> The ritual most frequently associated with Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year (in most English translations of the Bible called the Feast of Trumpets*), is the sounding of the shofar (ram's horn) in the synagogue. By Jewish tradition, a person who has not listened to the shofar has not observed the day. Rabbis have said that the mitzvah (commandment) is not fulfilled by merely hearing the shofar, as if by accident. Instead, the hearer must listen with the specific kavanah (intention) of fulfilling the Biblical commandment.

> The Biblical command to hear the shofar is expressed in Numbers 29:1: And in the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall have a holy convocation. You shall (continued p.8)

> * In the Bible, this holiday is never called *Rosh Hashanah* (the New Year). It falls on the first day of the seventh month as Moses reckoned time. Biblically, the Jewish religious year began in spring, in the month of Nisan (the Passover season).

Germany to Give \$720 Million to Holocaust Survivors Globally

The organization that facilitates claims on behalf of Jews who suffered under the Nazis said that Germany has agreed

to extend another \$720 million to provide home care and supportive services for vulnerable Holocaust survivors, some of whom became homeless refugees overnight in war-torn Ukraine following Russia's invasion.

The New York-based Conference on Jewish Material Claims Against Germany, also known as the Claims Conference, said the funds will be distributed to more than







When Prayer is a Crime and Violence is a Virtue

The Israel-Arab conflict is full of contradictions. To an outsider like me, however, nothing is as bizarre as the situation on the Temple Mount, the Jews' holiest site. (Muslims call it *Haram al-Sharif*, their third holiest site.)

On the Temple Mount, it is forbidden for Jews to pray, no matter how quietly or discreetly. Actually, it's forbidden for anyone but Muslims to pray on the Temple Mount.

It doesn't matter that the Temple Mount is the site of the Jews' First Temple destroyed by Babylon in 587/586 BC.

It doesn't matter that the Temple Mount is the site where the Jews' Second Temple was destroyed by the Romans in AD 70.

It doesn't matter that forbidding prayer is a blatant violation of freedom of religion.

It doesn't matter that it is a highly anti-Jewish rule applied at the center of the Jewish state.

But it gets more bizarre. Israel -

the Jewish state — agreed to this highly discriminatory rule, and the Israeli police enforce it. This agreement occurred between Israel and Jordan after the Six-Day War in 1967 during which Israel recaptured East Jerusalem, including the Temple Mount.

This situation has evolved somewhat in the past year. In July 2021, *The Times of Israel* reported that Israel was "quietly letting Jews pray on [the] Temple Mount," which was a "break with [the] status quo," but this change is still tentative. About that time, then Israeli Prime Minister Naftali Bennett spoke out in favor of freedom of worship for Jews on the Temple Mount, but later his office backpedaled by stating that "the status quo holds." In October 2021, a judge ruled that Jewish prayer was allowed on the Temple Mount if it is "non-noticeable." But after an appeal by the Israeli government, an appellate judge reversed that ruling, and Israel's Public Security Minister Omer Barlev insisted that the status quo remained intact.

On April 18, 2022, Jordanian Prime Minister Bisher Al-Khasawneh issued a statement saluting rioters who were "hurling their stones in a volley of clay at the Zionist sympathizers defiling the Al-Aqsa Mosque." How did "Zionist sympathizers" do that? According to *The Times of Israel*, "Palestinian rioters throw

rocks at Israeli buses en route to the Western Wall, as well as in the Temple Mount compound, in an attempt to prevent non-Muslims from touring the site." In other words, mere Jewish presence on the holiest Jewish site constitutes "defiling" in the eyes of Israel's Arab peace partners. Thus, violent opposition to that presence is seen as virtue.

At the same time, the Ra'am party — the only Arab party to participate in an Israeli government coalition — froze its support for the government and threatened to withdraw it altogether unless its demands were met, including restoring "the status quo on the Temple Mount under which Jews are allowed to visit, but not pray." Ra'am party leader Mansour Abbas is not otherwise anti-Israel; he declared in December 2021 that "Israel will always be a Jewish state."

Some Arabs try to rationalize their opposition to Jewish prayer on the Temple Mount. They cite some rabbis who say that according to Jewish law, Jews should not enter the Temple Mount. A disagreement among Jews on Jewish law, however, is not for non-Jews to decide, and it does not justify violence against Jews.

From a moral point of view, the solution is simple. Anyone from any religion should be able to pray anywhere they want if they respect the rights of others to do the same. This is an internationally recognized fundamental human right. Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted on December 10, 1948 by the UN General Assembly, states: "Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience, and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship, and observance." Even an atheist like me who doesn't care for praying anywhere can understand this right. Human rights aren't about allowing others to do what we think makes sense; it's about allowing everyone to do what makes sense for them.

From a realpolitik point of view, however, the solution is much less clear. The exercise of this fundamental human right by a small number of Jews angers Arabs, including pro-Israel Israeli Arabs and Arab states that have signed peace agreements with Israel. To maintain internal peace and peace with its neighbors, Israel is forced to compromise even on the fundamental freedom of religion of its Jewish citizens.

