothing left to occupy it. As a result, it becomes difficult to fall asleep. It may seem like anxiety is worse at night, but anxiety is usually constant during the day. The busyness of life distracts us from our anxious thoughts. When there are no more diversions, anxiety symptoms magnify.

A noticeable increase in anxiety levels, coupled with the difficulties of slowing down, compelled me to focus on the practice of meditation with my clients. I find the discussion of meditation to be an uneasy one, particularly with Christians. Some Christians consider meditation to be an Eastern ritual, not a Christian activity. However, in contrast to Eastern meditation, which focuses on emptying the mind, Christian meditation focuses on filling the mind (Colossians 3:1–2; Philippians 4:8–9; Hebrews 3:1). In concert with our faith, Christian meditation can lead to a richer connection with God.

Meditate on God's Word

After Moses died, God spoke to Joshua, giving him instructions for the people and the land. God said, "Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful" (Joshua 1:8).

God's instruction is simple: meditate on the Law. The key to Joshua's success in his task rested in being rooted in God's Word. Likewise, when we follow this directive and



meditate on God's Word, it remains embedded in our hearts and minds.

Meditating on the Word of God increases our understanding of Him and His precepts. It can also increase our level of proficiency regarding implementing His Word in our daily lives. When our mind is full of Scripture, our lips are filled with God's Word which, in turn, we impart on others.

There are various ways to meditate on the Word of God. For example, we can do this by reading a specific passage of Scripture several times, thinking through the passage, and then identifying practical applications of the Scripture.



Meditate in Silence

"The LORD said, 'Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the LORD, for the LORD is about to pass by.' Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the LORD, but the LORD was not in the wind. After the wind there was an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire. And after the fire came a gentle whisper. When Elijah heard it, he pulled his cloak over his face and went out and stood at the mouth of the cave" (1 Kings 19:11–13).

God came to Elijah in a gentle whisper. Some commentators translate this as "in a moment in silence." God often speaks in whispers. We desire to hear God, yet the distractions of incessant noise create difficulty. To hear God requires a lessening of the noise. Decreasing the volume of external noise is just as important as decreasing the volume of internal noise. Continuous thoughts, planning, worry, and self-talk can also obstruct hearing God through meditation.

Benefits of Meditation

There are numerous health benefits associated with the practice of meditation. For example, meditation has been proven to lower blood pressure, enhance the immune system, and improve sleep. Additional benefits include:

- Stress reduction
- Improvements in attention
- Decreased anxiety and depression
- Reduction in pain (both physical and psychological)
- Improved memory.

A plethora of research has shown that structural and functional changes occur in the brain because of meditation. These structural and functional transformations lead to a decrease in anxiety and depression and an increase in empathy and cognitive health. Neuroscientific findings make a case for greater use of meditation in the Christian walk.


The Call to Meditate

Throughout the Bible there are examples of meditation as a Biblical principle.

- Psalm 1 instructs us to meditate on His Law, day and night (Psalm 1:2).
- Paul encourages the message of Christ to dwell in us (Colossians 3:16).
- The writer of Hebrews calls us to fix our eyes on Jesus (Hebrews 3:1).
- Our thoughts are to be consumed by whatever is good and worthy of praise (Philippians 4:8).

The Bible is clear in its instructions on meditation. Christian meditation can be performed in a variety of styles. It can incorporate prayer or Scripture reflection. It can focus on worship or silence. Meditation can incorporate God's promises, His majesty, or any of His wonderful qualities. In all of these methods, the benefit of meditation is unquestionable.











Life Masks Keep Holocaust Stories Alive

"Would you like to breathe out of your nose or your mouth?" Robert Sutz asked.

"Either is fine," replied Werner Salinger, a survivor of Nazi atrocities.

Sutz then reached for a plaster bandage, the same cloth material medical personnel

use to make casts for broken bones. He dunked it in water and laid it over Salinger's lips. The Scottsdale artist continued applying the strips until only Salinger's bright blue eyes could be seen.

Forty-one minutes later, Sutz ran his fingers beneath the mold's hardened edges and peeled it away from Salinger's face, now preserved in a "life mask."

Over the past 30 years, about 200 other "Holocaust survivors, liberators, and righteous gentiles" — many of whom have since died — have sat in Sutz's chair and had their faces preserved.

"It was cold, but I don't mind cold, and it was wet," Salinger said, laughing. "It wasn't hurtful in any way."

Sutz will spend the next month or so painting Salinger's mask to look lifelike — hence the name "life mask."

Along with casting their faces, Sutz captures his subjects' stories on video and paints scenes they recall from the Holocaust.

Salinger's story goes back to *Kristallnacht*—the Night of Broken Glass—in 1938. On Nov. 9 and 10, Nazis torched and vandalized thousands of Jewish synagogues, homes, schools, and businesses across Germany. About 100 people were killed and 30,000 Jewish men were arrested and sent to concentration camps.

"I remember very vividly the broken glass—I could see it from our apartment across the street—and the smoke from the burning synagogue was just a block away," said Salinger, 89. "It was a very vivid memory for me; I was 6 years old."

Roughly two months later, on January 12, 1939, his family fled to the U.S.

"I'm doing this really for my parents," Salinger said. "They would be very proud to know of my involvement today."

Sutz, who is 92, noted that his inspiration for creating life masks comes from his father, along with President Abraham Lincoln and film director Steven Spielberg.