In response to Jordan's support for the rioters, Bennett denounced "those who are encouraging rock-throwing and the use of violence against the citizens of the State of Israel," but he did not specifically name Jordan.


On this fundamental issue of basic human rights for Jews, the Jewish state finds itself at the mercy of Arabs. This is ironic considering that Israel was meant to be the one place on Earth where Jews are guaranteed equal rights with everyone else. At the same time, the stubborn and sometimes violent Arab opposition to basic Jewish human rights is a reminder of why Israel exists. If Jewish rights are limited in the Middle East even within the Jewish state, one can easily imagine how much more limited they would be if Israel did not exist.

Such turbulence surrounding the site of God's earthly footstool! Muslims may try to forbid prayer there, but prayer doesn't have to be spoken aloud. —Kirsten \Rightarrow

As drivers in the U.S., we face conditions — "if-then" decisions. *If* we drive under the speed limit, *then* we won't get stopped for speeding. But *if* we exceed the speed limit, *then* we might get stopped by law enforcement and receive a ticket. Some people abide by these conditional laws; others disregard them, thus exposing themselves to potential penalties.

We Believers* face conditional decisions daily, not just when driving. This reality has been true throughout history. The Book of Genesis reveals that God created humans with free will—the ability to choose. Adam and Eve had the freedom to eat fruit from any tree in the Garden, except one—the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. *If* they ate from that tree, *then* they would surely die.

Soon, however, they believed the serpent's lies and dismissed God's truth. The "if" happened. The couple yielded to temptation and ate the forbidden fruit. They didn't obey the conditions God stated; therefore, they suffered the consequences.

Last month, I mentioned the prophets Jeremiah and Ezekiel (<u>"Prophetically</u> Speaking," p. 6, August Levitt Letter). On Our Jewish Roots this year, we are featuring these two courageous servants who communicated God's Word. The messages they delivered to God's people contained many "if" promises.

Through Jeremiah, the Lord said, *"If you repent, I will restore you..."* (Jeremiah 15:19). This was a conditional statement. God wanted to restore His people, but He expected action from them. In many of the *"if-then"* promises in the Bible, God requires us to act — to do something. And typically, our part is minor compared to God's part.

Doing Our Part

In 2 Chronicles 7:14, Yahweh made a conditional promise. He noted four things for His people to do: "humble themselves and pray and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways." God's promise — "then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land" — far outweighed what the people were to do.

Jesus even declared, "*if you have faith as a mustard seed*... *nothing will be impossible for you*" (Matthew 17:20). Again, we see that the reward outweighs the requirement.

300 social welfare organizations in more than 80 countries.

In recent years, during negotiations with the German government, the Claims Conference pressed the dire need to increase home care funding for Holocaust survivors both in the U.S. and globally.

The new allocations are distributed to social welfare organizations in regions where significant numbers of survivors live, to ensure that vital services such as home care, medical care, emergency

assistance, and food are available for Holocaust survivors in those regions.

These considerable funds constitute one of the largest allocations from any grant-making organization in the world in one year and the largest amount ever allocated for the Claims Conference in a single year. In 2021, the organization distributed \$653 million in grants to over 300 social service agencies worldwide. This year the conference estimates that the funds, through the grants and partner organizations, will reach approximately 120,000 survivors.

More than 75 years after the Holocaust ended, in the U.S., survivors continue to suffer, with 40% of the 36,000 survivors in the New York area living in or near poverty.

Gideon Taylor, president of the Claims Conference, stated, "We are proud to announce this significant allocation at a time when these funds are critical, due to the age, poverty, and increasing disability of our waning survivor population, and as they also continue to face the ongoing uncertainty and threat of COVID-19. We know these funds provide vital support during these difficult times." ☆

do no customary work. For you it is a day of blowing the trumpets.

The word "trumpets" does not appear in the Hebrew text, but it is implied. Nor does the word *shofar* appear in the Hebrew text of the Torah related to the holiday called *Rosh Hashanah*. In the passage quoted above, the holiday is simply called *Yom T'ruah*, a day of blowing. However, it means more than simply "blowing" a trumpet or ram's horn.

The Three Trumpet Calls

Three basic trumpet calls are sounded in the synagogue during the *Rosh Hashanah* service.

The first is the *t'kiyah* — one long, sustained blast. In ancient Israel, this reassuring sound signaled that the watchmen guarding the city were on duty and all

was well. That sound periodically divided up the watches of the day and night.

The second trumpet call consists of three successive blasts called *shevarim*. In ancient times, these signaled a significant event — the changing of the guard, the arrival of an important person, or a call to assemble for welcome news. The sound of *shevarim* was less routine than the *t'kiyah*, but it was welcome because it meant good tidings.

The third trumpet call — the one mentioned in the Bible in reference to the Feast of Trumpets — is the sound of alarm. It consists of nine rapid bursts on the *shofar*, referred to as *t'ruah*. This alerted Israel that they were under attack and that all the fighting men were to gather immediately for battle. The *t'ruah* might also be sounded for another calamity that required an urgent convocation of all the people. Thus, in most Biblical texts where *t'ruah* appears, the word is translated "alarm." A simpler, better translation of the Hebrew phrase *Yom T'ruah*, usually rendered "Feast of Trumpets," would be "Day of Alarm." This very literal translation communicates more of the flavor and intent of the holiday.

The Day of Alarm

To use the Bible's own terms, then, *Rosh Hashanah* is the Day of Alarm. The question arises: Why should Israel be alarmed? The summer harvest season had ended. The barns were full of grain and the storehouses were filled with fruit. What more could be wanted or needed? The Torah gives the answer:

When you have eaten and are full, then you shall bless the LORD your God for the good land which He has given you. Beware that you do not forget the LORD your God by not keeping His commandments, His judgments, and His statutes which I command you today, lest — when you have eaten and are full, and have built beautiful houses and dwell in them ... and all that you have is multiplied; when your heart is lifted up, and you forget the LORD your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage ... then you say in your heart, 'My power and the might of my hand have gained me this wealth.' And you shall remember (continued on next page)



the LORD your God, for it is He who gives you power to get wealth, that He may establish His covenant which He swore to your fathers, as it is this day. Then it shall be, **if you...forget the LORD your God**, and follow other gods... I testify against you this day that **you shall surely perish**... because you would not be obedient to the voice of the LORD your God. —Deuteronomy 8:10–14, 17–20 (emphasis added)

By instituting the fall festivals consisting of the Day of Alarm, the Day of Atonement, and the Feast of Booths (forsaking secure homes to live in flimsy huts), God taught Israel an important lesson: With God on her side, she need not fear earthly calamities or earthly enemies. Likewise, she must not seek security in earthly things, but in her relationship with Him.

Rosh Hashanah (Yom T'ruah) was a preparation for *Yom Kippur*, the Day of Atonement. It was intended to turn minds away from the secular affairs of the summer season to focus on spiritual issues: God's holiness, the people's sin, and the atonement God had provided.

Ancient Israel needed to be periodically alarmed — by the awareness of sin that separated her from God, and by her need for atonement. In the synagogue today, the *shofar* sound of *t'ruah* should still alarm people. It should still register as an alert that points to the danger of remaining in sin without atonement. Scripture says, *"Your iniquities have separated you from your God"* (Isaiah 59:2) and *"The soul who sins shall die"* (Ezekiel 18:4).

Be Alarmed

For Jewish Believers in Yeshua, the *kavanah*, or central theme on hearing the *shofar*, is joy in the knowledge that we have already allowed the seriousness of our sins to alarm us. We have heard and received the Good News — that God has atoned for sin, and that He delivers us from calamity through the sacrifice of our righteous Messiah Yeshua.

Hath God Cast Away His People?"

A mindless set of "Biblical" ideas called Replacement Theology would disenfranchise the Chosen People from their status with God altogether and replace them with the Christian Church. This amazing reconstruction of Scripture, which does violence to 10,000 verses, seems meant only in a spirit of anti-Semitism.

A church in Tyler, Texas requested that I teach Paul's brilliant dissertation on the Jewish condition in Romans 9–11, which the Scofield Bible heads "The Gospel Does Not Set Aside the Covenants with Israel." Romans 10:1, the centerpiece of Paul's very personal writing, is part of the logo of this ministry: "Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God

for Israel is that they might be saved." My heart's desire and prayer is the same as Paul's, and I was glad to comply with the request. I will share below, in abbreviated form, the lucid arguments and very persuasive theology of the great Apostle to the gentiles on the plight of Israel.

Romans 9–11 discusses the seeming lack of Jewish involvement in salvation by Christ. Jewish salvation was declining at that time (around AD 57), despite Israel's "chosen" status. Had God abandoned them? Was He choosing someone else now instead? Was the Church to replace Israel? Was Christ strictly for the gentiles and were the Jews saved under the Law?

Chapter 9 begins with a statement of Paul's very deep concern for his people. He expresses that he would have given up his own salvation in Christ if it would somehow help the Jewish people. Then he enters a discussion (verse 6) on the cultural and spiritual posterity of Abraham. His statement, *"For they are not all Israel which are of Israel,"* has given rise to a number of cults that disenfranchise the Chosen People — the Mormons, the various lost tribe cults, etc. Paul's statement, however, simply distinguishes between spiritual people and unspiritual people. Both groups are found liberally among the Jews (and among the gentiles) everywhere.

God chooses whom He will (verses 9-13), Paul goes on, and he gives examples of the choice of Isaac over Ishmael and Jacob over Esau. God even "raised up" Pharaoh for His divine purposes (verses 17-18). We have no more basis to question the sovereignty of God than a lump of clay has to question the choices of the potter (verses 19-21). God deals with wrath and with mercy, as with the raising up of Pharaoh and the salvation of Jews and gentiles (verses 22-24).

And though God will call out a massive Church of gentiles, with the Jews there is always a believing remnant.

Paul guotes Isaiah and other prophets (verses 27-28) concerning the idea of the remnant, which was apparent in his day and is seen in today's world as well. The upcoming Tribulation Period will have the 144,000 as its remnant. The Kingdom will enjoy the participation of "all Israel" when the Lord returns (Rom. 11:26). Paul ends his discussion in Romans 9 with the observation that the gentiles have obtained righteousness by faith, but the unsaved Jews pursued it by works of the Law, which caused them to stumble "at that stumbling stone," the Messiah, when He appeared (verses 28-33).