His father, who was Jewish, was born in Bialystok, Poland, but moved to Chicago when he was 12. Years later, when Hitler began his rise to power, Sutz's father returned to Bialystok to warn his family and attempt to persuade them to move to the U.S., but they refused.

"They thought that Hitler was a crazy man and that people weren't going to pay attention to him," Sutz recalled.

So Sutz's father packed up and returned to the U.S. without them. The rest of his family later died in concentration camps.

Many years later, shortly after Sutz's 13th birthday, he visited an exhibit where a life mask of Abraham Lincoln was on display.

"I got the chills because I felt his presence. It was something that really excited me," Sutz recalled. "I told myself at an early age that I would like to learn how to make life masks."

He eventually began making masks of family members, but it wasn't until the 1990s that Sutz found a deeper purpose for creating life masks.

He came across an article in the *Chicago Times* recruiting people to join the visual history project run by Spielberg's Shoah Foundation. Sutz was accepted into the group and went through a three-day training on how to interview Holocaust survivors.

Sutz then connected the dots and began making life masks of "Holocaust survivors, liberators, and righteous gentiles," as he puts it. Some of the first life masks in Sutz's Holocaust collection came from doing these interviews.

"It's a funny thing; I'm doing this now and Spielberg is unaware of what I'm doing, but he kind of introduced me to survivors," Sutz said.

For nearly 20 years, Sutz took the masks on a traveling exhibit across the country, but eventually it became too difficult. Now, about 200 masks are displayed in his art studio. He recently found a new home for his collection with the Arizona Jewish Historical Society, although it won't be on exhibit for at least a couple of years until the society builds a museum. The museum "would give people a place to go to learn about the Holocaust (and) learn about other atrocities, as well," stated Lawrence Bell, the society's director.

Sutz's life masks, along with some of his other Holocaust artwork, will be featured at the museum.

Sutz plans to keep creating life masks for as long as he can.

"I want to keep doing what I'm doing," he concluded. "I just hope I can stay well enough to do more."

In the <u>March 2022 Levitt Letter</u>, we looked at the Rapture of Believers to Heaven and the Tribulation Period on Earth. In April, we looked at Believers' seven years with Jesus in Heaven, including the Judgment Seat evaluation (2 Corinthians 5:10), where the Lord evaluates our earthly lives in preparation for the marriage supper of the Lamb.

Now back to Zola. — Editor

The Marriage

Now we are ready to marry the Lord. It's fascinating to compare these events with Israel's wedding traditions in Christ's time. Preceding the marriage supper, there was a seven-day honeymoon in a bridal chamber for the bride and groom. This pertains exactly to the seven years in Heaven and the Judgment Seat of Christ, leading up to marriage with Him. (The Jewish wedding and its Gospel implications are explained fully in the booklet, *A Christian Love Story*.)

To Index

John covers the marriage scene for us in two glorious verses (Rev. 19:7–8). The white linen bridal gowns we shall wear fulfill a fascinating Bible type that reaches back to the Tabernacle of ancient Israel (Exodus 25–30). In the Tabernacle, plain white linen symbolized pure righteousness. The linen curtains around the entire Tabernacle — the tent, as it were — were pure white. Therefore, no one could enter through the sides or the rear because no one was perfectly righteous. The door of the Tabernacle was sewn with the colors of Christ — scarlet, purple, and blue threads, indicating sacrifice, royalty, and Heaven. The Israelites entered by the door, so symbolically, they were entering by means of the Messiah.

Jesus said, "I am the door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture" (John 10:9). Messianic colors were worn by the priests, and also appeared in the hangings of various courts and in roof coverings.

But now, the Church shall wear white! "Fine linen, clean and white, for the fine linen is the righteousness of saints" (Rev. 19:8). That we now appear in pure white testifies to our final perfection. Paul compared earthly marriage to Christ's marrying the Church (Eph. 5:21–33). Ultimately, we will see the result of the Apostles' exhortation of the infant Church.

After we marry the Lord, we'll reign with Him in His Kingdom on Earth. This is exactly the way the bride returned with her groom after an Israeli marriage, to housing he had arranged for them — outside of his father's house. (Some teach that the wedding will be on Earth after we return; others have it in Heaven with the marriage supper on Earth — Rev. 19:7–8.)

The Return

Jesus' return to Earth is glorious in the Scriptures (Rev. 19:11–16). The Church initially comes as an army to stop the battle of Armageddon.

After that battle will come the judgment of those who lived during the

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Tribulation, and the rewarding of those who refused the mark of the antiChrist (Rev. 20:4–5).

John exults in our taking part in this first resurrection and reigning with Christ through the Kingdom Age (Rev. 20:6).

While still on Earth, Jesus taught more on this judgment, which serves as an immigration office into the Kingdom. He will judge every soul alive during the seven years of the Tribulation. All nations will be before Him, the Believers separated from the unbelievers as a shepherd divides his sheep from the goats. (See Matt. 25:31–34.)

The Believers will be surprised that they had so honored Jesus (Matt. 25:37–40). If the nations of the world, even during the Tribulation, express faith in Christ by caring for His brethren (the 144,000 of Israel who witness during that hard time), they will be saved. But the judgment is equal, and devastating, on those

who failed to honor the Lord during the reign of the antiChrist (Matt. 25:45–46).