Paul begins Romans 10 with the statement about his heart's desire, quoted above. He admits that the Jewish zealousness for God is not according

to knowledge. Having not understood the nature of God's righteousness, they chose the Law and not Christ when they were given the choice (verses 2–4). At that time, they should have understood the concept of true faith from Moses — at least that it was "*nigh unto them*" (verse 8). The concept of achieving righteousness through pure faith is a thoroughly familiar idea in the Old Covenant, but one that escapes an external performer like a sacramental law keeper.

Paul then presents the "Gospel truth" for Jew and gentile (verses 9–13), quoting Joel 2:32, "...*whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved."* There could be no mistaking the clear salvation covenant in Paul's writing:

That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the Scripture saith, "Whosoever believeth on Him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon Him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." —Romans 10:9–13

The Apostle then discusses the universal problems of witnessing and missions, quoting the verse we often use on television when we ask for your support, "*How shall they preach, except they be sent?*" (verse 15). He observes that Israel heard the Gospel adequately and was apprised in prophecy of God's someday turning to the gentiles. Moses and Isaiah both spoke of this (verses 19–20). And finally, at the end of Romans 10, Paul laments that God has stretched out His hand to Israel with little good results and he implies the question, "Hath God cast away His people?"

Next month, Zola addresses Romans 11, where Paul answers this question and explains Israel's place in God's plan of redemption. —Editor

Several times in the Book of John, the phrase "My hour," "His hour," or "the/this hour" refers to Jesus' glorification through His death and resurrection.

At a Wedding

One occurrence comes when Jesus addressed His mother at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. Jesus said to her, "Woman, what does your concern have to do with Me? My hour has not yet come" (John 2:4). Jesus was noting that when He started performing miracles, it would begin the inevitable process to the Cross — thus He must assure that it did not happen prematurely.

In the Temple

John 7:30 notes the second instance: "Therefore they [the Temple guards sent by the Sanhedrin] sought to take Him, but no one laid a hand on Him, because His hour had not yet come." The guards could not arrest Jesus because it was not the time God sovereignly designated for

His Son to be crucified. Another reference notes a similar situation, "And no one laid hands on Him, for His hour had not yet come" (John 8:20).

Before His Crucifixion

Jesus mentioned His "hour" several more times, including John 12:23, "But Jesus answered them, saying, 'The hour has come that the Son of Man should be glorified."" To this point in John's Gospel, His "hour" anticipated a future event. Beginning here, however, Jesus spoke of it in the present. Shortly afterward, He said it again: "Now My soul is troubled, and what shall I say? 'Father, save Me from this hour'? But for this purpose I came to this hour" (John 12:27). Jesus did not withdraw from His impending "hour" — His ultimate purpose was to suffer and die on the Cross to bring about the salvation of humanity.

Before the Passover, "Jesus knew that His hour had come that He should depart from this world to the Father" (John 13:1). Then during the meal, He revealed to His Disciples, "Indeed the hour is coming, yes, has now come, that you will be scattered, each to his own, and will leave Me alone. And yet I am not alone, because the Father is with Me" (John 16:32). When Jesus was arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane, the Disciples abandoned Him before the "hour" (time) of His death. Jesus mentioned that time when He prayed, "Father, the hour has come. Glorify Your Son, that Your Son also may glorify You" (John 17:1). The climax of Jesus' mission to save mankind was at hand.

Jesus' glorification through His crucifixion and resurrection is the greatest hour in the history of the world. Since this climactic hour has passed, we as Believers have the mission of declaring this message to the whole world.

At Mt. Hermon and Rosh Pina ZLM Staff Theologian TJF Team Leader

On day five of our March 2022 Gospel outreach in Israel, Dr. August Rosado and I were near snowy Mount Hermon. This was the site of Jesus' transfiguration (Matthew 17). At the base of Mt. Hermon is Caesarea Philippi. where Peter confessed to Yeshua. "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matt. 16:16).

We shared the gospel with Niv and Tanif, two Israel Defense Forces soldiers. Because it was the Sabbath, they would not let us take their pictures. We gave them complete Hebrew Bibles along with chips, water, and chocolate bars. They said we were awesome (sababa in Hebrew), but August replied, "No, you are awesome for defending the State of Israel." Then August explained that Yeshua was transfigured on this same mountain and Moses and Elijah appeared to Him here. They were blown away! They thanked us for coming to Israel.

The next day, we traveled south to Rosh Pina, which in Hebrew means "cornerstone." In this small town (population 3,000) north of the Sea of Galilee, we visited a hiking store called Ricochet where we met two employees, Eddie and Anas. When we told them that we had come to Israel to bring God's Word and the Good News of Yeshua the Messiah to

God's people, they were genuinely open to our message.

Eddie stated that he believed that the aim of life was to love your neighbor as yourself. We pointed out that Jesus said the same thing in the B'rit Hadashah (New Testament). We added that the first priority, however, is loving the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, and mind (Mark 12:30-31). August and I explained that because of God's love for humanity, He sent Yeshua the Messiah to die for our salvation. This Jewish Messiah is the Cornerstone of Biblical revelation in the Jewish Scriptures (1 Peter 2:6).

August and I asked if they would like a free copy of the Hebrew Scriptures to discover this saving truth for themselves. Both men happily accepted a study Bible and the Messianic Gospel literature that we included.

Please pray that these men will have open hearts and minds as they read God's Word. Also pray that Ruach HaKodesh (the Holy Spirit) will enlighten them about the truth of Yeshua the Messiah and will draw them to salvation through faith in Him.

For several years, and [2018] in particular, ZLM's numbers on its financial statements were all but yelling that our multi-year, downward revenue trend was perilously unstoppable. Movie scenes of platoon commanders, under direct orders, leading their soldiers into losing battles played in my mind repeatedly as I began a series of articles to make this ministry's needs known.

You may remember some of those Levitt Letter titles from [2018]: "Letting Go & Letting God" (May), "Have Faith: Death is Not the End" (June), "Making it to the Other Side" (August), "Weighing and Praying" (October), and "A Coward Dies Many Times" (December). Before our circumstances became too dire, I felt compelled to caution some of our donors not to go overboard with their generosity. Thus, I wrote "Pray About Your Two Pence" (July).

Fortunately, that third article's conclusion from over three years ago continues to hold true — maybe now more than ever:

The bottom line is this: We are holding our own; we aren't having to give up key airtimes ... yet. Soon, as more viewers turn to the internet, it may make sense for ZLM to spend less on television broadcasting. For now, however, thank you, thank you, thank you so very much for continuing to help us persevere. It really is a good, though sometimes scary, fight (1 Timothy 6:12; 2 Timothy 4:7). ✿

There is a great war going on, but it's not a war waged with conventional weapons. Nor is it a war that leaders in this world have devised to attain their devious political ends. No, this is the war for the souls of human beings, and every person alive is currently engaged in it. There is no place of neutrality in this war; you cannot escape the conflict. Passivity or indifference are not options; each of us must choose a side. We are either going forward or going backward; we are either drawing near or pulling away. Mi Adonai aylai? "Who is on the LORD's side?" (Ex. 32:26)

The Apostle Paul wrote about this war: "For though we walk in the flesh [that is, as mortal men], we are not waging war according to the flesh [that is, in human terms]. For the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh but have divine power to demolish strongholds. We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ" (2 Cor. 10:3–5).

Successful spiritual warfare is waged by trusting in the power of God to demolish "strongholds" where evil is deeply rooted. (The word "stronghold" is a metaphor for militant prejudice that seeks to justify godlessness.) In the secular world, these strongholds are expressed in the reasoning (λογισμός, "logic") and arrogant opinions (ὕψωμα, "pretenses") called "*the wisdom of this world*" (1 Cor. 3:19). We must use discernment to identify the fallacies and misleading schemes circulated by this world system. We do this when we "take every thought captive" to the glorious truth of the Messiah.


This is "the good fight of the faith" (1 Tim. 6:12). The fight is "good" because it turns on the victory and glory of the Lord, who shares His overcoming life with us. The battle belongs to the Lord; the victory has been secured (2 Chron. 20:15; Rom. 8:37-39). Always remember that we never fight for, but always from, the place of His victory, standing our ground in the sufficiency of God's power given to us (Luke 10:19). We must not be afraid but stand firm in the strength given to us by God's Spirit (Zech. 4:6; Eph. 6:11-18). The Lord will help us in the battle (Deut. 3:22; 2 Thess. 3:3). 众

Dead Sea Named a Top Healing Spot

Topping *Travel* + *Leisure*'s list of recommended international healing destinations for 2022 is the Dead Sea.

This unique body of water, bordered by Israel and Jordan, is also called the Salt Sea (*Yam Hamelach* in Hebrew). At almost 1,000 feet deep, it's the deepest salt water lake in the world. The Dead Sea's shores and water surface are over 1,400 feet below sea level. Its salt concentration is nearly 34%, which is 27 times denser than Utah's Great Salt Lake and 9.6 times saltier than most oceans.

Writing about the Dead Sea, the travel magazine noted: "Besides being absolutely breathtaking, this landlocked salt lake has long been touted for its health-giving properties. From slathering the black mud over your skin for exfoliation and alleviating skin conditions like psoriasis, to its professed natural power to remedy asthma, arthritis, osteoporosis, and other issues, the body of water also boasts a low content of pollen and other allergens.... At 1,412 feet below sea level, harmful UV rays are filtered through an evaporation layer above the Dead

Sea, the ozone layer, and an extra atmospheric layer. This is said to mean that sunbathers can absorb the beneficial effects of vitamin D from the sun's rays without risk of sunburn and ensuing skin damage."

Travel + *Leisure* noted that Cleopatra is believed to have traveled to the Dead Sea with her Egyptian entourage to bathe in its waters.

Ezekiel prophesied that in the Millennium, waters from the Temple will flow down to the Dead Sea. Its water will become fresh — full of life — and trees will grow on its banks that will provide fruit for food and leaves for healing (Ezek. 47:1–12). — Editor

Perversions of God's Word?