The Old Testament saints are also gathered at the start of the Kingdom Age, so the Kingdom begins with rather a mixed crowd, who yet all share sincere belief in their Messiah and King (Romans 3:25).

Since the Believers of the Tribulation Period did not come to faith before the Rapture, they were not changed, but remain as before, marrying and giving in marriage, and giving birth to ordinary, fleshly sinners. In the end, some of these will disobey the Lord's commands, and Scripture poses certain penalties (e.g., Zech. 14:16–19).

These mischief-makers in the Kingdom, having multiplied, will be rallied by Satan in the very last battle at the end of the thousand

years (Rev. 20:7–9). This, Satan's last rebellion, is unsuccessful, and the Great White Throne of Judgment is set up for all who were confined with him, and the unbelievers of all ages (Rev. 20:11–15). The "second death" referred to is avoided by Believers, who are exonerated and do not have to appear in the Judgment.



The conditional, temporary covenant God made with the nation of Israel at Mount Sinai is known as the Old Covenant (Exodus 19). The outstanding feature of this covenant is the giving of the Law by God through Moses.

In the Old Covenant, God made a provision so the people could atone for their sins and continue in their relationship and fellowship with a holy God. To facilitate this, the Old Covenant provided a high priest and Levitical priests from the line of Aaron (the first high priest) to be intercessors between the Lord and His people (Exodus 28:1-43; 29:1-9; Leviticus 8:1-36; 9:1-24). The Old Covenant was ratified by the shedding of sacrificial blood. (See Exodus 24:5-8.) The continued shedding of innocent animal blood was required by the Old Covenant for the remission of sins (Leviticus 17:11; Hebrews 9:22). The

Old Covenant further stipulated that every year on the Day of Atonement, the high priest would take the blood of a goat into the Holy of Holies and sprinkle it upon the Ark of the Covenant to atone for the sins of Israel for that year.

The Old Covenant was largely a set of rules and regulations governing the moral, civil, and religious aspects in the life of Israel. The moral authority of the Law is universal and is still in force under the New Covenant, as nine of the Ten Commandments are repeated in the New Testament for Believers to obey.

To be completely blessed under the conditional terms of the Old Covenant, a person had to perfectly obey the Mosaic Law at all times. But imperfect sinners cannot do that. Thus God's wrath falls on everyone who disobeys the Law, as noted in Deuteronomy 27:26, "Cursed is everyone who does not continue to do everything written in the Book of the Law." (See also Galatians 3:10–12.) Scripture teaches that the ultimate purpose of the Old Covenant was not to bring final salvation, but to show that we are violators of the divine law and stand guilty and condemned before God (Romans 1–3). As such, we need a Redeemer to save us from the damnable penalty of the Law that we have all broken.

The Old Covenant was fulfilled by Jesus Christ. It has been replaced by the New Covenant, which Jesus enacted through His once-for-all atoning sacrifice on the Cross for sinful humanity. This salvation is the central theme of the New Testament Book of Hebrews. On our behalf, Christ has fulfilled all the moral and sacrificial demands made by the Old Covenant.

"Why, then, was the law given at all? It was added because of transgressions until the Seed to whom the promise referred had come. The law was given through angels and entrusted to a mediator."

- Galatians 3:19

Green Means "Go"

Recently, Israel re-opened its doors to tourists. Now, even those who have not been vaccinated for COVID are allowed to fly to Tel Aviv. That is a huge *green light* for Believers to return to the Holy Land once again.

We pilgrims have also had a major economic impact on Israel through the tourism industry. Before the pandemic, tourism to the Holy Land brought in billions of dollars annually. But when COVID halted travel, all those in the tourism industry were told by the government to find alternate work. For two years our Israeli tour family — and the Land of Israel — have experienced economic hardship.

Isaiah 60:10 states, *"Foreigners will rebuild your walls."* Without taking that verse too far out of context, I believe that it can relate to Israel today following her financial distress over the past two years. We will soon have the opportunity to help rebuild the walls of Israel's economy by participating in a Zola Tour group to the Promised Land. Will you prayerfully consider joining us for our pilgrimage this fall or next spring? The information you need to start your adventure is available on page 36.

In March, we traveled with our production team—camera operators,

A Note from Mark

Debt Consolidation — **Usually a No-Go**

Dave Ramsey is a financial advisor whose specialty is helping folks avoid and recover from debt. Below is a summary of a timely article from his website.

Debt consolidation combines several debts into one monthly bill on a streamlined payoff plan. While it usually offers a lower combined monthly payment with an extended repayment term, debt consolidation:

- Doesn't always guarantee lower interest
- Often comes with initiation fees, balance transfer fees, closing costs, and annual fees
- Does not mean debt elimination
- Differs from debt settlement but both can scam you out of thousands of dollars.

In some cases, a new lender pays off your debts and then you're indebted to that lender. Otherwise, you borrow money or obtain a line of credit to pay off the loans yourself. Some loans are secured against your house or car (just say no!), while others are unsecured loans with higher interest rates.

There are four basic types of debt consolidation: 1) debt consolidation loan, 2) credit card balance transferusually with transfer fees and burdensome conditions, 3) home equity line of credit (HELOC - basically trading the portion of your home that you actually own for more debt), and 4) student loan consolidation.