From N.C.: My Dad and I watch your program each week and support your projects where we can. I really liked the Bible crossword from Andrea Davis in the Levitt Letter. I was disappointed when she switched from KJV to NIV. Most of the "new" versions are based on translations from Westcott and Hort, who were not Christians. Only the King James Version is the preserved (over 400 years) Word of God in English. In England, they picked 49 language scholars and went through each verse seven times to ensure proper translation. Most people don't like "thee" and "thou," but that was to ensure proper noun verb tenses. The NIV had homosexuals on the translation team. That is my studied opinion.



UNWIELDINESS ASIDE, BOB PREFERRED HIS MORE AUTHENTIC VERSION OF THE BIBLE

Dear N.C.: As you may know, the original documents that we have of God's inspired Word were written in Hebrew. Aramaic, and Greek. Thus, the KJV did not "preserve" God's Word in English. It is one translation into English (among almost 50!) and not even the first English Bible translation (which was from John Wycliffe over 230 years earlier).

Other English translations (or the 700 other language translations) are not perver-

sions of God's Word. No translation is perfect; all versions have words or phrases that are disputed by some Bible scholars. The KJV also has translation errors. For example, the KJV mentions unicorns in several places (including Numbers 23:22 and Isaiah 34:7) as a translation for a one-horned animal. There are books and web pages that note other translation issues (both minor and major).

Newer scholarship has resulted in more accurate translations than what was possible for the KJV over 400 years ago. Much of the KJV is fine and is the source of some of our most beloved and memorized verses ("For God so loved the world...", etc.). However, some passages are hard for modern English readers to understand due to archaic idioms and words whose meaning has changed. And understanding God's Word to put it into practice in our lives is what is most important.

There are three primary Bible versions: Word-for-word, thought-for-thought, and paraphrased. Each type has its uses. We recommend that people consult a variety of translations when encountering a difficult passage and not limit themselves to a single version or translation style. - Greg H., webmaster



Robotic Beehive Helps Save Bees and Global Food Supply

A third of all the food produced in the world is pollinated by bees. Because of this, the decreasing global honeybee population is a great concern for our food supply.

"We're losing honeybee colonies at an unprecedented rate globally. Just 40 years ago, the annual colony loss rate was a mere 3%. Today, it's

more than 35%. When this rate surpasses 50%, the world will be unable to sustain the bee population," said Saar Safra, CEO and co-founder of Beewise, an Israeli startup determined to save the bees.

Beehome is Beewise's newly designed beehive that includes precision robotics, computer vision, and Artificial Intelligence (AI). It enables constant monitoring of live honeybees, using AI to observe their needs in real-time. Beewise does not alter what beekeepers traditionally do. Rather, it augments their work by upgrading the traditional, 150-year-old beehive.

It's beekeeping at scale, as Safra describes it. The Beehome "provides 24/7 monitoring and smart technology that significantly increases pollination capacity and honey production; detects threats to a honeybee colony such as pesticides and the presence of pests and immediately defends against them; responds to threats in real-time and requires no human intervention; is thermally regulated; protects from fires, flooding, and Asian wasps or murder hornets; and provides enhanced feeding techniques for when forage is not available to the bees."

There are many threats to this important component of our food supply, including widespread use of pesticides, pollution, new diseases and pests, and more. These factors will continue to reduce the bee population unless beekeepers get the help they desperately need.

Beewise currently manages more than seven billion bees, which equates to 25,000 acres of pollinated crops. The company estimates that Beehome has saved over 160 million bees since May 2021.

"Beehome reduces bee mortality by 80% — from 35% colony loss in the field to less than 8% — resulting in increased yields of at least 50%. And Beehome eliminates approximately 90% of manual labor compared to traditional beehives," added Safra.

For beekeepers, a solution that saves their business comes as a great relief, promising to reverse the alarming trend.

Expressions of relief, however, will go beyond the beekeepers. According to the USDA, one colony of honeybees is worth 100 times more to the community than to the beekeeper.

Snoring Is a Risk Factor for Post-Menopausal Women

Medical professionals around the world could save lives and reduce illness by talking snoring with their post-menopausal female patients, Israeli researchers emphasized.

Undetected sleep apnea is most common among post-menopausal women. The sleep disorder, in which breathing repeatedly stops and starts, can lead to adverse medical conditions including cardiovascular events, hypertension, heart attack, stroke, and even death.

Prof. Ilana Eli of Tel Aviv University, who led the peer-reviewed study that was published in the *Journal of Clinical Medicine*, stressed that undetected sleep apnea is worrying. She noted that many women are hesitant to tell doctors they

snore. They feel it's not feminine, but they are endangering their health by being quiet, as snoring is a risk factor for sleep apnea, Eli said.

Eli, a dental professor and expert in sleep disturbance, found that around 1 in 10 women aged 55-plus who snore develop sleep apnea — many more than among younger women — but only a tiny proportion of them are diagnosed. This means that many women lack treatment, which is sometimes a relatively simple process of administering oxygen while sleeping.