There are good reasons to avoid debt consolidation. First, there's no quarantee that your interest rate will be lower, and a lower initial rate doesn't always remain low. Next, consolidating your bills means you'll be in debt longer. Finally, your debt can increase after debt consolidation if your behavior with money doesn't change.

Should I consolidate my debt? Unless it's student loans and you're following the list below, the answer is **no**. Debt consolidation doesn't fix problems. It just rearranges them.

You should consider consolidating your student loans only if:

- There's no cost to do so
- The interest rate is fixed, not variable
- The interest rate is lower than your current one
- Your repayment period will be shorter than what you have
- You'll remain motivated to pay off your debt despite having just one student loan payment.

Debt settlement, which is different from debt consolidation, involves hiring a company for 20–25% of what you owe (ouch!) to negotiate a lump-sum payment with your creditors for less than what you owe. Your debts would be reported as settled, not as paid in full. Often, however, these companies just take your money and run — leaving you on the hook for late fees and additional interest. Debt settlement is a scam; stay away!





"Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me bless His holy name." - Psalm 103:1

Gratitude is essential to the life of

faith. We read in the Torah: "... and you shall bless the Lord your God for the good land ..." (Deuteronomy 8:10, emphasis added). Whenever we derive benefit or enjoyment from something, we are to bless (i.e., thank, praise) God for His goodness. The Hebrew term for gratitude is hakarat tovah (הַכַּרַת טוֹבַה), a phrase that means "recognizing the good." The heart looks through the eye, and therefore how we see is ultimately a spiritual decision: "If your eye is single" (i.e., ἁπλοῦς, sincere, focused), Yeshua emphasized, "your whole body will be filled with light" (Matthew 6:22). When we see rightly, we are awakened to God's presence in the little things of life — those small miracles and "signs and wonders" that constantly surround us. The good eye of faith sees hundreds of reasons to bless God for the precious gift of life (1 Corinthians 10:31) — even in times of testing.

"Give thanks to the Lord for He is good; His love endures forever" (Psalm 136:1). Scripture instructs us to give thanks to the Lord at all times and in all circumstances (Colossians 3:17; Ephesians 5:20; 1 Thessalonians 5:18). Gratitude is foundational to our lives as followers of Yeshua. Indeed, there are really only two prayers we offer to God, namely "Help, Lord!" and "Thank you, Lord." Meister Eckhart once remarked that if the only prayer you said in your entire life was "Thank you," that would suffice. Genuine prayer ultimately resolves to an expression of thanks. We must praise the Bridge that carries us over into the presence and love of God that Bridge is Yeshua our Lord.

The "thank offering" mentioned in the Torah (zevach ha-todah, וַבָח הַתּוֹדֵד) also appears in the New Testament. In the Book of Hebrews, we are instructed to "continually offer up a sacrifice of thanks (זֵבַח תּוֹדָה) to God, that is, the fruit of lips that acknowledge His Name" (Hebrews 13:15). It is interesting to note that the Greek verb translated "offer up" (ἀναφέρω) is connected to the Hebrew verb for "to draw near" (karov) in the Torah. In other words, the "offering up of thanks" for the sacrifice of Yeshua functions as korban, a gift or sacrifice that draws us near to God. Thanking God for personal deliverance constitutes "right sacrifices" (זְבַחֵי־צֵדֵק) as we draw near in trust of His love (Psalm 4:5; Hebrews 7:19).

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

Secrets of the Scrolls

In 1947, a Bedouin boy in search of a lost goat threw a stone through the narrow opening of a cave. Hearing the sound of breaking pottery, he entered the cave and happened upon a 2,000-year-old treasure. The Scrolls — A New Revelation We quickly produced this half-hour program when the DSS first became widely accessible for study. Zola quotes from the Associated Press news release and emphasizes the significance of access.

The Scrolls: Part 2 Within days of our first program's broadcast, Dr. James Tabor phoned Zola to initiate a series of interviews that would unveil one of the 20th century's most dramatic revelations. This program is the first of these interviews. A professor of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Dr. Tabor delivers an incredible lesson.

The Scrolls: Part 3 During this interview, Dr. Tabor refers to several books about the DSS, including *The Complete Dead Sea Scrolls in English* by Vermes (Penguin Press), *The Dead Sea Scriptures* by Gaster (Anchor Doubleday), and *A Facsimile Edition of the Dead Sea Scrolls* (2 Volumes) by Robert H. Eisenman and James M. Robinson.

The Scrolls Special This program consolidates the first three programs and delivers their powerful message in only thirty minutes. Later discoveries in Scrolls research inspired the three following programs.

The Wilderness Group Michael Baigent, an English author, lectures in Qumran about the Scrolls. Dr. Tabor describes various approaches to excavation and how they pertain to the Scrolls. Dr. Robert Eisenman, a professor of Middle East religions at California State University at Long Beach, discusses the fascinating history of the Scrolls.

In Search of Answers Dr. Eisenman recaps his quest to gain access to the Scrolls. Dr. Tabor describes his archaeological team and how they map the caves in Qumran.

Prof. Michael Wise An in-depth interview with a professor of Aramaic, the language of Yeshua. University of Chicago professor Wise helped translate the fragments when they were first released and enthusiastically discusses The New Jerusalem text, telling how the future will be.

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






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The Stones Cry Out DVD Set Twelve 30-minute TV programs (3 DVDs)

Archaeological discoveries continue to validate the Biblical record. To film "dig" sites and interview experts, Zola journeyed to Israel and Jordan. Just as our Lord said about this remarkable Land, *The Stones Cry Out*.