"Many women wrongly think that it's not befitting for a woman to admit to snoring," said Eli. "But it's important medical information, and there are great benefits to doctors becoming more focused on snoring and asking post-meno-pausal women if they snore."

Post-menopausal women with sleep apnea often suffer from unexplained fatigue, headaches, muscle soreness upon waking, and sleep problems. For some, telling a doctor about snoring can help them piece together complaints and understand that sleep apnea is at the root of the problem.

Eli commented: "The lack of early diagnosis is particularly noticeable in ... women over the age of 50, who suffer from an increase in the incidence of sleep-disordered breathing due to hormonal changes that occur during menopause. We wanted to examine and characterize the phenomenon in this group in order to raise a red flag when necessary."

Eli and her colleagues noted that in addition to doctors, dentists, who are not generally involved in detecting sleep apnea, should be asked to spot cases of it.

The researchers wrote: "Expanding the focus of dental diagnosis beyond the oral cavity and paying attention to common daily symptoms, such as SB [sleep brux-ism or teeth grinding], snoring, muscle stiffness, or headaches upon awakening, can help dentists to detect initial signs of OSA [sleep apnea]."

Chief Joseph RiverWind and his wife, Dr. Laralyn RiverWind, have been building bridges between Jews and Christians for the past 16 years.

Laralyn was raised in a Christian home and has been a Believer since her youth. She was raised to love and support Israel.


Together, they have spent the past 16 years embracing Torah and weeding

out pagan practices from their religious beliefs. Today, they run FireKeepers International in Elizabethton, Tennessee.

After completing a pilot program in Israel in 2018, the RiverWinds were made "Ambassadors of God" at the Knesset by then MK Rabbi Yehuda Glick on Jerusalem Day.

Joseph is a "peace chief" and the ambassador of his Native American tribe, Descendants of Puerto Rico's First Nation. Laralyn is the am-

bassador of the Georgia Tribe of Eastern Cherokee. But they say that their favorite titles are "servant of God" and "friend of Israel."

Christian World (at *The Jerusalem Post*) recently interviewed the RiverWinds.

What is the main focus of your activities today?

We are preparing people for hard times. We believe that hard times are coming for Jews and Christians. We have been saying this for about a year, and we are beginning to see some of that already unfolding. We desire to see the two [religious] groups work together to optimize survival.

One of the ways we do this is by fighting anti-Semitism through public speaking and social media platforms.

How long have you been doing that?

For the last year, we have been focusing on survival/hard times. But we have been working on Jewish-Christian relations for 16 years.

What are some of the successful related programs or projects that you have done this year and in past years?

We have been working with Jews and others to supply Native Americans (on and off reservations) with personal protective equipment and food during the COVID-19 crisis.

How did you get to where you are today?

We got where we are today by loving the Creator, loving others, and listening to wisdom from our elders.

What do you think God is doing with regard to Jewish-Christian relations?

We believe that God is:

• calling Christians to repent for the sins of the past toward the Jewish people.

Delegation of Young European Muslims Visits Israel

Eighteen-year-old **Sofia Swidi**, a Belgian Muslim living in Brussels, visited Israel in July and found that none of what she heard about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict back home corresponded to the reality on the ground.

"What we see in our media is Israeli soldiers with rifles beating Palestinians. The other day we went on

a tour of Jerusalem, and I happened to see an Israeli soldier at the bus stop, and she looked like a regular person, just in uniform. She was very sweet, like any other girl, no matter where you come from or your religion," she described.

Sofia lives in Molenbeek, one of the municipalities that has become known as a place of refuge for extremist Muslims. Its members have perpetrated terror attacks in Belgium and other European countries.

"We feel a little bit safer today; terrorism in Europe has diminished, but the stereotypes against us still exist," she explained. "The attacks and terror hurt us as well; it gives us a bad name. There is a fear of being labeled as 'Muslims, the terrorists.""

Sofia arrived in Israel as part of a 40-member delegation of young Muslim community leaders from France and Belgium. The trip was organized by Israeli education NGO

LNET and led by French imam **Hassen Chalghoumi**, who holds moderate views and opposes anti-Semitism.

Abd al-Hamid Benishu, who worked as

Algeria, he moved to Belgium at the age of 22. He has long warned against the growing extremism among Molenbeek youth.

"It comes from the mosques. There's

brainwashing. They preach in a more sophisticated manner today, but the messages are clear and the extremism in mosques still exists," he noted. "A Muslim person doesn't see himself as a citizen of Belgium first and foremost, but as an immigrant, part of the Muslim collective. Belgium was too tolerant with Muslims for many years. There is a need for boundaries."

Almost Half of Israelis Fear a Second Holocaust

Despite the phrase "never again" long linked to Holocaust commemoration, almost half (47%) of the Israeli public are concerned that another Holocaust will strike the Jewish people.

A new survey found that women expressed more anxiety about another Holocaust compared to men (55% versus 42%). It also revealed that younger Israelis are especially fearful — 24% of Israelis under the age of 24 said that they were very worried about a second Holocaust, in contrast to just 12% of Israelis over the age of 45. Notably, religiously observant Israelis are more worried about an ensuing Holocaust. Israelis who define themselves as *Haredim* (ultra-Orthodox) were very concerned about the likelihood, as opposed to just 11% of Israelis who identify themselves as secular.

The ongoing threat from the Iranian regime, which has repeatedly declared its desire to wipe out the Jewish state, is a noted contributor to Israelis' concerns.

Archaeology Ancient Mosaics Discovered in Lower Galilee

A team of archaeologists recently discovered depictions of the Biblical heroines Deborah and Jael. The group was working at an excavation site in the ancient Jewish village of Huqoq in the Lower Galilee.

Led by University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill professor Jodi Magness, the team of specialists and students excavated the mosaics that are believed to be nearly 1,600 years old.

The archaeologists have been working on the excavation of an ancient Jewish synagogue — the Hugog Excavation Project — since 2011.

They recently uncovered mosaics that portray the story of Deborah the prophetess as recorded in the Book of Judges. She joined Barak in the battle against King Jabin of Canaan. Together, they defeated the Canaanite forces.

Barak had said he would only go to battle if Deborah joined him. Deborah then prophesied that a woman would be honored for killing Sisera, the commander of Jabin's army. When facing defeat at the hand of the Israelites, the Canaanite commander fled the battle and hid in the tent of a Jewish woman named Jael, who killed him by driving a tent peg into his head.

"This is the first depiction of this episode and the first time we've seen a depiction of the Biblical (continued on next page)

heroines Deborah and Jael in ancient Jewish art," Magness said.

"Looking at the Book of Joshua, chapter 19, we can see how the story might have had special resonance for the Jewish community at Huqoq, [since it happened] in the same geographical region — the territory of the tribes of Naphtali and Zebulun," she added.

The newly-found mosaics are in three sections: the first shows Deborah looking at Barak; the second shows a seated Sisera; and the third shows Sisera lying on the ground after Jael killed him.



According to the Hugog Excavation Project website, the synagogue was built in the Late Roman period (early fifth century AD). It includes beautiful mosaics that depict many Biblical scenes, including the building of the Tower of Babel, Noah's Ark, the parting of the Red Sea, Samson from the Book of Judges, Jonah being swallowed by three successive fish, and animals identified as the four beasts representing the four

kingdoms in the Book of Daniel.

"The synagogue just keeps producing mosaics that there's just nothing like and is enriching our understanding of the Judaism of the period," noted Magness in 2018, following the finding of a depiction of the twelve spies Moses sent to explore Canaan. In the mosaic, the spies carry a pole bearing a cluster of grapes.



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"Every village had

its own synagogue," Magness explained at the time. "In Huqoq, there's a feeling that the villagers said, 'We're going to build the biggest and best.' It's as if they decided to throw everything into it."

Anti-Semitism

PCUSA: "Israel is an Apartheid State"

At its 225th General Assembly in June, the Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA) declared Israel an apartheid state and established a Nakba Remembrance Day. It also passed two other resolutions highly critical of Israel.

One resolution claimed that there were two sets of laws for Israelis and Palestinians, which are preferential for the former and oppressive to the latter. It also asserted that Palestinian land and water were stolen for use by "Jewish-only settlements" and that Palestinians were denied freedom of residence and movement, living in "separate reserves and ghettos." This echoed language of a resolution passed on the same subject at the North Carolina Democratic Party state convention earlier in June.

The resolution rejected concerns among Christians that ascribing the term "apartheid" to Israel could lead to characterizations of anti-Semitism, having an undue focus on Israel, or hampering constructive dialog, noting that some Christians won't engage in legitimate criticism because of the Holocaust and the failure of some Christian groups to speak against the tragedy.

The International Engagement Committee also unanimously passed a resolution to designate May 15 as "Palestinian Nakba Remembrance Day" and to observe it annually. Each May 15, Palestinians commemorate the Nakba (Arabic for "catastrophe") the establishment of the State of Israel and the exodus of Palestinian refugees caused by the 1948 War of Independence, when the nascent state was attacked by several of its Arab neighbors.

The resolution emphasized that the Nakba "does not refer to the establishment of Israel itself, but rather the effect that the war had on the Palestinian people," which the new resolution described as the "expulsion by terrorism and force of 750,000 Palestinians, both Christian and Muslim."

Another resolution called on Israel to end all military action in Gaza, which a PCUSA committee described as being disproportionate and collective punishment against Palestinians.

Since 2005, Gaza has been ruled by the terrorist organization Hamas, which has launched cross-border attacks and rockets against Israeli civilians. The resolution also called on Gaza to stop firing rockets indiscriminately into Israel. However, only two short sentences addressed Gazan actions, placing the most attention on Israel.

In other actions, the PCUSA rejected the Trump administration's move of the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem, saying that it damaged peace prospects. The denomination also issued a statement that it rejected "the doctrines of Christian Zionism that tend toward idolatry and heresy."

Arsen Ostrovsky, CEO of The International Legal Forum, condemned the resolution declaring Israel an apartheid state. "This resolution, with its plethora of anti-Semitic tropes, crosses all acceptable boundaries and descends into full-blown Jew-hatred that will only incite and fuel further violence against Jews," he emphasized.



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