The Tunnel Zola walks the tunnel under the western edge of the Temple Mount. We get a journalist's perspective of the Palestinian uproar that erupted when the tunnel was opened to the public in 1996.

A Tale of Two Temples An unearthed marketplace shows the Roman destruction of the Temple. Mount Gerizim to the north hosts the excavation of a Samaritan temple patterned after the Jerusalem Temple.

Rulers in Stone Caesarea, on Israel's Mediterranean coast, has yielded first-century finds such as the first extra-Biblical reference to Pontius Pilate, and a full-size Temple replica. At Tel Dan, the "House of David" has been confirmed archaeologically.

The Jerusalem That Was Bible Lands Museum houses a model of Jerusalem as it would have looked in 586 B.C. In the City of David, we examine a four-room house, typical architecture for ancient Israelites.

Past and Future Destruction Ongoing excavations at Hazor have unearthed Canaanite idols and confirmation of the city burning as recorded in Joshua 11. The Valley of Armageddon holds prophetic archaeological significance.

Archaeology and the Scriptures In Jerusalem, Zola explains the history of the Citadel, also called "David's Tower." We talk with the Israel Antiquities Authority.

Cities of the Past Zippori was a thriving cultural center in Galilee that probably influenced Jesus as a boy in Nazareth. Ekron was one of five prominent Old Testament cities of the Philistines.

Shadows from the Past A chamber of tombs, near the Garden Tomb but dated to the time of the First Temple, helps us understand burial customs of that day. We visit the Qumran cave where the first Dead Sea Scroll was found.

A Tale of Three Cities In Biblical times, a business relationship existed between three Jordan Valley cities: Beit Shean, Rehovot (west of the Jordan River), and Pella (east of the Jordan River). We visit excavations in each city.

The Rose Red City The ancient Nabataeans were famous for their skill in rock carving. Petra, their capital southeast of the Dead Sea, is the "rose-red city" known for its magnificent buildings carved into the native rock.

A Man Crucified On display at the Rockefeller Museum in Jerusalem, a man's heel bone that was pierced by a nail is the first archaeological proof of Roman crucifixions in Israel.

Truth from the Stones Zola discusses how the artifacts shown throughout this series illuminate Scripture, and how Believers can be encouraged when *The Stones Cry Out*.

U.S. Tourist Accidentally Finds Ancient Jug in the Judean Desert

An American tourist accidentally discovered an ancient and wellpreserved pottery vessel in Qumran, which is located in the Judean Desert near the Dead Sea.

Robbie Brown found the vessel in February as he and a friend decided to climb 328 feet to examine a cave known as Cave

53. The ancient jug is believed to be around 5,000 years old and could potentially be the first discovered complete jug unearthed in the area from this remote time-period.

Brown and his friend alerted the Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA). Amir Ganor, the director of the IAA's robbery prevention unit, was astonished at Brown's discovery. Ganor said, "It's amazing. Only about two years ago, our archaeologists surveyed the cave as part of a survey of the Judean Desert caves. This has been done continuously for the past five years and was intended to document and locate all ancient finds in the desert caves. In a few caves, pottery sherds were found, providing evidence of the Early Bronze Age. This is perhaps the first complete vessel we have found from this period in the caves in the Judean Desert."

Ganor praised Brown for his professional handling of the discovery. "It's good that the person who entered the cave was Robbie, who participated in the excavation and is aware of the importance of the finds and their role in completing the archaeological puzzle of the Land of Israel." Brown is no stranger to archaeological discoveries in Israel. In 2017, he participated in an excavation in the same region, which resulted in the discovery of an ancient blank scroll, as well as ancient olive seeds and dates.

Qumran, in the Judean Desert, is an area full of caves. It became world famous when, by chance, Bedouin shepherds discovered the priceless Dead Sea Scrolls in 1946–47. Due to its remote location and dry air, the Judean Desert contains a high concentration of well-preserved ancient artifacts. Over the years, the Judean Desert region has attracted many professional archaeologists and amateur archaeology buffs like Brown.


Archaeologists and historians believe that hundreds of Jews lived in the Qumran area in ancient times, based on the number of discovered buildings and Jewish ritual baths.

No credible Christian would ever take a stand against love — love of God, or our fellow man, or the supremacy or the teaching of love. I won't. But more frequently I see the misdefining of the word and the misguided (though well-meaning, I hope) use of and understanding of the word in teaching, articles, etc. Nowhere in Scripture do I find the love that Christians are supposed to have presented as unconditional. That is accepting, agreeing, partnering with, cooperating with, compromising with things and ideas that are categorically in opposition to the Word of God (2 Corinthians 6:14–17).

Far be it from me to lecture you on the finer points of word studies in the Bible. But when reading my Bible, with my concordance handy, I find *love* is almost always a verb, not a noun. Love is never presented as a feeling or an emotion, although it often *produces feeling and emotion*. The verb always denotes action in accordance and agreement with the commands of Jesus and the Word of God. Churches all over America are being taught to love God and love people unconditionally, without realizing that the greatest commandment rests on all the Law and the Prophets! In most churches these days, *love* means (and is taught as) finding common ground with movements like social justice, CRT, LGBTQ, political progressiveness, and ecumenical and other movements. To speak, act, or even think against them is considered unloving and un-Christlike. Love has become very emotion-based instead of obedience-based.

When reading Kirsten's article, I sensed the faintest traces of what I've been seeing and hearing for the last few years. Please tell me I'm wrong, and I'll apologize.

Dear L.M.: No need to apologize. A pristine exception to love being a verb rather than a noun is found in 1 Corinthians 13:4–8, "*Love is patient, love is kind....*" That said, I'm confident Kirsten hates sin and evil in keeping with Proverbs 8:13 and Psalm 97:10. — Mark





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

Science in Israel

New Israeli Technology Exposes Liars

Until now, the best, but not foolproof, method for finding out whether a person is lying

is with a polygraph. While a polygraph test relies on objective physiological responses, the collection and interpretation of its data are highly subjective. In addition, some people are skillful at lying without being detected.

Now, researchers at Tel Aviv University have found a better way to discover a lie — by measuring the movements of facial muscles.

"Many studies have shown that it's almost impossible for us to tell when someone is lying to us," noted Prof. Dino Levy. "Existing lie detectors are so unreliable that their results are not admissible as evidence in courts of law because just about anyone can learn how to control their pulse and deceive the machine. Consequently, there is a great need for a more accurate deception-identifying technology."

The new study was founded upon a groundbreaking innovation from Prof. Yael Hanein's laboratory at the Center of Nanoscience and Nanotechnology and School of Electrical Engineering in the Fleischman Faculty of Engineering. Stickers printed on soft surfaces contain electrodes that monitor and measure the activity of muscles and nerves. The technology, already commercialized by X-trodes Ltd., has many applications, including monitoring sleep at home and early diagnosis of neurological diseases.

Researchers attached the novel stickers with their special electrodes to two groups of facial muscles — the cheek muscles close to the lips and the muscles over the eyebrows. Participants were asked to sit in pairs facing one another, with one wearing headphones through which the words "line" or "tree" were transmitted.

When the wearer heard "line" but said "tree" or vice versa, he was obviously lying, and his partner's task was to try and detect the lie. Then the two subjects switched roles.

As expected, participants were unable to detect their partners' lies with any statistical significance. However, the electrical signals delivered by the electrodes (continued on next page)

attached to their face identified the lies at an unprecedented success rate of 73%.


"Since this was an initial study, the lie itself was very simple. Usually when we lie in real life, we tell a longer tale which includes both deceptive and truthful components," Levy explained. "In our study, we had the advantage of knowing what the participants heard through the headsets and therefore also

Using advanced machine learning techniques, we trained our program to identify lies based on EMG (electromyography) signals coming from the electrodes. Applying this method, we achieved an accuracy of 73% — not perfect, but much better than any existing technology. Another interesting discovery was that people lie through different facial muscles; some lie with their cheek muscles and others with their eyebrows."

The researchers believe that their results can have dramatic implications in many spheres of our lives. In the future, the electrodes could become redundant, with video software trained to identify lies based on the actual movements of facial muscles. "In the bank, in police interrogations, at the airport, or in online job interviews," predicted Levy, "high-resolution cameras

trained to identify movements of facial muscles will be able to tell truthful statements from lies. Right now, our team's task is to complete the experimental stage, train our algorithms, and do away with the electrodes. Once the technology has been perfected, we expect it to have numerous, highly diverse applications."

Some libertarians may oppose the use of cameras to detect when people are dishonest on the premise that "people are entitled to lie," and some politicians may not like the idea. But since deception is present in all walks of life, from social interactions to matters of homeland security, knowing who is truthful and who is lying could be a matter of life and death.

Stopping the Craving for Sweets

An Israeli start-up, Sweet Victory Ltd., has created a line of botanical-infused chewing gums designed to stop sugar cravings.

The gum takes effect within two minutes by blocking the tongue's sugar receptors and lasts up to two hours. During that time, the sweet foods and drinks that normally excite the taste buds are instead experienced as bland or even sour, allowing what could be an unhealthy binge to pass.

"Most of us battle with sweet cravings," noted Gitit Lahav, a psychologist who co-founded Sweet Victory with Shimrit Lev, a professional nutritional instructor.

"Kicking the sugar 'habit' is a real struggle for most of us. This is what spurred us to seek a solution that would help consumers take better control over their nutritional choices," Lahav said.

Lahav and Lev turned to the ancient Indian botanical gymnema (Gymnema sylvestre), known among Indians for its positive effect on glucose metabolism. In India,

"The atomic arrangement of bioactive gymnemic acid molecules is actually similar to that of glucose molecules," Lev explained. "These molecules fill the receptor locations on the taste buds and prevent activation by sugar molecules present in the food, thereby curbing the sugar craving." In India, gurmar leaves are chewed to elicit the effect.

Following sourcing of organic gymnema leaves in India, Sweet Victory manufactures the gum in a facility in Italy. It is available in peppermint, lemon, and ginger.

The gum has undergone a successful pilot study in Israel. One participant stated: "I chew the gum twice a day when I get the urge for something sweet, and I feel that the sweet I eat is tasteless. I even tried a chocolate mousse and it tasted sour! Most surprising is that I have no desire to eat."

"Most people crave something sweet at certain times of the day. Over time, it becomes an automatic instinct that makes the habit even harder to break," Lahav stated. "Chewing Sweet Victory gum at those challenging moments can slowly break bad habits and help build better, healthier habits."

Further clinical trials to determine its effect on blood sugar levels in persons with diabetes are forthcoming.

Sweet Victory is available in Panama, France, and Israel. It will soon be offered in the U.S.



Israeli Dietitians Turn Supplements Into Sweets

Dietitians at Sheba Medical Center in Israel have sweetened the offerings for some of their older patients who require food supplements.

At the height of the coronavirus pandemic, when no visitors were allowed in the hospital, Sheba dietitians observed that their

geriatric patients were extremely depressed, in poor nutritional condition, and barely eating.

"Our only option was to give them nutritional liquid supplements," said Meital Benjamin, a registered dietitian at Sheba Medical Center. "In one small bottle, they get a full meal's worth of nutrition—330 calories and 20 grams of protein."

Because getting geriatric patients to take their supplements is often challenging, a creative solution was needed to administer them in the most accessible way possible.

"The mental state of our patients at Sheba is of the utmost importance," said Dana Weiner, RD, director of the division of nutrition at Sheba. She initiated the project together with Sheba's Dr. Gilat Shenhav-Zaltzman.

"Patients must be able to help themselves mentally to feel better. Beyond all the other medical treatments our patients receive, if they do not have the physical energy needed, which the nutritional food supplements provide, they will not be able to get better."

A brand-new ice cream-making machine was donated specifically for

this purpose. The liquid supplements are poured into the machine and 45 minutes later, a nutritional supplement-based ice-cream is ready for consumption. It provides a healthy comfort-food option for geriatric patients, and according to the staff and patients, it also tastes good.



Served between breakfast and lunch in special cups just like at an ice cream parlor, the supplement formulas come in four flavors: vanilla, chocolate, cocoa, and banana.

According to Benjamin, when taken in their standard liquid form, the formulas have an aftertaste due to the vitamins added. However, when served in frozen ice cream form, the formula tastes like real ice cream.

"The response has been amazing," noted Benjamin, who runs the process together with fellow dietitian Ayelet Gur-Arie. "It's much better than having to tell patients to 'drink this.' It's so good, all the patients have been asking for second helpings."

Rachel Sasson, 78, a patient at Sheba, commented, "The last thing I expected to receive while being at the hospital was ice cream. It's a real treat. It tastes wonderful."

Mufti Slams Pence for "Storming" Tomb of the Patriarchs

Pence toured the city in March, visiting the Tomb of the Patriarchs, one of the holiest places in Judaism. The site includes a mosque called al-Haram al-Ibrahimi.

Accusing Pence of "storming" the site, the mufti claimed that the Ibrahimi Mosque is a place of prayer and worship for Muslims alone. The Palestinians regularly use the word *storm* to describe visits by Jews to the Temple Mount, the Tomb of the Patriarchs, and Joseph's Tomb in Nablus.

"What the U.S. vice president did is a provocative and dangerous act for which the [Israeli] occupation authorities bear the consequences," Hussein declared.

He also condemned the excavation and construction work carried out by the Israeli authorities in the courtyards of the Ibrahimi Mosque, which he said aims to build an elevator "to facilitate the extremist settlers' incursions into the mosque, in addition to changing the mosque's features."

The Palestinians are opposed to an Israeli project to build an elevator there to make the Biblical site wheelchair accessible. They claim that the project and other renovation work are designed to "Judaize" the site.

The mufti called on the Arab and Islamic countries and international institutions to take urgent action "to protect religious holy sites in the occupied Palestinian territories and prevent the takeover of the Ibrahimi Mosque and any changes to its Islamic features."

Latvia's \$44 Million Holocaust-Restitution Bill JNS.org

Latvia's parliament passed a bill to provide compensation for unrecovered Jewish property and funding for the country's Jewish community. The bill approved the spending of 40 million euros (\$44 million) over the course of 10 years. It is targeted to help Latvia's Jewish community institutions and cultural projects. The bill will also provide social and material assistance to Holocaust survivors. The funding is Latvia's "goodwill compensation" for unrecovered Jewish properties.

The legislation also states that the Latvian state is not responsible for the Holocaust that took place during the occupation of Latvia or the actions of the Soviet-occupying regime.

Negotiations regarding Latvia's Holo-(continued on next page)



caust restitution began in 2005 and involved the World Jewish Restitution Organization, Latvian Jewish representatives and government authorities, the United States, and Israel.

Latvia was occupied in June 1940 by the Soviet Red Army, and then a year later by the Nazis.

According to the The Associated Press (AP), roughly **95,000** Jewish people lived in Latvia before World War II. The Jewish community suffered during the Nazi occupation. When the Red Army retook Latvia in late 1944, an estimated 90% of the country's Jewish population had died.

Jewish community members were prevented from recovering properties they had owned in June 1940. Those properties were initially seized by the Soviet Union, then taken over by the Nazis, and then confiscated again by the Soviet Union before later becoming property of the Latvian state, the AP reported.

Latvia remained part of the Soviet Union until it gained independence in 1991.

The country's Jewish population currently stands at **9,500**, the AP noted.

Death on the Nile, a film starring Israeli actress Gal Gadot, will not appear in several Middle Eastern countries because of Gadot's background with the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). The movie has been banned in Lebanon and Kuwait. It was also the subject of protests in Jordan, Egypt, and other countries, where some social media protesters used the hashtag #BanTheZionistMovie.

Gadot, the 37-year-old former Miss Israel, served in the IDF for two years, as is required of all young Israelis, before entering show business. She has been criticized for her outspoken support for Israel and has been accused of being a "propaganda" tool for the Israeli military.

The ban in Lebanon stems from a law that prohibits Lebanese citizens from associating with Israelis, while Kuwait banned it after a barrage of protests on social media.

Girl Finds Ancient Silver Coin Likely Minted in the Temple

A rare silver coin from the first century was recently found by Liel Krutokop, an 11-year-old girl volunteering in an archaeological project. The coin was likely minted by a priest who joined the Jewish rebels against the Romans. If so, it would be one of the very few remains from the Temple.

"This is a rare find, since out of many thousands of coins discovered to date in archaeological excavations, only about 30 coins are coins made of silver, from the period of the Great Revolt," said Dr. Robert Kool, head of the Coin Department at the Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA).

The coin, made of pure silver, weighs about half an ounce. On one side it features a cup and the inscription "Israeli shekel" and "second year" — referring to the second year of the revolt (AD 67–68). On the other side, an inscription reads "Holy Jerusalem" in ancient Hebrew script, and is accompanied by another word that, according to the experts, refers to the headquarters of the high priest in the Temple.

The coin was likely minted by a priest who joined the Jewish rebels against the Romans.

In the first century, coins were considered an important expression of sovereignty. This was especially true for silver coins, which were much more valuable than bronze ones. A bronze coin would purchase a couple of loaves of bread, whereas a silver coin could be used for much more expensive items, including military equipment.

"A currency is a sign of sovereignty," Kool said. "If you go into rebellion, you use one of the most obvious symbols of independence, and you mint coins. The inscription on the coin clearly expresses the rebels' aspirations," he added.

To Index "The choice to use ancient Hebrew script, which was no longer in use at the time, is not accidental. The use of this script came to express the longing of the people of the period for the days of David and Solomon and the days of a united Jewish kingdom — days when the people of Israel had full independence in the land."

Huge reserves of silver were kept in the Temple. Kool believes that the silver to mint the coin likely came from those reserves, considering the quality of its silver. "If so, we can cautiously say that this coin is, apparently, one of the only items we can hold today that originated in the Temple itself," he explained.

The coin was found through the

Emek Tzurim Sifting Project, in which volunteers sift through the dirt excavated from the Pilgrimage Road. This street, "which connected the Siloam Pool in the south of the City of David to the Temple Mount in the north, was Jerusalem's main street during the Second Temple period, where thousands of pilgrims marched on their way to the Temple," said Ari Levy, an archaeologist who leads the excavation on behalf of the IAA.

"There is no doubt that there would have been extensive trading here. This is evidenced by the many weights and bronze coins we have found here," Levy added. "But to find a rebel coin made of pure silver is definitely very special and exciting."

Liel Krutokop, who came with her family from Petah Tikva to the sifting project, shared the excitement. "When I got to Emek Tzurim, I thought there must be simple coins in the buckets, but I did not think I would find a coin myself, and certainly not such a rare coin from pure silver," she said.

The Palestinian Authority's Twisted Ideal Mother

A recent incident exemplified a twisted aspect of the ideal mother that the Palestinian Authority (PA) has encouraged and cultivated for decades.

Three young terrorists who had carried out several shooting attacks against Israelis and were planning an imminent additional attack were recently killed and (in PA terminology) "ascended to Heaven" as "Martyrs." The official PA daily, reporting from the funerals of the three men, listed the following under the headline "Behind every Martyr there is a mighty mother!":

"Standing upright like [Mount] Gerizim and [Mount] Ebal, they confront death in a manner that amazed everyone. Despite the pain and the tears, gusts of joy burst forth, as if they were laughter rising from the rubble."

"As is fitting for the mothers of the Martyrs, the mother of Martyr Adham Mabrouka accompanied her son who is called Al-Shishani to the wedding. She shed two rose tears and did not seclude herself in clothes of mourning. She marched at the front of the participants in the funeral and called out loudly: 'With spirit, with blood, we will redeem you Martyr.'"



"She made sounds of joy while making the sign of victory. With determination and resolution, she raised his rifle and shot a bullet of joy and pride, while saying, 'Today is

the wedding day of my beloved, give me blessings and well-wishes.'"

"She drew attention with her composure, her firm willpower, and

her control over her sorrow, while bidding farewell to the flesh of her flesh with sounds of joy...."

This account is how the official PA daily described two of the three mothers acting at their sons' funerals — or as Palestinian Islamic belief has it, at their "weddings" to the 72 virgins in Paradise. With these descriptions, the PA indicates that this behavior is admirable, heroic, and expected — "as is fitting."

However, not all Palestinian mothers are able to live up to this twisted ideal. In an almost parenthetical note, the paper noted the third mother:

"The situation was different for the mother of Martyr Ashraf Mubaslat. She had no strength to sound calls and make sounds of joy, and her tears and sighs touched the hearts of millions. This is the sorrow of a mother who lost her only son...."

To remedy this less-than-ideal impression, the paper ended the funeral report by citing the three mothers allegedly stressing that "their sons are not more precious than the land of Palestine, and that they are now adorning themselves with pride and honor. Being called 'mother of a Martyr' was the greatest honor for them."




